whip played a very conspicuous part in both the public and private life of the Romans. The lictors, always attending the consuls, wore their bunches of rods not merely for state show, although it was not permitted to beat Roman citizens, except in the case of their being thieves; but slaves were beaten with smooth leather straps, called ferule; more painful were the rutive, made of several strips of parchment twisted together; and the superlative was the oxhide, called flagellum, often right terrible. Most terrible of all was an instrument imported from abroad, the Spanish whip, used only by very severe masters. They had not only the right severe masters. They had not only the right of whipping slaves at pleasure, but even of killing them. Some masters, not satisfied with the plain Spanish whip, made it more terrible by fastening small nails or bones, and little leaden balls to it. Slaves were stripped, their hands tied to a tree er post, and their feet hindered from kicking by a clag of a hundred pounds weight. The most trifling faults were punished in this manner, and a poor fellow might be flogged for the mere amusement of his master's guests. It was no rare occurrence that a slave died under the whip, and there was no more regret was no rare occurrence that a slave decided the whip, and there was no more regret than for the loss of a pan or other piece of household property. The ladies were particularly cruel to their slaves. The poor girls in attendance, scratched and bleeding from wounds made with the long pins the later than dies wore as an ornament, sometimes filled the whole house with their cries. The oru elty towards the slaves increased so mu it. Laws mere made, pursuant to which such masters as would forsake their slaves in sickmasters as would foreage their slaves in anomalies forfeited their rights to them after their recovery; and a Roman who would intentionally kill a slave was to be banished from Rome. Any lady who would whip or order whipping of a slave to such a degree that death ensued before the third day, was to be excommunicated for from five to seven years. The young Roman libertines often chose the disguise of a slave's dress for their love addisguise of a slave's dress for their love adventures. Rich people kept so great a crowd of slaves that they did not know them all personally, and thus the introduction into houses was made easy. Even the vestals were not exempt from this punishment: The vestal Urbinia was whipped by a priest, and led in procession through the streets. Other vestals we are told, had been whipped for the same offence. The guilty one, covered over same offence. The guilty one, covered over with a thin veil, was whipped by a priest in a dark room. Even empresses were not always spared, at least in the Christian time and in Spared, at least in the Constantinople, where the mother of Jus-tiana II. was so admonshed. To be whipped, however, was, in the eyes of a Roman, the lowest disgrace, and for this reason judges ordered Christians to be whipped at their first ramination .- Once a Week SCALES IN MARINE BOTLERS. - A series of

interesting and successful experiments have lately been concluded in England—conducted under the direction of the government—which prove that the scale generated on the surface of marine boilers and their tubes can be removed more effectually and efficiently be removed more effectually and efficiently than by manual labor. By the system now proposed, and which has been subjected to so thorough and protracted a series of tests, only one door of the boiler has to be taken off to allow the introduction of the steam pipe. The boiler to be acted upon is then filled rapidly with superheated steam at a temperature of four hundred degrees of heat; this acting on the suline deposit on the surface of the tubes and other parts of the boiler expands and disengages it from several parts After this the boiler is again filled with water. and steam got up in the usual manner and kept up for a few hours; on subsequently blowing off the bollers. wing off the boilers they are found to be as free from scale as when they are first put on board the ship. The experiments have been highly satisfactory, and it is believed that the saving of fuel in the adoption of this plan will be very considerable; the whole scale may be removed from a ship's boilers in twelve h

A New STIMULANT.—Among European novelties it seems that a new stimulant has appeared, which, if the accounts received of it are true, promises to contest the precedence with opium and tobacco. It is the dried leaf of the "erythroxylon cocoa" a Peruvian plant, which, when chewed in small quantities, gives rise to a gentle nervous excitement, acting at the same tim claimed—as an aid to digestion. The dose required to produce this effect, is from four to six grains. Between the Hebrew bondman and the Southern slave, there is no point of resemblance. There were, however, slaves among the Hebrews, whose general condition was analogous to that of his Southern fellow sufferers. That was the beathen slave, who was to be bought "from the heathens that were round about the land of Israel, or from the heathen strangers that sojourned in the land; they should be a possession, to be bequeathed as an inheritance to the owners' children, after his death forever. [Levil. xxx. 44-46]. Over these heathen slaves the owners' property was absolute; he could put them to halbor, to the utmost extent of their physical strength; he could inflict on them any degree of chastisement short of injury to life and limb. If his heathen slave ran away or strayed from home, every Israelite was bound to bring or send him back, as he would have to do with any other portion of his neighbors' property that had been lost or strayed [Deut. xxii. 3].

Now you may, perhaps, ask me how I can reconcile

Now you may, perhaps, ask me how I can reconcile this statement with the text of scripture so frequently quoted against the Fugitive Slave Law, "Thou shalt not surrender unto his master the slave who has escaped from his master unto thee" [Deut. xxiii. 15]. I answer you that, according to all legists, this text applies to a heathen slave, who, from any foreign country, escapes from his master, even though that master be an Hebrew, residing out of the land of Israel. Such a slave—but such a slave only—is to find a permanent asylum in any part of the country he may choose.

Had the precept been expounded in any other than its strictly literal sense, it would have caused great confinion, since it would have nullified two other precepts of God's Law; that which directs that "alaves, like lands and houses, were to be inherited forever"; and that which commands "pruperty lost or strayed to be restored to the owner." Any other interpretation would moreover have caused heart burning and strife among the tribes, for men were as tenacious of their rights and property in those days as they are now. But no second opinion was ever entertained. The slave who ran away from Dau to Beersbeba had to be given up, even as the runaway from South Carolina has to be given up by Massachusetts; whilst the runaway from Edom or from Syria found an asylum in the land of Israel, as the runaway slave from Achish, King of Gath, at that time a Vassal of Israel, [Kings ii. 39, 40]. And Saul of Tarsus sent back the runaway slave Onesimus unto his owner Philemon. But to surrender to a ruthless, lawless heathen, the wretched slave who had escaped from his cruelty, would have been, te give up the full property. The text to true repugnant to the spirit of God's law, the tender care of which protected the bird in its nest, the beast at the plough, and the slave curity for his property, the exercise of that power we confined within certain limits which he could not outstep.

So we see that the Rev. 


