



BREAKFAST AND TEA ROLLS.—Two or three to spoonfuls of Leaven (according to the quality of the flour, one quart of flour mix thoroughly by passing two or three times through a seive; rub in a piece of outter of half the size of an egg, and make the paste with cold milk or water (milk is preferable,) barely stiff enough to permit rolling out Much kneading should be avoided. Gut into desired form, and place immediately in a hot oven and bake quickly.

TIGER CHASE BY BABOONS. The following account of a tiger-chase is

extracted from the North Lincoln Sphinx, a regimental paper published at Graham's Town. The writer, after alluding to his sporting experiences of all kinds, and in all parters of the globe, declares that he never vitnessed so novel or intensely exciting chase as that about to be described : Not long ago, I spent; a few days at

Fort Brown, a small military post on the banks of the Great Fish River, where my Friend W. was stationed. One evening, as my friend and I were returning home after a somewhat fatiguing day's buck-shooting, we were startled by hearing the most extraordinary noises not far from us. It seemed as if all the demons in the infernal regions had been unchained, and were amusing themselves by trying to frighten us poor mortals by their horrid yelling. Our excitement in the chase, as you may expresse, was intense. On went the tiger, making for the river, the baboons following like avenging demons, and evidently gaining ground on their nearly exhausted foe, though their exulting yells seemed each moment to increase his terror and speed. They reached the stream, the tiger still a few yards in adnimself into its muddy waters, and made for the opposite bank. The next moment his s. in admirable confusion, were struggling after him, and as the tiger—now fear-fully exhausted—clambered on the land again the largest and strongest of the baboons were close at his heels, though many of the packthe old, the very young, and the weakly—were still struggling in the water. All these creatures, for miles round, assemble and pursue their enemy with relentless fury to his death. Sometimes the chase lasts for days ; but it invariably closes with the destruction of the tiger-a striking instance that the idea of retributive justice is not confined to man alone. Such men are cravens. They may vaunt themselves as they please, among their cringing partizans of the North. Still they are cowards. They are not true lovers of their whole country. The first idea of true, manly Christian patriotism is not theirs. They are too narrow, too selfish, to be deserving of full consideration and although they can make much trouble, they do no good. tablished. Jefferson Davis elected President, an Alexander H. Stephens Vice President. The report is confirmed that the Congress of the seceded States, now in session at Montgomery, Alabama, adopted the Constitution of the United States by a unanimous vote on the 8th inst., together with all laws of the United States, in force on the first of November, including the laws prohibiting the African Slave Trade, to which an amendment was added, prohibiting the introduction of slaves from any State not a member of the Confederacy.

On Saturday, the 9th, the Congress proceeded to the election of President and Vice President for the Provisional Government, and made choice of Jefferson Davis for President and Alexander H. Stephens for Vice President, each by a unanimous vote.

A committee of three Alabama deputies was appointed to inquire and report on what terms suitable buildings in Montgomery, for the use of the several executive departments of the confederacy under the Provisional Government, could be had.

A resolution was adopted authorizing the appointment of a committee to report a constitution for the permanent government of the confederacy. A committee was appointed to report on a flag, a seal, a coat of arms and a motto for the Southern Confederacy. The President was directed to appointed committees on Foreign Affairs, on Finance, on Military and Naval Affairs, on Postal Affairs, on Commerce

A resolution was adopted instructing the Committee on Finance to report promptly a England being placed on the same footing as those of England, France and Germany, instead of having an advantage of some thirty per cent., as heretofore in the Southern States. For this our manufacturers may thank Greeley, Ward Beecher, and their Abolition Republican nullifiers of the Censtitution, slanderers of the Southern people, aiders and abettors of insurrections and dissolvers of the Union.

Among the articles added to the Constitution was the following:

The government hereby instituted shall take immediate steps for the settlement of all matters between the States forming it and their late confederates of the United States in relation to the public property and public debt at the time of their withdrawal from them, these States hereby declaring it to be their wish and earnest desire to adjust everything pertaining to the common property, common liabilities and common obligations of that Union upon principles of right, justice, equity and good faith.

Immediately after the announcement that the Provisional Government had been completed by the election of President and Vice President, a grand salute of one hundred guns was fired from Capitol Hill, and great rejoicings were manifested by the people. Mr. Stephens being a member of the Congress, was honored with a grand evening serenade. at his quarters, in front of which a large crowd of people assembled. To this he responded in an eloquent speech followed by Chesnut and Keitt of South Carolina, Conrad of Louisiana, and others, in speeches of great power and eloquence, which were rapturously



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
