UNION ADDRESS.

The Personal Liberty Bill Denounced, and its Repeal Denaunded.

[From the Boston Courier.]

[From the necessity of settlen, the following Address has been submitted for signatures to but few of the many persons embraced by its terms—and whose views it is believed to express.

The concurrence of those whose names are thus wan ing, and of numerous other persons who have served and honored the State of Massachusetts will it is confidently hoped, be soon expressed in another form.]

To the Citizens of Massach

The undersigned are moved by an impera-tive sense of duty to address their fellow-citizens of the State of Massachusetts, concerning the portentous condition of our pub-lic affairs.

We are private citizens, of different political parties, neither holding nor desiring any public employment, having no interest in the subject which is not common to all, and being impelled by no motive save the love of our country and our sense of responsibility to God, for the preservation and transmission of the priceless blessings of civil liberty and public order which His providence has bestowed upon us. Many of us have heretofore held public employments, and we say, not in a spirit of boasting, but because the occasion calls on us to say it, We are private citizens, of different pe

because the occasion calls on us to say if, that the people have seen we have not been unfaithful to their trusts.

For our honest and profound convictions, for the cause of truth and right, for the sake of your own duties and welfare, we sak you to have you

to hear us. to hear us.

A large and important part of our common country is excited and alarmed. We deceive ourselves if we suppose that this excitement and alarm are not real, deep and general throughout fifteen States, which have been united to us by the closest ties which ever did or in the nature of human affairs ever can connect different political communities.

The foundations of our government are shaken, and unless the work of destruction shall be stayed, we may soon see that great

shaken, and unless the work of destruction shall be stayed, we may soon see that great union, our honor and safety abroad and at home, broken into weak. discordant and shattered fragments; and that people, who have dwelt under its protection in unexampled peace and prosperity, shedding fraternal blood in civil war.

At such a time, it is a great and solemn duty of the people of every State, to consider well, whether any part of the wrong, which has produced this condition of our affairs, can justly be laid to its charge, and if any such should be found, every consideration of duty and interest demands that such wrong should be promptly received. should be promptly repaired.

No specious fallacies, no blind resentments, no loud recriminations, no false pride should

be allowed to keep us in any wrong which can form even a small part of the causes which threaten a great people with ruin.

Our first duty is with ourselves. It can be performed only by a just, candid and man-

ly examination of our own conduct.

When we shall have done altogether right ourselves, we can firmly demand all that is due from others, and calmly abide whatever consequences may ensue in insisting on that demand. Fellow citizens of Massachusetts ! we are forced by these considerations solemnly declare that we believe the State of Ma chusetts has violated our great national com-pact, by laws now on her statute book, which

are in conflict with the constitution and laws of the United States. The Federal Government, like the govern-ment of each State, extends over the territo-ry of each State and over all persons within its limits. Each of these governments is sovereign and supreme within its own constitutional sphere of action, and entitled to the implicit obedience of the people to its laws, and to its judicial and executive officers appointed to apply and enforce them. It is plain that if one of these governments may command its officers and its citizens to do an act the other cannot command them to do an act. the other cannot comme abstain from doing it, or require them to do something which prevents or obstructs its execution. It is an inevitable consequence that when either persons or property have been taken into the custody of the law of one of these governments, and its executive officers are required by its laws to preserve that custody, then the other government cannot require its officers and citizens in any manner to interfere therewith. Such interference

would be a plain departure from its constitu-tional powers; and laws commanding it are

