The gorillas are far more than a match for him, when unassisted by weapons. Dr. Du Chailu is probably the first and only white man who has dared to wage war with gorillas.
> The apes of Borneo and Sumatra are infants in comparison with them. The far-famed chimpanzee is a great docile creature which can never be named in the same day with the granting severe of Central Arises. gigantic savage of Central Africa, Think of it! The gorilla is six feet two inches in height, and three feet between the shoulderblades. The paw is that of a giant-three times the size of a human hand. The finger measures six inches in circumference at the base. There is an immense ridge run perpendicularly over the cranium; this and the great jaws are packed with muscles of prodigious strength. The creature has huge arms, altogether disproportioned to the body. It has black hair, and has a matted look on its head, which it has the power of bringing over its face. TOMATOES.—Mode of Culture.—Germinate in a hot-house, hot-bed or kitchen; for very early fruit, transplant when quite small into pots. The Tomato improves by every transplanting, and each time should be set deeper. From the time four or six leaves appear, pinch or out off the larger lower leaves and the terminal buds, and continue this pro-cess of pruning till the fruit is far advanced; so that, when ripe, the bud will seem to be covered by one mass of large, smooth, even sized tomatoer, of the richest pomegranate color—and the leaves hidden by the truit. Set plants three or four inches apart, in the warmest spot you have, and let them fall over to the northern frames twelve or fifteen inches high, or on pea brush. or anything to sustain them, and keep the fruit from touch-ing the ground, which delays ripening, cre-ates meuld, invites cut-worms, and always gives the Tomato an earthy taste. Try for only one cluster—the first that blossome and cut everything else gradually away. This will give you tomatoes in perfection in the latitude of Buffalo, four or six weeks earlier than they are usually ripened in our cli-mate. If you wish late tomatoes, pull up each plant by the root—just before the frost comes—and hang them up on the south side of the building, top down, with a blanket to roll up days and let fall nights. When ice makes, hang them in any room that does not freeze, or in a dry cellar, and you will have fresh tomatoes all winter—somewhat shrivelled, but of fine flavor.

COLORS IN TREES.—A chemist of Lyon announces that the coloring matter of any tree may be known by the color of its fruit, and advises the boiling of the bark with lime, in water, when a precipitate will be formed of the same color as its fruit. Several of the new vegetable dyes have been discovered by this simple process.

ARTICLE 1. That all territory of the United States shall be divided by a line from east to west, on the parallel of 36 degrees 30 minutes north latitude : and in all territory north of that line involuntary servitude except in punishment of crime, is prohibited whilst it shall belong to the United States or be under a Territorial Government; and in all territory south of said line involuntary servitude is recognized as it exists in the Southern States of the Union, whilst such Territory shall belong to the United States, or be under a Territorial Government; and neither Congress nor the Territorial Government shall have power to hinder or prevent emigrants to said territory from taking with them persons held to labor or involuntary service, according to the laws and usages of the State from which such persons may be taken, nor to impair the right arising out of said relations, and be subject to judicial cognizance; the United States courts of such Territory shall have jurisdiction thereof, and those rights shall be protected by the courts and all the departments of the Territorial Government, under or according to the laws of the State f: hich the person bound to such service n... have been taken; and when any territor, north or south of said line, within such boundary as Congress may prescribe, shall contain a population required for a member of Congress, according to the then Federal ratio of representation of the people of the United States, it may, if its form of government be republican, be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original States, with or without involuntary servitude or labor, as the Constitution of such new State may provide.

ART. 2. That no territory shall hereafter be acquired by the United States without the concurrence of a majority of the Senators of the States north of Mason and Dixon's line, and also a majority of the Senators south of said line; but no treaty by which territory shall be acquired shall be ratified without the two thirds vote of the Senators, as required by the Constitution.

