

Pekin is not nearly so large or so densely populated as we have always been led o believe. It has little or no suburbs. The inhabitants certainly pack very closely, but then the houses are only one story, and every one has some pretensions to a garden behind it. The grounds of the Winter Palace and the beautiful park round the temple of Heaven are each several square miles in extent, while the different yamuns, or houses, of the numerous nobles and mandarins take up acres upon acres each, so that the ground occupied by the general pop-ulation is comparatively small. The Winter Palace no one has been allowed to see, and the only two other redeeming points about Pekin which save it from being contemptible to a stranger are its walls and the Temple of Heaven. As you approach the city the walls have a very imposing and grand effect; they are built of a gray looking brick, and rise sixty-two feet high; large square bastions stand out about every quarter of a mile at the top; the walls are seventeen paces thick. with a parapet pierced with loopholes for gingals, but not for guns. Over each gatevay there rises a massive structure, with four tiers of portholes, like a man of war, forty-eight in front and sixteen on each gable. At the four corners of the walls these towers have only two faces, with sixty-four portholes in each. There are no guns in them, however, the holes being filled up with a shutter, on which the muzzle of a gun is painted. Indeed, there are only three our on the walls altogether. The view f the top over the city is very striking. Owing to your elevated position you see little man than a forest of trees, a few straight lines of streets, the tops of josshouses, pagoda of the Temple of Heaven, and the Winter Palace, it. It is about half a mile in length, reventee building, but a good-natured priest open

built upon a high artificial mound, with the walls running all round. When once a place is built in China it seems as if it was sup-posed to take care of itself for ever afterwards, no attempt being made to repair the ravages of time or use, and the consequence is that these fine walls are fast falling into ruin. The Temple of Heaven is a magnif-icent structure, situated in the centre of the Chineze city, and surrounded by a walled park with its avenues of old trees crossing in all directions; one leads directly from the entrance-gate for about a mile to the foot of an inclined plane, which takes you to a terrace hidden by the trees until you are upon paces wide, and about twenty feet high, and paved with slabs of white marble. On reaching the top on your right stands the Temple of the Earth, a beautiful building in itself, but completely eclipsed by that of Heaven on the left. For some reason or other the doors were closed, and we were obliged to conte ourselves with only walking round the earthly gateway of that of Heaven for us. You enter its portals of beautifully-sculptured mar-ble, and come into a large enclosure, in the middle of which is a raised platform, approached all round by steps. From this the temple, or pagoda, rises in all its beauty.—
It is about one hundred and fifty feet high, and has three steps of roofs, exquisitely proportioned to its size. Inside it forms octagonal room about sixty feet in diameter, containing the alter and chairs of State for the Emperor and his family, no one else being supposed to worship here. The walls inside are composed of brilliant blue and green enamel and gold; eight very graceful pillars, carved in bas-relief, support the first roof, and the whole is lighted h which are scarcely seen from the floor.-The outside is encased in blue and green enamel tiles, and is a perfect picture of quie and repose. There is no joss or figure side the temple but in some houses enclosure there are a great many. The Emperor visit this temple once a year, especially to plough and sow grain, to show he still retains the simplicity of life of his ancestors. He is very lame, having nearly lost the use of both legs; in all his apart-

ments at the Summer Palace pairs of co es were found. It has been estimated that the amount of property pillaged and destroyed, is about \$30,000,000. On entering the Emperor's particular residence no one knew what to take; silver was thrown away to take up gold, and gold to take up jewelled watches and gems, china and ens manufacture of which is lost,-of priceless value, were broken because too bulky to carry away. Rooms and rooms full of co silks, bronzes, jade-stone ornar presents received by the Emperors, every article being labelled with the name of the donor, were ruthlessly looted and destroyed. Much more has been buried beneath the ruins, however, than was carried away.

A CURIOUS DISCOVERY IN THE CHINESE EMPEROR'S PALACE.—A correspondent writes: "Among the most curious discoveries made by the Allies in the Chinese Emperor's Summer Palace was a suit of most mag-nificent armor, inlaid with gold, and the helmet surmounted with an enormous pearlthis suit is to be sent to the Emperor Napoleon ; a saloon furnished in exact in tion of the style of Louis XV., decorated with portraits of the ladies of the court of that sovereign, the name of each lady be cribed at the bottom of the fra pribed at the bottom of the frame. The numerse apartments were furnished and ornamented in the most splendid ma and contained numerous articles in bronze, porcelain, &c., all covered with a thick coating of dust. Among the porce were some immense vases which had more than a century at the bottom of sea, and to which marine vegetation had clung in such a manner as to produce the most singular ornaments. Gold and silver statues, representing the fanatastic incarna-tions of Buddha, were in great numbers. Of silks, velvets, linens, carpets and other tissues, for the most part spoiled through neglect, there were enough to cover the walls of a palace larger than the Louvre or Tuileries. This favorite dwelling of the Tartar sovereign stood in the imperial domain of Yuen-ming Yuon, which comprised an extent of nearly eight miles each way.

gar, beaten with the yolks of six eggs—the whites of six eggs beaten to a froth; these beat all together; add three cups of sifted flour, one cap of water, and three teaspoonfuls of Lea-ven; flavor with two teaspoonfuls of essence of lemon, and bake in a quick oven.

JUMBLES.—Sift together one quart of flour and three tes spoonfuls of Leaven; rub in one teacupful of butter; add cup and a half of white sugar, and spice to suit the taste mir stiff enough to roll out, and bake quick. COP CAKE.—Five cups of flour and three teaspoonfuls of Leaven, sifted together; add, one cup of butter, two of sugar, and two eggs, all well beat together; mix with milk; ther add a cup of currants, and spice to suit the taste. Bake about half an hour. LADIES' CAKE.—Three quarters of a pound of flour and four teaspoonfuls of Leaven sited together; one pound of sugar and six ounces of butter beaten to a cream: the white of eighteggs well beaten, and the juice of one lemon; mix with milk