Yet it is nevertheless the tact, that if a fugitive from service whom the Constitution and laws of the United States require to be delivered up, be in the custody of a Marshal of the United States, who is commanded by the laws of the United States to retain that custody, the laws of Massachusetts require every judge of its Supreme Court, its Superior, Probate, or Police Court, (and any Justice of the Peace in some contingencies.) rior, Probate, or Police Court, (and any Justice of the Peace in some contingencies.) to issue a writ requiring the Marshal of the United States, having such custody, to bring the fugitive before a State tribunal, to subject him to the control of such tribunal, and to reiinquish his custedy upon its order. And having thus taken the fugitive from the custody of the law of the United States the tody of the law of the United States, state tribunal is to proceed to a trial of matters in issue, with forms and principles its own, which it is believed have never be applied to any other case, which are which are which are with the laws of the Un States, and in open defiance of their autity. And, as if the execution of those could not be left to the ordinary instrumtalities, deemed sufficient for the protect of the lines are sufficient for the lines talities, deemed sufficient for the protection of the lives, persons and property of our citizens, and in preparation, as it would seem for an inevitable and perilous contest, special commissioners are required to be appointed in each county of the Commonwealth, and the treasury of the Commonwealth is subjected to their unlimited control, for the purpose of provoking the conflict, and pressing it onward to its final and inevitable issue of physical force.

Besides the laws already referred to, there are other provisions which are manifestly designed to surround the performence of our constitutional duty of surrendering fugitive constitutional duty of surrendering fugitives from service, with such obstacles as must prevent its performance, even though by so doing our own public peace should be left at the mercy of a lawless mob.

If every d man must admit that he ought to govern his own conduct by these principles, are they inapplicable to the conduct of a great and populous State? On what ground can it be maintained that hundreds of thousands of innocent citizens are to be sub jected to suffering, because the false pride of their rulers refuses to do right? Mankind have been afflicted long enough and grievously enough by commotions and strifes and wars springing from such causes. We had hoped that the nature of our government tions and strifes and hoped that the nature of our government would protect us from swelling the great sum of human misery produced by the evil pas-sion of rulers. We had hoped that, inasmuch as the masses of the people can have no in-terest but to do right, they would have the discernment to perceive, and the manliness to do it; and would be too calm, too wise, too magnanimous intentionally to persevere

in any wrong; and we hope so still.

But what is meant by the exhortation not to repeal these laws under a threat? Who threatens us if they should not be repealed?

Whatever may have been true in the past, whatever faults of speech and action may have been committed on the one side or on the other, we firmly believe that the men from whom the worst consequences to our country and curselves are likely to proceed have no wish that these laws should be rerepealed, and no disposition to use any threats in reference to them. On the contrary, they desire to have them stand as conous and palpable breaches of the naspicuous and paipable breaches as affording tional compact by ourselves, and as affording instification to themselves, to the world, and Providence of God has ever permitted the wisdom of man to devise. How far these acts of ours are from affording any justification for the enormous wrong such men contemplate; how precipitate, rash and unnecessary are nt and destructive measures they are seeking to pursue, we know but too well. But we know equally well that there are oth er men, living among these last, and connected with them as members of the same socie ed with them as members of the same socie-ty, who are struggling to preserve our gov-ernment, who are seeking for other remedies than revolution and civil war, who still love their whole country, however bounded, and who would not see the glory of our fathers sink into the darkness of their children's shame, and we know that these patriotic, wise and courageous men are checked and weak-ened in their efforts to save the country by our persistence in our wrong. They threaten no one; but their labors and their sacrifices for our common country call on us in tones more eloquent than any words to do our duty, and not to obstruct them in doing theirs.

