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

CONGRESS

On Tuesday, in the Senate several memorials were presented praying for the passage of the Crittenden resolutions. These resolutions were subsequently taken up, and, after some debate, further consideration was postponed. The Pacific Railroad bill was discussed by Senators Clark, Green, Wilson. In the House, the Committee of the Whole took up the Army bill, and Mr. Regan of Texas made a secession speech, and a lebate ensued, in which Messrs. McClernaud, Stanton, Crawford, Hill, Love and Rust partisinated. Mr. Adrain made a reply to Mr. stanton, stating that the doctrine of peaceful ecession was utterly fallacious. Mr. Anderson of Mo., concluded the discussion; the Committee rose and the House adjourned.
