

MINERALS IN NORTH CAROLINA.-The MINERALS IN NORTH CAROLINA.—The Assistant State Geologist of North Carolina —Mr. C. D. Smith—has recently put forth a very interesting letter on the mineral wealth of western North Carolina. A copper bearing belt runs through Macon, Jackson, and Haywood counties. The veins descend twenty feet in depth in some of the leads, and the ore is rich. Most of the ore is yellow copper, position themselves a second twenty of the second twenty feet in the second twen and the ore is rich. Most of the ore is yellow copper pyrites, though occasionally some green carbonate and red oxyd are found.—
They yield from twenty to thirty per cent. of metallic copper. The mining is quite extensive near Franklin. Magnetic iron ore is found in great abundance near Franklin—the same kind of ore that the celebrated Swedes iron is made from. Manganese is also found in great quantities. In Charokae so found in great quantities. In Cherokee county, the supply of hematite iron ore is immense. It extends down Valley river to the Georgia line. The marble of Cherokee county is snow white, variegated, and blue and banded. On the Natibala river there ocours a fine flesh colored marble. Thick beds also, of agmaltolite, or figure stone, suitable also, or agmatoine, or ngure stone, suitable for furnaces and fine porcelain ware, arrest the attention. There is also plenty of coal, which is the main element of power in modern engineering and mining. North Carolina is rich in minerals, but capital, labor and railroads are wanted to develop these natural

In alluding to the condition of the country, he says:-All see, know, and feel that danger is imminent, and all true patriots are exerting themselves to save us from impending perils. He renews his proposition in his last message, for a Convention of all the States. The following is a synopsis of the message, as given by telegraph:

the message, as given by telegraph:

It is monstrous to see a Government like ours destroyed merely because men cannot agree about a domestic institution. It becomes our State to be mindful of her own interests. Disruption is inevitable, and if Confederations are to be formed, we must have the best guarantees before we can attach Virginia to either. He condemns the hasty action of South Carolina, which has taken her Southern sisters by surprise. He would make no special reference to her course, had he not been invited to do so by her late Executive in uncalled for references to Virginis. The non-slaveholding States are chargeable for the present condition of affairs, and if the Union is disrupted, upon them rests the solemn responsibility. He alludes at length to their aggressions, and says they have the power to end the strile and restore confidence. Will they do it? He awaits their response not without apprehension. He says our action should be based on the wrongs done our own people. He opposes a State Convention at this time, and suggests first that a commission of two of the most discreet statesmen visit the Legislatures of the States which have passed Personal Liberty bills, and insist on their unconditional repeal,—except the New England States; second, we must have proper and effective guarantees for the protection of slavery in the District of Columbia; third, our equality in the States and Territories must be fully recognized, and it a slave be adducted, the State where it i lost must pay its value; fourth, like guarantees that the transmission of slavers of the States and Territories unconditions of slavers of the State share it i lost must pay its value; fourth, like guarantees that the transmission of slavers of the State where it is lost must pay its value; fourth, like guarantees that the transmission of slavers to interfered with; fifth, the passage and enforcement of right laws for the punishment of such persons in the free States and Territories uncound proper to the such persons in the free S view to assall the slaveholding States, and to incite the slaves to insurrection; sixth, the general government be deprived of the power of appointing to local offices the slaveholding States, persons hostile to their institutions or inimical to their rights. The delegates of the Mississippi State Convention, Monday morning, held a caucus and adopted a resolution requesting their President to appoint a committee to draft an ordinance of secession. The Convention is animous for secession from the Union.

One hundred and four counties in Georgia have been heard from. Seventy are for immediate secession; twenty-nine for co-operation: and five divided.

A large meeting was held at Norfolk, Va., on Saturday night. Strong speeches were made, urging the citizens to arm themselves and place themselves in a state of defence for any emergency. Resolutions recoming the Legislature to organize thoroughly the military power of the State, and prepare for civil war, should it occur; scorning coercion; and preparing to resist invasion, were unanimously adopted.

Governor Wise, of Virginia, is out in long letter. His leading positions are for an immediate call for a State Convention; a prompt resumption by the Convention, of all firemen to take their hose through any house such powers hitherto delegated to the General Government as may be necessary for State protection, especially the possessien of forts, &cc.; that having done so, the State shall not declare herself out of the Union. but suspend all relations with the offending States till they shall accede to such ultimatum as the Convention may submit.

The lecture by Professor Silliman, last evening, was highly interesting and entertaining. The introduction was a comparison between ancient and modern Chemistry.

The former was a system of empiricism used by priests and learned men to deceive the masses, and control them by creating in them a superstitious reverence. Modern chemistry has been, and is, employed for the good of the people. The secrets of nature are attainsble by all who inquire. The lecturer then proceeded to explain the constitution of water, showing that it was composed of two gases-oxygen and hydrogen. He decomposed water by the usual process, and having filled several jars with hydrogen, proceeded to give a series of beautiful experiments, showing its properties. He then took oxygen and gave some most brilliant illustrations of how it supports combustion, the purning of a watch-spring or a piece of phosphorus in a jar of this gas, producing a light so intense as to be painful to the eyes. With the compound blow-pipe he fused platina, iron, pipe-clay, silver, bismuth, and a variety of metals, showing that the most obdurate metals could not withstand its intense heat.

He closed his lecture and experiments with the calcium light, and explained the principle of its operation.

Notwithstanding the threatening aspect of the weather, Franklin Hall was filled, and the audience seemed highly pleased with the lecture. Scientific lectures are appreciated in Bridgeport, where the lecturer has the faculty of instructing and pleasing at the same time, as Professor Silliman is capable



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

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
