

MR. FERRY'S SPEECH.

The Standard is publishing Mr. Ferry's recent speech in Congress, revised and corrected by himself. We hope every Republican in the district will read it, and see how desperately lacking it is in candor, fairness and truth-see its criminations; its harsh epithets; its menaces; its misrepresentations; its violence of denunciation; its vituperativeness; its offensiveness in tone and spirit; and above all, its utter destitution, almost, of every thing in the shape of fair and truthful statement of facts and of sound, candid argument. Never was a speech so ill-timed, so illadapted to the requirements of the occasion delivered by a representative of Connecticut in Congress. Never was there an occasion which called more imperatively upon a representative to throw aside his party animosities, his sectional prejudices, his personal antipathies-and never was a more favorable, a grander opportunity presented for one to show the nobleness of his character, if any such nobleness were in him, and to make his mark as a moral hero, a true patriot, a dignified

But Mr. Ferry seems to have possessed no realizing sense of the requirements, the rareness, or the importance of the occasion-was not able to divest himself for a moment of his overbearing, bullying nature-of his pettifogging, bar-room habits of harangueing; of his bombastic, slam-bang, dare-devil style of argumentation; of his accustomed countycourt manner of browbeating, misrepresenting, vilifying, maligning, and abusing his opponents. Every sentence, almost, of his speech appears as if designed to increase the antipathies, aggravate the difficulties, and widen the breach between the Northern and Southern portions of our Union. Indeed, there is scarcely a kind word or conciliatory expression in the whole speech-on the contrary, it is reproachful, insolent, vindictive, oriminating, and violently partisan throughout. Better by far would it have been if he had not said one word. Too many of such incendiary speeches have been made already. If he could do nothing to stop the fury of the raging storm, which he has helped to create, and by the force of which the bands of our Union have been burst asunder, he should at least have refrained from "adding fuel to the fire." If he could not aid the patriotic endeavors of such men as Crittenden and Corwin, he could certainly abstain from joining with Gillette, Garrison, Phillips, Beecher, Greeley, Sumner, Hale, Wilson, Giddings & Co., in active measures to thwart and defeat them. The Standard pronounces the speech "very able." But is it any more able than the bitter, slang-whanging, denunciatory articles that have appeared for months and months in the columns of the Tribune, of which his speech is only a condensation? Is it any more able than the recent letter of Mr. Gillette, that Garrison fanatic, and leader of the old Abolition party in this State, with whom Mr. Ferry is now a political bedfellow? Is it any more able than the speech. es of Sumner, which the Republican committee adopted for compaign documents? Is it any more able than the impious pulpit harangues of Beecher and Cheever, with which, his friends must confess, it does not begin to compare in point of originality? Is it any more able than the violent fulminations and loose expectorations of Lovejoy, Blair, Hale, Wilson, or of that venerable Abolition viper, "Old Father Giddings ?" MATTERS SOUTH.

Hon. Thomas L. Clingman has been elected United States Senator from North Carolina

A resolution is now under consideration in the North Carolina Legislature, declaring that in case the sectional difficulties are not speedily reconciled, North Carolina will go with the South.

The Boston Courier remarks thus upon the position occupied by the Republican members of Congress:

We will state the position of the Rapublican members of Congress, and we make this statement on high authority. They admit the danger to the American Union. They see that State after State has gone out, and they know that others will follow. They know there is a possibility that all the slave States will be out before the first of Merch. They know that Mr. Critzendan's amendment know that others will lollow. They know there is a possibility that all the slave States will be out before the first of March. They know that Mr. Crittenden's amendment—or some such proposition—will prevent a general secession. But they reason that if they concede anything their party is shattered, and upon this they halt. They are risking the nation in the hope of saving a party. That is their position. They are somewhat embarrassed by Mr. Liocoln's silence. Those of them who expect office from him do not wish to do an act which may be displeasing to the incoming administration. These are the exact points which restrain and embarrass the Republicau members of Congress. They admit this in their letters to their local leaders; we have it from high authority. We hasten to communicate this intelligence to the people, so that they may at once meet and instruct their Representatives upon their duty. Let there be a meeting in every town in New England, resolutions passed indicating the sense of the citizens, and thus the Representatives can be reassured of the changed tone of the masses and their desire fer peace, concession and nationality.