We have heard it suggested also that this is not the time to repeal these laws, because, in any future attempt at a compromise be-tween the North and the South, we should not have them to surrender on our part. But we cannot listen to those who counsel us to make merchandise of our own honor. Shall we grasp what does not belong to us, and when we are satisfied it is not ours—say we will keep it wherewith to make a bargain? And a bargain with whom? With strangers—with aliens in blood and speech, in interests and destiny? Not so. We all have but one and destiny? Not so. We all nave but one country, one welfare, one destiny; whether that destiny be to climb by the upward path of peace and union to the height where we should be the envy and delight of the nations, or to plunge into the gulf of civil discord, and find a dishonored grave. No serious wound can be inflicted anywhere on our body politic, without making the whole head sick and the whole heart faint. NATIONAL FAST. The National Fast was pretty generally beerved in this city yesterday, most of the stores being closed. At St. John's Church, Christ Church, and the Myrtle Avenue Presbyterian Church, services were held appropriate to the day. At the latter church Rev. Dr. Hewitt preached an able and powerful sermon from Galatians, 6th chapter and 2d verse : "Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ." This command appertains to those who are under the law of Christ. This nation is a Christian nation. Not that we are a nation of Christians; we are not a Mahomedan nation, not a Jewish, Pagan or Infidel nation, but a Christian nation. Christianity is a part of the common law of this country. Christianity, in its enlarged sense, as taught in the Bible, is not unknown to our law. Crime is of two kinds, malum in se and malum prohibitum, evil in itself, or evil because it is prohibited. The violation of the Sabbath, which is forbidden in the commandments, is also contrary to the statute law. In taking an oath it is the custom to lay our hands upon and kiss the Bible. By so doing, we acknowledge the force of its precepts. We are bound then to conclude that all things and words which go to villify Christian principles are against the common law. The preacher then read several extracts from eminent jurists, to show the part Christianity has in the common law. Our law recognizes the Bible as the foundation of law.

The text then is laying down one of the statute laws of Christ, and it is a law binding upon us as Christians to bear one anothers burdens, not merely as individuals but as members of a common country, and more especially at a time like the present. He would not read passages to show that slaveholders were members of churches in the apostolic age ; it was unnecessary. The epistles were letters addressed to churches and were read in their assemblies and as masters and servants are addressed in them and the duties one toward another are laid down in them it is not to be denied that slaveholders then were members of the church. It is a fundamental principle of christian churches that the Bible is the only and all sufficient rule of faith and practice, and in these we find admonitions to masters and slaves. Has there been any additional book written that teaches anything contrary or are we to be governed by those which we eceive as those of the apostles.

It cannot be denied that slaveholders in the apostolic age were church members.-Another thing must be borne in mind. Slave ry in those days was infinitely worse than it is now. The slaves were mere things and their nasters could maim, torture and kill them without being amenable to the law. One may ask :- If the new Testament recognizes slavery, does it sanction it ? Recognizing and sanctioning anything are two different things.

Paul, in appealing to Cæsar, recognized the uthority of Nero; but did he thereby sanction the infamous deeds of that monster wickedness. To the church at Rome he laid down the apostolic command to obey the owers that be.

Slavery is a creature of the law, and governed by the manners and customs of the States or countries where it exists. In the Southern States, the law puts slaves into the wners hands. If a man has a person owing nim, and he can obtain his pay in no other way, he has slaves transferred to him to seoure his debt. Must he be compelled to lose by refusing what there is lawfully considered as property? Suppose a man should there die and leave a large number of slaves, would it be right for the Court of Probate to set them all free, and thus impoverish the heirs? Thus the laws of those States often put slaves into the hands of a man when he cannot help it. Some may say, "If he is a man of conscience, he will purge himself of every stain of slavery." This may be the doctrine of some, but it is not Paul's doctrine. He ommands that we submit ourselves to the powers that be. If a nation has achieved its dependence, and in so doing, acts have been itted that are reprehensible, does the acknowledgment of that nation's independence by others, necessarily make them sanction the acts whereby that independence was obtained; not at all. It does not follow,

servant be above the people, who are their multitudes of cases in the Southern States THE HOUSE CRISIS COMMITTEE. where the relation of master and slave is beneficial to both, where both are under the influence of Christian principles. \re such men to be excommunicated because they are slaveholders?

