

We append a few recipes, but it may be used with grea advantage in all other kinds of cake, also in fruit pudding and other pastry. and other pastry.

BREAKFAST AND TEA ROLLS.—Two or three to spoonfuls of Leaven (according to the quality of the flour, one quart of flour mix thoroughly by passing two or three times through a selve: rub in a piece of butter of half the size of an egg, and make the paste with cold milk or water, (milk is preferable,) barely stiff enough to permit rolling out. Much kneading should be avoided. Cut into desired form, and place immediately in a hot oven and bake quickly. LOAF BREAD.—The same proportions of Leaven and flou silted together as above; omit the butter, and make the past stiff enough to knead into a loaf, and bake immediately in

Bake about half an hour.

Three or four huntsmen, each armed with a
double-barreled gun get into a troika, which is a sort of a carriage drawn by three horses, its name being derived from its team, and from its form. rope, or a chain-for greater security-son

A pig is tied to the rear of the vehicle by a twelve yards long. The pig is kept in the vehicle until the huntsmen reach the forest where the hunt is to take place, when he is taken out and the horses started. The pig notb eing accustomed to this gait, squeals and his squeals brings out the wolves—all posting after the pig as fast as they can go, fighting among themselves for the best places, snapping and striking at the pig at every opportunity, who squeats with despair. These squeals of agony arouse the wolves in the forest, and the troika is soon followed by an immense flock. The horses have an instinctive horror of wolves, and run as fast as

they can go.

The huntsmen fire as fast as they can load; there is no necessity to take any aim. The pig squeals, the horses neigh, the wolves howl, the guns rattle. As long as the driver commands his horses, as fast as they may be running away, there is no danger. But, if he ceases to be master of them; if they balk, if troiks is upset, there is no hope, nothing will remain of the party but the wreck of the troiks, the barrels of the guns, and the larger bones of the huntsmen, driver and

Last winter Prince Repihe went on one of these hunts and it came very near being his last hunt. He was on a visit with two of his friends to one of his estates near the steppe, and they determined to go on a wolf hunt.— They prepared a large sleigh in which three persons could move at ease; three vigorous horses were put into it, and they selected for a driver a man born in the country and thoroughly experienced in the sport. Every huntsman had a pair of double barrel guns, and one hundred and fifty ball cartridges. It was night when they reached the steppe—an immense prairie covered with snow. The

moon was full, and shone brilliantly. The pig was put out of the sleigh and the horses whipped up. As soon as the pig felt that he was dragged he began to squeal. A wolf or two appeared; but they were timid and kept a long way off. Their numbers gradually increased, and, as they gained in strength they became bolder. We repeat, that, with such a law in successful operation in Connecticut, no slave owners would dare to follow their slaves into that State and assert their claims there, and, even if they were to be so foolhardy as to do so, they could find no "credible witnesses" foolhardy enough to incur the danger of going with them to testify for them. The General Assembly of Connecticut have passed this law with the avowed design of nullifying the fugitive slaves lescaping into non-slaveholding States. We earnestly hope, that, if an opportunity occurs, some slave owner will incur the risk of martyrdom by defying it and oputing it to the test. On Tuesday in the Senate a resolution, providing for counting the votes of President and Vice President, in the usual mode, was passed. The Loan bill was taken up and after discussion also passed. The President's Message was discussed by Mr. Johnson of Tenn. who opposed secession, satirized the speeches of the seceding Senators from Louisiana, and held that traitors are entitled to their reward. He gave way to a motion to adjourn, when a Message was received from the President stating that he had received from the Governor of Kentucky resolutions making application to Congress to call a Convention to present amendments to the Constitution. The President expressed his approval of this plan, on account of the patriotic source, as well as from the great mportance of the subject. In the House, Mr. Taylor, of Louisiana, sent to the Clerk's table the ordinance of secession from that State which was read. He then announced his intention of withdrawing from the House, and proceeded to discuss the question of war and peace. Mr. Sickles asked him if the war had not already been commenced by blockades, seizure of the United States forts and a public vessel of the United States, and by the spoliation of the public monies. Mr. Taylor, of Louisiana, asserted that it was the purpose of that State to assert the right of revolution and take the attitude of a sovereign State. Points of order were raised because Mr Taylor, who was not a member of the House, was justifying the seizure of forts and money of the United States. Mr. Bouligny, also of Louisiana, made an explanation to the effect that he had received no official information of the passage of an ordinance of secession in Louisiana; that he was not elected by the Convention; had nothing to do with their action, and should not obey their instructions. He further stated another reason for disagreeing with his co-Representatives, which was, that he was the only member of Congress elected from his State as an American Union man, and to this principle he should stand forever. When official intelligence had been received, he should resign his seat ; and after which he will still continue a Uinon men.