From Lincoln's home comes despatches that he will sooner die than consent to any of the measures of conciliation and peace The man seems to be small-minded enough to think such a course in relation to the condition of his own country is grand and meritorious! Let him study the characters of Washington, Jackson, and other patriots of the past. Men of mind and firm in purpose, they were ever conciliatory in settling disturbing questions among our own people. These traits were a part of their greatness. How widely different with Abraham Lincoln! He does not appear to be man enough, nor statesman enough, for a crisis so momentous as this; or, he desires to crowd out every slave State.

A correspondent of the Hartford Times, writing from South Windsor, states that the Rev. Dow Bentley, of that town, took up in his pulpit the President's proclamation for Fast on the Sabbath previous to the fast, and without reading it, threw it on the floor, rubped his foot across it, and remarked, "if the President would go down South and kill some of the secessionists, I would pray and fast for seven days." It is the acts and teachings of Abolition fanatics of this class that is the prime cause of all our existing difficulties. A minister of this stamp is truly a "wolf in on the livery of heaven to serve the devil in.

H. B. Harrrison, Esq., of New Haven, who drafted the Nullification Law of this State is said to be strongly in favor of its rehis senses" at this late day. In taking this position, he shows that he is not in the least disturbed at the threatenings and thunders of the Abolitionist of the Standard. CONGRESS.

On Thursday, in the Senate, there was protracted debate. A petition signed by 25,000 citizens of New York, praying for the passage of the Border State resolutions, was presented. Mr. Seward asked that the conclusion of the Special Committee, in regard to the views they desire to present, be read at the Secretary's desk. After they were read he delivered an address, in which he said that 63,000 of the inhabitants of New York have signed the appeal to the Senate. He expressed the opinion that the petition presented was a fair exponent of the interest which is felt by the whole commercial interest of the United States and in any other part of the world; and that it showed "a perfectly commendable and satisfactory spirit." He contended that the controversy would be sheep's clothing," a demagogue who "puts peaceably settled and settled for the Union; and if not settled within the sixty or ninety days from the opening of the session, as has been promised, still he was convinced that there would be time, even after the expiration of ninety days, for the restoration of all that had been lost, and for the re-establishpeal. Glad to learn that he has "come to ment of all that is in danger. Everything, he said, is to subside and pass away before Union; the admission of Kansas settled all that is vital or important in the question. We cannot follow Mr. S. through all the phases of the speech, covering, as it does, so many points; but it is plain that though the Union must and shall be saved, according to his theory, he by no means tells us how and what policy of compromise he favors, although he intimates the following programme To speak; to vote; the use of money; war; and a submission of the whole controversy to the people of the United States in a convention, called according to the forms of the Constitution. Mr. Mason, of Virginia, pointed out the deficiencies of Mr. Seward's remarks, and asked if any suggestions from him complied with any demands? A sharp debate then ensued between the two, and Mr. Douglas followed in some remarks, saying that he desired peace and the maintenance of the Union. He was followed by Mr. Hale of New Hampshire, and Mr. Wigfall of Texas. In the House, the Judiciary Committee was instructed to inquire whether Martin F. Conway has been legally and constitutionally elected a Representative to Congress from his State. The Committee on Ways and Means non-concurred in the Senate's Amendment to the Deficiency bill, appropriating \$300,000 to ratify the pro visional contracts with Mr. Ambrose Thompson, to secure the United States certain valuable privileges in the province of Chiriqui. The Senate Amendments to the Deficiency Appropriation were taken up in Committee of the Whole. Without concluding action on the subject, the Com mittee rose, and Mr. Adams of Mass., made a speech on the Report of the Committee of Thirty-three.
