A VIRGINIA HERO BY EMERSON BENNETT.

Among the earliest settlers of August

county, in the State of Virginia, was a family from Ireland, of Huguenot descent, by the name of Lewis. John Lewis, the senior, was the inheritor of quite a large estate in Ire land, and in the course of time became th land, and in the course of time became the lessee of an adjoining estate, owned by an unprincipled nobleman, who, getting envious of the property of his tenant, and finding no legal mode of ejecting him, hirsd and headed a band of ruffians, and attempted to dispossess him by force. Lewis boldly refusing to evacuate the premises, the nobleman himself fired the first shot, killing a sick brother of the lessee and wounding his wife; whereof the lessee and wounding his wife; where opon the latter, supported by a few faithfu domestics, scarcely numbering one to four of the assailants, rushed forth and took a fearful retaliation. With his own hand, John Lewis sent the nobleman and his steward to their final account, while the others soon fled in

final account, while the others soon fied in dismay.

Fearing the consequences of an investigation into an affair where so little proof existed of the enormous aggression of the nobleman, whose powerful friends might succeed in crushing him with the weight of opposite testimony, John Lewis took the advice of his counsellors, drew up a statement of the whole affair, which he sent to the anthorities, and embarked with his family and some thirty of his tenantry, on hoard of a record thirty of his tenantry, on board of a vessel bound to the New World. Landing in Virginia, he pushed directly for the wilderness, and settled in the then wild forests of what is now Augusta county. Here, in the very heart of the wilderness, surrounded by hostile savages, he lived and reared his family, consisting of four sons, as brave and daring as himself, and who, with their descendants,

figured conspicuously throughout the border wars and the revolution. Charles, the youngest son of John Lewis, and the subject of our present sketch, was born on the soil of Virginia, and came upon the stage of action at a period when the hostility of the Indians had become most aggressive. From that time forth for several years, sive. From that time forth for several years, he was almost constantly on duty, and his whole life was a series of daring exploits and hair-breadth escapes. The deeds of this hero still live in the memories of the pioneers of the Alleghanies and their descendants, and are often rehearsed around their winter fires. The adventure we are about to record, is less known than many others equally exciting, and is now for the first time published to the world.

One day, during the fearful period when

frequent occurrence, and men, women, and children were constantly falling victims to their secret and remoraless enemies. Charles Lewis, with the self-reliance of a skillfel and experienced woodsman, struck boldly off into the forest, in the double capacity of hunter

and scout. Gliding steadily forward, scanning every tree, bush, and covert, he gradually ascended the mountain that rose before him, till at last the mountain that rose before him, till at last he stood upon the verge of a rocky gorge, and beheld, compressed by its narrow channel, a mountain stream foaming and roaring fifty feet below him. [From the New York Express] SLAVERY IN OUR SAVIOUR'S DAY When Christ was on earth, He rebuked sin of all classes and kinds, and dared to rebuke the Jewish Priest in his Temple, or titled Roman Gentile,—if they were guilty of sin but, while slavery was all about him-neither He nor His apostles ever preached an aboli tion sermon. The slavery Christ saw daily was that under which a master could sell hi slave, work him as many hours as he pleased, or put him to death. A Roman slave could not contract a marriage. His cohabitation with a woman was contubearium, and no legal relation between him and children was recognized. A Roman slave could have no property. A runaway slave could not be lawful ly received or harbored; to conceal him was furtum. The master was entitled to pursue him wherever he pleased, and it was the duty of all authorities to give him aid in recovering the slave. A person became a slave by can ture in war. A free woman, who cohabited with a slave, might be reduced to slavery. The immense number of prisoners taken in the constant wars of the Roman Republic, and the increase of wealth and luxury in Christ's day augmented the number of slaves to a prodigious extent. Very many Romans possessed 10,000 and 20,000 slaves. A freed man, under Augustus, who had lost much property in the civil wars, left at his death 4,116 slaves. The games of the Amphithe atre required an immense number of slaves. The gludiators in Italy (before Christ, 73.) nder Spartacus, and were not defeated

Romans till 60,000 slaves were said to have fallen in battle. Slave dealers usually accompanied an army, and frequently after a great battle had been gained, many s were sold at once, at very cheap

In the midst of this system of slavery was the Christian era inaugurated. Christ preached principles which subverted the atrocities of slavery—as every other system of government or life—but Abolitionism was not his mission. Christians in the Apostles day owned slaves, and considered it no crime to own them. What we mean to infer from these facts is, -- that if slavery was the sin and crime the Abolitionists of this day say it is. Christ saw it in a worse point of view and never preached an Abolition sermon against it-never warred upon the government that recognized and supported it—but, on the con-trary, taught obedience to that government nce to that government His mission was to bring sinners to repentance, not to concentrate all men's minds upon the abolition of slavery, or to divide society,

or a country, only upon that issue.