ART. 3. That the Constitution, and no amendment thereof, shall be construed to give Congress power to regulate, abolish, or control, within any State or Territory of the United States, the relation established or recognized by the laws thereof touching bound to labor or involuntary service therein, nor to interfere with or abolish involuntary service in the District of Columbia without the consent of Maryland and Virgina and the owners, or without making the owners who do not consent, previously, full ensation; nor the power to interfere with or abolish involuntary service in places under the exclusive jurisdiction of the United States within those States and Territories where the same is established or recognized: nor the power to prohibit the removal or transportation of persons held to labor or involuntary service in any State or Territory of the United States, to any other State or Territory thereof, where it is established or recognized, nor to authorize a specific tax or any higher rate of taxes on persons bound to labor, than on land in proportion to value; nor to authorize any of the African race or their descendants to become citizens, or to exercise the right of suffrage in the choice of

ART. 4. That hereafter the paragraph of the fourth article of the Constitution shall not be construed to prevent any of the States, by appropriate legislation, and through the action of their judicial and ministerial officers, from enforcing the delivery of fugitives from labor from any other State or Territory of the United States to the person to whom such service or labor is due. Arr. 5. The emigration, or importation of

by appropriate legislation to enforce the pro of this article.

ART. 6. That the first, second, third and fifth articles of these amendments, and the third paragraph of the second section of the first article of the Constitution, and the third paragraph of the fourth article thereof, shall amended or abolished without the consent of all the States.

STARVATION IN KANSAS. From the accounts we receive there is

settlers in that district of country are suffering from want of food and clothing sufficient to make them comfortable. Some accounts say there are fifty thousand experiencing all the horrors of starvation. This is Thad. Hyatt's statement, we believe-a man whose word, in our opinion, is not worth much, in any thing that relates to Kansas. The cause of this state of things is attributed to a long drought, which destroyed the crops of the people. Of the fact of the drought, we have no evidence to disprove-but we suspect that is not the sole cause of the existing destitution. The Abolition Emigrant Aid Societies, ever since Kansas was organized as a Territory, have been actively engaged in enticing and crowding people into that Territory .-This has been done, partly for political and partly for money-making purposes-they being owners, it is said, of large tracts of lands, which have been laid out in village lots, farms, &c., for speculation. Large numbers, if not most of these people, went there without the requisite capital, farming implements, and other articles necessary to sustain themselves in such an enterprise; and, indeed, without knowing much about the real character and peculiarities of the country. Hundreds and thousands were induced to go upon representations in regard to gold digging, at which business they were led to believe fortunes ritory of the United States, whether for residence or involuntary service, is forever induced by the glowing descriptions published by land agents and owners of town lots, rai road grants &c. By these and other devices, a rushing tide of emigration was got up and poured into the country-so large that they devoured every thing as they went along, like the swarms of locusts, "we read of"unprepared to live or support themselves, except "from hand to mouth." When the season for raising crops was present, thousands who should have been tilling the soil, were engaged, we suspect, in prospecting for gold, or building towns, cities, villages, and railroads on paper; and when the winter came on, it found them destitute of food and other necessaries of life, and in too many instances. we doubt not, destitute of gold, with which to buy sufficient to supply their wants. The result shows, that the setlement of our new Territories cannot thus be forced without ruin, distress, and possibly starvation to thousands, who in such cases, are induced to go unprepared for the vicissitudes and casualties,

An adjourned meeting of the Fairfield County Agricultural Society was held at the Sterling House in this city on Tuesday after noon. The old Premium List was revised so that the premiums offered for the next Annual Fair amount to \$1,100.

Some amendments were made to the rules. It was voted that the payment of one dollar shall entitle the person to membership, a free admission to the grounds during the Fair and six single tickets for the holder's family. It was voted that the price for admission of horses and carriages to the grounds, be twenty cents for a single, and thirty cents for a double team, in addition to the regular entrance fee for each person. It was voted that the next annual Fair be held at Bridgeport on the 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th, of September.

