

BREAKING STEERS .- Now winter has com in this quarter and the snow covers the in this quarter and the snow covers the ground. This is a good time to bring the sturdy steer to the yoke. Take him before he is two years old and yoke him to his mate. A wide stable is a good place to yoke the pair at first. Here they should be permitted to stand in the yoke for a number of hours in order that they may gradually become used to a new position. The stable door should be wide enough to let the cattle out together, and much care should be taken, in the first movement to prevent their obin the first movement, to prevent their obtaining the mastery. Use them kindly, by all means, but let them know at once that they are not to run away, though they are out doors. The true secret of managing your cattle to advantage is gentleness. One little. cattle to advantage is gentleness. One little nub of soft corn is worth a dozen whips and not hurry them. Let them have a little time to reflect and they will prefer marching to being whipped. After they have seen that the yoke will not hurt them, you may drive them slowly around the cow yard—having a rope on the near horn to prevent their br ing away. This is a great point, for after they have once broken from you and obtained freedom, they will remember it for a long time. Now unyoke and let the steers have time. Now unyoke and let the steers have their liberty. Do this in the stable and not set them to break away and obtain their own liberty—but grant it freely and then you may yoke them the next day with much less trouble than the first. On yoking a second time you may put on a chain and hitch them forward of the old oxen, and with a farm have a before them they will seen lessy to horse before them they will soon learn to draw and to aid the old cattle. A good manager will pretty soon be able to drive steers without a rope on their horns. They may be made to go repeatedly around the cow yard in the same track. After one hour's practice they will learn to haw around and to whos, at the word of command. And yet we are not to imagine that these steers are thoroughly broken to the yoke. They must hear the words of haw, gee, whos, and back a thousand times before they will promptly obey. In the mean time they may be earning their living in the team.—Massachusetts Ploughman.

PAY YOUR SMALL BILLS.—We do not mean to intimate that it is not well to pay large bills at this time. But it is more important than some suppose that small bills be promptly met at this season. From negligence and procrastination, men who l ligence and procrassination, men who have meney enough in their pecket to pay the little bills of one dollar, five dollars and ten dollars, often delay paying them. They do not consider that the receipts of many trademon are largely in sums of that amount, and that their ability to take up their notes and pay the large merchants with whom they deal are dependent upon the punctuality of customers ho make small purchases. For the frosting and ornamenting, 25 dozen eggs and 75 pounds of sugar were used. The dimensions of the dif-ferent layers were as follows. Diameter of the first layer, 4 feet; second layer, 3 feet one inch; third layer, 2 feet 3 mches; fourth layer, 1 foot 5 inches. THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE. On Monday President Buchanan sent Special Message to Congress, enclosing with it the conciliatory propositions of the Virginia Legislature. Below we give both the Message and the Resolutions :-

The President's Message. To the Senate and House of Representatives

I deem it my duty to submit to Congress series of resolutions adopted by the Legisla-ture of Virginia on the 19th inst., having in view the peaceful settlement of the existing questions which now threaten the Union.— They were delivered to me on Thursday, the 24th inst., by ex-President Tyler, who has the hope that he may render service to his ountry in this its hour of peril.

The resolutions, it will be perceived, ex tend an invitation to all States, whether slaveholding or non-slaveholding, as are will ing to unite with Virginia in an earnest effort to adjust the present unhappy controversies in the spirit in which the constitution was originally formed and consistently with its principles, so as to afford to the people of the slaveholding States adequate guarantees for the security of their rights, to appoint commissioners to meet on the 4th day of February next, in the city of Washington Convention. ington, similar commissioners appointed by Virginia, to consider, and, if practicable agree upon some suitable adjustment.

I confess I hail the movement on the

part of Virginia with great satisfaction. From the past history of this ancient and renowned Commonwealth we have the fullest assurance that what she has undertaken she will accomplish, if it can be done by able, enlightened and persevering efforts. It is highly gratifying to know that other patriotic States have appointed and are ppointing Commissioners to meet those Virginia in Council. When assembled they will constitute a body entitled in an emi-nent degree to the confidence of the coun-

also resolved "that ex-President John Tyler States; and Judge John Robertson is hereby appointed, by a like vote, a Commissioner to State of South Carolina, and the other States that have seceded or shall secede, with instructions respectfully to request the President of the United States and the authorities the proceedings contemplated by the action of this General Assembly, from any and all acts calculated to produce a collision of arms between the States and the Government of my desire to enter into such an agreement, I am convinced that I do not possess the power. Congress, and Congress alone, under the war making power, can exercise the discretion of agreeing to abstain from any and all acts cal-culated to produce a collision of arms be-tween this and any other government. It would, therefore, be a usurpation for the Executive to attempt to restrain their hands by an agreement in regard to matters over which he has no constitutional control. If he were thus to act, they might pass laws which he should be bound to obey, though in conflict with his agreement. Under existing circumstances, my present actual power is confined within narrow limits. It is my duty at all times to defend and protect the public prop-erty within the seceding States so far as may be practicable, and especially to employ the constitutional means to protect the property public peace at this, the seat of the Federal Government. If the seceding States abstain be deprecated will no longer exist. Defence, and not aggression, has been the policy of the administration from the beginning.