If we could only impress upon our Aboli tion preachers the example of Christ when on earth, in the midst of Roman slavery,—in itself indefensible, because of its atrocities,we might, perhaps, make them useful in meliorating and christianizing African slav-ery in these United States. The early Chrisn writers, after Christ's day, inculcated the duty,-not of Abolition, but of acting towards slaves—as masters in their condition would be acted by,—and thus they did much toward promoting the ultimate extension of slavery, or, in the end, of merging slaves into the adscripti glebæ, or serfs of the Middle Ages. If our Northern Abolitionists would reason with, instead of cursing our Southern countrymen, the rights and duties of families under executions might be done away with, and a system of education be instituted,-but their rating and cursing for twenty years has only strengthened slavery in the United States, and drawn tighter together the bonds of the master over the slave. pose, then, our Abolition theologians the system of slavery Christ and his apostles sters,"—and "render to Casar gs that are Cæsar's,"—and when they returned fugitive slaves, -as in the case of Onesimus and Philemon. They have tried the cursing, now, for a quarter of a century, and it has done no good. Suppose, now, they try the Christian creed of "Love one aner." "Do unto others as you would have others do unto you," &c., &c. ;-and there is no knowing but they may thus conquer the world.—as Christ did.

MATTERS SOUTH.

The Charleston papers deny the statement that the telegraph wires in that city are under surveillance-or that they have ever been so.

The Mississippi State Convention have guilty. adopted a resolution to amend the constitution of the State so as to authorize the borrowing of money for military defence. Commissioners from South Carolina and Alabama occupied seats on the floor.

The Alabama State Convention have resolved by a large majority, that its session should be secret. Previous to this action. however, a Committee was appointed to consider upon and report the action necessary for the State to take. Mr. Calhoun, the Commissioner from South Carolina, made an address before the Convention, which is stated to have been well received.

A despatch from Jackson states that the ordinance of immediate State secession, unanimously agreed upon in the Committee of Fifteen, will pass the Mississippi Convention to-morrow, while it is in secret session.

The Florida State Convention have adopted a resolution, declaring the right of States to withdraw from the Union, and that the existing causes are such as to compel Florida to proceed to exercise that right. It is reported that the Governor of Florida has taken possession of the forts and other federal property in that State.

The Governor of Tennessee, in his message, recommends that the question of calling a Convention be left to the people, and says the remedy for the present evils exists only in Constitutional amendments, on the refusal whereof Tennessee should maintain her equality in, or independence out of the Union. He recommends the organization of the militia and the purchase of arms. He leaves the bank suspension renalties to the discretion of the Legislature.

Several of the prominent men of Maryland, are endeavoring to get the Legislature of that State together, independent of Governor Hicks.

A Committee of the Virginia Legislature have prepared a bill providing for holding a State Convention. The election of delegates will be held on the 7th of February, and the Convention will meet on the 18th of that month.

It is stated that the State of Georgia has appointed a Commissioner to proceed abroad, to obtain from foreign Powers the recognition of the seceding States as governments de of slaves, husband and wife, might be legally facto. He will also be charged with the duty established in our Southern States,—divisions of negotiating a basis of credit and exchange, by which the cotton crop can be hypothecated in Europe and moved for joint account.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

Mr. Thompson has resigned his post as Secretary of the Interior. The despatch of reinforcements to Major Anderson at Fort Sumpter by the Star of the West from New York is said to be the cause of this step on the part of Mr. Thompson.

The official confirmation of the report of the reinforcement of Major Anderson created intense excitement at the capital.

The brother of Major Anderson has arrived in Washington from Fort Sumpter, having been sent thither by the President to ascertain the state of affairs. He reports that Major Anderson has ample supplies, and is confident of being able to hold the fort against any force. He makes no requisition for reinforcements, leaving that matter to his superiors.

It is said the government has chartered the steamer Joseph Whitney, at Boston, to convey troops and munitions of war to the forts on the Florida coast. She will sail on Saturday next.

It is understood that the House Committee Thirty-three will close their deliberations to-day, with a final attempt to adopt some plan of adjustment.