We trust that those who have not already subscribed, will at once do so; and in a measure retrieve the reputation that we have lest for energy and enterprise.

MATTERS SOUTH.

The Texas Convention has passed an ordinance favoring the formation of a Southern Confederacy, and has elected seven delegates to the Southern Convention at Montgomery,

The Southern Congress at Montgomery, Alabama, Tuesday, in secret session, adopted a resolution declaring that the new government takes under its charge the questions and difficulties existing between the States of the confederacy and the United States, relative to the forts, arsenals, and other public establishnents. We shall, therefore, have no collision by the secessionists at any of the points threatened, until a formal declaration of war is made by the Southern Congress, unless the federal government take the initiative steps. A resolution directing inquiry as to the propriety of sending Commissioners to Washing ton, was referred to the Committee on Foreign doubt, we think, that a large number of the Relations.

WASHINGTON NEWS, &c.

Suspicion is expressed by conservative members of the Peace Congress in Washington at the fanatical action of the Wisconsin Legislature, in filling up stheir commission with Republican members of the Senate and House, and excluding Judge Larrabee, the only conservative member from that State .-The action of Maine and Pennsylvania is alo condemned, for the fanatical policy in appointing all ultra Republicans. The repreentatives from these States will undoubtedly retard and possibly defeat any adjustment -It will thus be seen that the radical Republicans are determined to defeat a peaceable ettlement of affairs, if possible, by breaking up the Peace Congress.

THE CABINET. It appears to be understood as settled that Mr. Cameron, of Pennsylvania, is to be Secetary of the Treasury under Mr. Lincoln, in spite of all the efforts of Greeley and his confederates to defeat him. Hon. Wm. A. Graham, of North Carolina, (another gentlenan well spoken of by the Tribune for a seat in the Cabinet.) writes that he has never been offered an appointment by Mr. Lincoln, and would decline if he should. So far as publicly known, therefore, Messrs. Seward, Bates and Cameron are the only Cabinet officers yet appointed by Mr. Lincoln-all opposed to the policy of Greeley—who is especially down on cess. ward and Cameron and will soon, it is thought, be out openly against Old Abe's administration.

Lincoln's speeches in railroad stations -his sneers at "professional Union-lovers." and his doctrine that a State has no greater rights than a country, reflect no credit upon him. "Pray for me," he says to the baggagemen, hackmen, and gathered crowd; and with a tiger yell they respond, " we will pray for you." If their prayers are not successful, we would respectfully suggest to the fanatical demagogue that he employ the Abolition parson in this city to intercede, who is sure that he is right, and that God and he make a majority. HOUSE. WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Prayer by the Chaplain. He implored a blessing on the out-going administration. May it close its labors in peace, without further violence and without any stain of blood, and we pray for the incoming administration, that blessings may rest on the President elect on his journey hitherward, and that he may be peacefully and happily inaugurated, and afterwards administer the governmeni in a pure, wise, and prudent manner.

Seerman sent up Dix's letter urging speedy measures to relieve the pressing demands on the treasury, and reported a bill authorizing the President, in place of any part of the loan, to issue coupon bonds of denominations not exceeding six per centum interest and running twenty years, and apply such bonds at par to creditors, who may receive the entire amount not to exceed that authorized by the recent Loan Act.

He then opened the package of electoral votes of Maine and handed it to the tellers' when the certificate thereof was read, the Secretary of the Senate making a note thereof. The electoral votes of New Hampshire' Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticus Vermont and New York were summarily disposed of.

Douglas suggested-and no objection was made-that the formal part of the certificates and the names of electors should be omitted from reading.

Reading the vote of South Carolina pro duced a good-humored excitement.

The reading of all the votes were completed when Breckinridge announced that Abraham Lincoln, of Illinois, having received a majority of the whole number of Electoral votes, is duly elected President of the Uni-4th of March, 1861. 
