CUP CAKE.—Five cups of flour and three teaspoonfuls or Leaven, sifted together; add, one cup of butter, two of sugar, and two eggs, all well beat together; mix with milk; then add a cup of currants, and spice to suit the taste. NENATOR DOUGLAS CONDEMNS
CORRCION.

We have the pleasure in reproducing from the official report of Mr. Douglas' recent speech in the Senate, that portion of his remarks which relates to the course to be pursued by the General Government toward seceding States. His unqualified repudiation of force, as a means of preserving or restoring the Union, invests with interest and importance the reasoning which led him to that conclusion. Upon this subject, Mr. Doug-

las says : We are told that the authority of the Government must be vindicated; that the Union must be preserved; that rebellion must be put down; that insurrections must be suppressed, and the laws must be enforced. gree to all this. I am in favor of doing all these things according to the Constitution and the laws. No man will go further than I to maintain the just authority of the Government to preserve the Union to ment, to preserve the Union, to put d rebellion, to suppress insurrection, and to enforce the laws. I would use all the power conferred by the Constitution for this purpose. But, in the performance of these important and delicate duties, it must be borne in mind that those powers only must be used and such measures employed as are authorized by the Constitution and the laws. Things should be called by their right names; and facts whose existence can no longer b denied, should be acknowledged.

Insurrections and rebellions, although unlawful and criminal, frequently become suc-cessful revolutions. The strongest govern-ments and proudest monarchies on earth have often been reduced to the humiliating necessity of recognizing governments de facto, although not de jure, in their revolted States and provinces, when rebellion has ripened into successful revolution, and the national authorities have been expelled from their limits. In such cases, the right to regain possession and exact obedience to the aws remains; but the exercise of that right is war, and must be governed by the laws of war. Such was the relation of Great Britain and the American colonies for seven years after the Declaration of Independence. The rebellion had progressed and matured into a revolution, with a government de facto, and an army and navy to defend it. Great Britain, regarding the complaints of the colonies as unfounded, refused to yield to their de-mand, and proceeded to reduce them to obedience; not by the enforcement of the laws, but by military force, armies and navies, according to the rules and laws of war. Cap tives taken with arms in their hands fig against Great Britain, were not executed like traitors, but held as prisoners of war, and exchanged according to the usage of civilized nations. The laws of nations, the principles of humanity, of civilization and Chris emanded that the government de facto shou be acknowledged and treated as such. While the right to prosecute war for the purpose of reducing the revolted colonies to obedience remained, yet it was a military remedy, and could only be exercised according to the es

tablished principles and usages of war.

It is said that, after one of the earliest er gagements, the British general threatened to execute as traitors all the prisoners he had taken in battle; and that General Washington replied that he, too, had taken some pris oners, and he would shoot two for one until the British General should respect the laws of war, and treat his prisoners accordingly. How are you to comply with the Constitution in respect to a jury trial, where there are no men qualified to serve on the jury ? that the laws should be en agree that the laws should be entorced. I hold that our Government is clothed with all the power necessary to the enfor the laws, according to the Constitution and laws. The President is sworn to the faithful performance of this duty.

But we are told that secession is wrong, and that South Carolina had no right to ecede—but she has done it. She has d her independence of us, effsced the last vestige of our civil authority established a oreign government, and is now engaged in the preliminary steps to open diplomatic in-tercourse with the great powers of the world. What next? If her act was illegal, uncon titutional and wrong, have we no rem Unquestionably we have the right to use all the power and force necessary to regain possession of that portion of the United States, in order that we may again enforce our laws and Constitution upon the States, Territories and places only which are in our possession. It often happens that the territorial rights of a country extend beyond its actual possession. That is our case at resentlin respect to South Care right of jurisdiction over that State for Federal purposes, according to the Constitu-tion, has not been destroyed or impaired by the ordinance of secession, or any act of the the ordinance of secession, or any act of the convention, or of the de facto government. The right remains; but the possession is lost for the time being. "How shall we regain possession?" is the principal inquiry. I may be done by arms, or by a peaceable adjustment to settle the controversy.

# NEWS SUMMARY.

Farmer, the New York practical philan thropist, feeds 500 to 700 persons every night at his free dining saloon. He is a hard working plumber and an independent but not rich man. The excess of his income over his family expenses is devoted to charity. During the distressing winter which followed the panic of 1857, he furnished food daily for a period of four months to all who called upon him, and in time gave away no less than 230,803 meals of good and whole some food, at an aggregate cost to himself of about \$20,000. He fed all who came to his house, supplied at their own homes 1.084 families, and 811 sick persons, and better than all, during the winter he found employment for 1161 mechanics and laborers.

The San Francisco Herald says that the day after Christmas last a lady in that city became mother to a fine and healthy girl child There is nothing startling in this fact, nor calculated to excite comment. As usual mother and child did well, and progressed in health and strength. But two weeks afterward the same lady was again the mother of a child, a fine boy, who is also flourishing, as well as the doubly-taxed mother. This circumstance, although of extreme rarity, being probably the second well ascertained case of the kind in the United States, is one which is known to medical men as having occurred before, and is accounted for upon clearly-ascertained physical grounds.