J. B. Ferris, State Attorney, opened the case in behalf of the State.

C. H. Ward-Resides in Cambridgeport Mass.; occupation, Teller of the Atlantic Bank since January 15th, 1860; paid out April 16th, 1860, ten \$500 bills. There were then 198 bills of that denomination issued by the Bank, making \$99,000 in circulation, or ready to be circulated when called for. New bills of a different plate and same denomina tion were issued some time afterwards. There were some of the old bills put out the morning of the 17th, but they were traced to responsible parties. Cannot tell who they were paid out to. In September, a man came in the Bank at two different times with \$50

Mr. Ward resumed-Two came from Milton J. Hardy : could not tell exact time : nine came from Union Bank, September 22, through Clearing-house. They came with a Clearing-house ticket upon it. One came from Webster Bank; two came from Bank of Commerce, Boston; one through Market Bank, Boston: two are still outstanding. He notified Adams & Co. as soon as the nine bills were received from the Union Bank.

Cross-examined by Ex-Recorder Smith-Has been teller since January 16th, 1860. There were 198 bills of \$500 in circulation at that time. He found it out by looking over the books. Could not tell how many bills of that denomination had been struck off. Could not tell the amount of the issue of the Bank. Had been in banking business before going handsomely decorated with flags and pictures into the Bank. Traced the bills by going around to the Banks from which they were received. It was after the 16th that \$50 bills were exchanged at the Atlantic Bank. Can give no idea of the time when the bills were exchanged. Did not see the person before, and have not seen him since.

Direct testimony resumed—He knows of 196 bills of \$600 having been in the Bank since the 16th of April. He knew the Banks from which they came. He has the nine bills which came from the Union Bank.

Alden Spear-Resides in Boston. On April 9th, purchased a watch in Boston of assignees of Bayley, Chapman & Co., for 252. I afterward gave it to Wm. S. Green : a young man in my store put it in a box and put it in sharge of the Adams Express Comany, to be sent to New York.

Cross examined. - When he went to th office several persons were present, some behind the desk and some outside. Never saw the person before to whom he delivered it .-He marked the box to the person to whom it was going, with care and put on it one watch. A witness was called to corroborate the

testimony of Mr. Ward in regard to the receipt of the ten \$500 bills. He took them to the Express Office and got a receipt from Mr. Richardson one of the clerks. The receipt was produced and read in court. Kept it until he heard of the robbery. He then sent it to the consignees of the package in New York.

#Alvin Adams-On the 16th of April received ten \$500 bills on Atlantic Bank, put them in to an envelope; went into the front office gave them to Mr. Richardson the clerk who made out a receipt for him.

Benjamin Dodd-Resides in Boston; an Cashier of Atlantic Bank: on the 16th of April, 1860, there were outstanding \$99,000 in \$500 bills of the Bank. His testimony was confirmatory of that of Mr. Ward in regard to the number of bills of that denomination in circulation. Since that time \$93,000 have been destroyed. What remains of old bills are in the hands of the teller. The new issue of \$500 bills was made on the 11th of

July, 1860. Henry Howard-Resides in Boston : Receiving Teller of Union Bank. On September 22 received a package of bills from Alfred Bank, Maine; some \$500 bills an the Atlantic Bank, and \$200 in small bills on same Bank. The letter accompanying the package to the Bank from the Alfred Bank was objected to as evidence. The letter was admitted. The bills received were all of the old plate. The bills were sent to the Clearing House. He took the strap off which came upon the package, and put on one of their own. They were charged to the Atlantic Bank, and sent the Clearing House.

Charles Johnson-Resides in Waltham, Mass. I received from Capt. John Williams two bills of \$500 each, on the evening of the 6th of April.

Testimony objected to as irrelevant. The prosecution stated that the witness retained these bills until after the 16th of April. The testimony was admitted.

Mr. Johnson resumed-The Monday after e received the bills he went to Iowa and took the bills with him. On the 13th of April he had them in Burlington. He kept them till the 26th of April, and deposited them in the Branch Bank at Burlington.

Calvin Hale-Resides in New Hampshire Cashier of Langdon Bank, New Hampshire, on 14th of April sent a package of Langdon Bank Bills containing \$2600, to Emerson, Brewster & Co., 96 Pearl St., Boston, Mass. They were small bills in a sealed package. The bills were marked with a letter Z on the right upper corner of the bills; some of the bills were produced and identified by witness. Henry Saywood-Resides in Dover, N. H.

Annil 1860 sent a note by A Mr. Ward resumed—The man changed Express Co. for collection. Delivered it to Mr. Richardson, Clerk of the Company. Note was at 18 months, signed by Kimball & Hobbs, for twelve hundred and fifty dollars. and was to order of Hanson & Duryea.

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
