

CRYSTALIZATION OF WROUGHT IRON

### SOURCE OF DANGER. Conversation with Henry Clay

endent of the Journal of Commerce furnishes the following interesting sketch of an interview between Henry Clay and Rev. Dr. Hill, editor of the Presbyterian Herald, of Louisville, Ky. It was published several years ago, under the above caption in the "Pacific Expositor," and is worthy of being carefully read and pondered upon by all reflecting men at this perilous time. The author proceeds :-

A few weeks prior to the death of the Hon. Henry Clay, when he passed through our city, on his way to Washington, at the request of a Methodist minister from one of the Northern States, who had never seen the great statesman, we called with him to see him.—He was quite feeble, and spoke of his death as a probable event within a few months. He stated that nothing but a deep and abiding conviction that the Union of the States was in imminent peril could have induced him in his state of health, to leave the quiet of his own home and go back to the Senate, the seat of so many of his struggles and great achievements. The opinion was expressed by one or both of us that the danger of disunion was greatly over-estimated, and if it ever came to the test, it would be found that there were very few who would be madenough to rush into disunion, either in the North or South. He shook his bead ominously, and replied:—"Gentlemen, if I have studied anything it is the genius and spirit of the American people, both in the North and the South, and I tell you there is danger. There is a spirit rising up in both sections of this depublic, which, if not speedily quelled, will bring about a severance of the Union of those States, not in two, but into half a dozen little petty Republics, or despotisms, as the case may be." It was replied that duels, but they often do it, when they know that ruin both to themselves and families stares them full in the face. 'So, 'said he, 'men will fight, if they consider their rights trampled upon, even if you show them that ruin to themselves and families will be the probable result. Besides, in times of high excitement, the violent men on both sides get the control of matters, and moderate men are thrown in the background, and their counsels go unbeeded. Finding that the venerable statesman had exhausted his strength in talking, we arose to bid him adieu, as we supposed, for the last time on earth. He shook the hands of both of us, and said:—'If you preachers will only keep the churches from running into excesses and fansitelsm, I think the politicisms can control the masses. But,' he added, 'yours is the hardest task, and if you do not perform we will not be able to do our part. That I consider the greatest source of danger to our country.'

They fear even that some of these most needful charities to those who suffer most in distressed times—the poor and homeless little ones of the streets—must be given up, unless more liberally aided by the public.

The work which is being done by the Society, for the public benefit, is as follows:

Beside these, the Italian School and the Cottage Place School, with about two hundred pupils, are maintained by the Society.

2—They are supporting and carrying on the News Boys Lodging Mouse, which shelters now about one hundred boys every night, and some three thousand different lad in the course of the year. These boys are instructed every evening, and many of them provided with places and trades. and trades.

3.—They are providing with good homes, in the rural districts, from seven hundred to eight hundred children each year, and have thus settled about six thousand pool little ones since the foundation of the Society.

For this purpose, two agents are constantly employed in the West.

For all these various enterprizes the Society expends only about \$12,000 per annum. The Trustees feel that they have the right, in view of the great general importance of the work, and its economy, to remind the public at this time of their needs; and they are confident that their appeal will, as in times past, be met liberally by all who feel for suffering childhood.


