

HOW TO USE IT. He next took three glass balls, about an inch in diameter, and placing them singly between his lips, sucked them into his mouth and swallowed first a red one, then a blue, and last of all a white one; here was a little interude of tooth-picks and talking, after which he walked gravely round the ring, stopping four times; each time he gave himself a shake and a jump, when the balls were distinctly heard to jingle inside him. 