The Methodist Church and the Baptists in a great degree, are all divided upon the subject of slavery,-the churches of the North having withdrawn from those of the South. The Old School Presbyterian and the Episcopal are the only two Protestant churches which have not thus divided. There is nothing that has had so great an influence in causing our present troubles as this division of churches. He then addressed himself to those who were impregnated with anti-slavery opinions. He did not mean those exclusively who were denominated Abolitionists, like Garrison, for he considered them as monomaniacs, but those who are so anti-slavery in their notions as to refuse communion with those churches which recognize slavery. They had so worked up their feelings on the subject of slavery that they believed that their consciences justified them in their belief. When a person thus thinks his conscience is dictating him, he is seldom willing to treat with consideration those who may as conscientiously believe the opposite. Contentions follow, accompanied with disastrous results. The Northern churches have, under these feelings, seceded from the Southern churches from the tract societies, and from the missionary societies. Before condemning seces sion in others, let us cure secession at home. Go down and visit the houses of Christian slaveholders and you will meet those who will teach you much concerning Christian duties and Christian charity.

Let the dogma be thrown aside that Slave holders are not fit to be members of the Church of Christ and much will be done towards healing present difficulties.

The Dr. then read some extracts from the ninutes of the General Assembly of the Old School Presbyterian church, showing its views upon the subject of slavery. He thought slaveholding was not as much of a sin as many had urged it to be.

He then took up the second question. Does he Constitution of the United States recognize property in slaves? He contended that t did not, and his argument was based upon the idea that in the Constitution they are poken of as persons and not as things, by which title they would have been known if they had been considered as property. He illustrated his opinion by supposed cases by which he claimed that if they are property they could be brought to this State and disposed of as other property.

He recognized the binding force of the law which demands that fugitives from labor shall be returned to those to whom such service or labor may be due. Every citizen of the Uni ted States had taken an oath to support the Constitution and must do it. No one could say for himself what part he would or would

He closed by urging kindness and conciliation one towards another. If civil war is to come let no blood be shed for the purpose of gratifying personal ambition, but only in upholding the majesty of the law. Let justice prevail but let justice be tempered

MATTERS SOUTH.

A despatch from Mobile. Jan. 4, says :-The United States Arsenal was taken at daylight this morning by the troops of this city. RESOLVED, That we recognize the justice and propriety of a faithful execution of the Constitution and "all' laws made in pursuance thereof, including those on the subject of fugitives slaves, or fugitives from service or labor, and discountenance all mobs or hindrances to the execution discountenance all mobs or hindrances to the execution of such laws, and that the citizens of each State shall be entitled to all the privileges and immunities of the citizens of the several States.

RESOLVED, That we recognize no such conflicting elements in the companion of t

ments in its composition as sufficient cause from any source for a dissolution of this government; that we were not sent heer to destroy, but to sustain and harmonize the institutions of the country, and to see that equal justice is done to all parts of the same, and finally to perpetuate its existence on terms of equality and justice to all the

The vote on these resolutions; pro and con, is not reported, and no intimation is given whether it was unanimous or otherwise.

SHOOTING AFFRAY AT ANSONIA. Quite a serious affair occurred at Ansonia ast evening, about six o'clock. It is said that two persons by the name of Platt came in contact with a party of Irishmen, during the afternoon, when some insulting words passed between them. Subsequently they met again and got into a melee, in which one of the Platts was struck by a member of the party and knocked down. While lying upon his back, Platt drew a revolver and fired four shots, one of them wounding a man by the name of Morrissey, probably fatally—the ball passing through his breast and jaw. Another had a narrow escape, a ball going through his coat, near the arm, and grazing the skin entirely across the back. The two Platts were arrested by Sheriff Bradley. It is believed there had been a previous difficulty between the parties, which led to this affray.

LINCOLN'S CABINET.

Telegraphic reports from Springfield, Illinois, say that Mr. Seward is to he Secretary of State, and Mr. Cameron Secretary of the Treasury; Mr. Wilmot (of Proviso notoriety) Secretary of the Interior; Colfax, Postmaster General; Bates, Attorney general. The announcement in reference to Seward and Cameron has raised a breeze among the Republican managers in Washington. A despatch to the Tribune indicates a feeling of great disappointment and dissatisfaction. The Massachusetts Delegation are particularly sore. New England, they say, has been left out in the cold.
