

Such being our rule of judgment, it is manifest that, as political abolition has yet done nothing but injury to the cause it has taken in d injury on an immense scale, it will do nothing but injury in time to come.

We are not fond of alarming topics, nor disposed to excite unnacessary anxiety. But the evils of political abolition, rising up in the North, must be faced, and the consequences it tends to, must be considered.
