

PAY THE OWNERS.

It is plain to be seen that such a law as this would have a good effect. The Philadelphia Ledger says nothing so effectually put a stop to the mobs got up in former days, in that city, against the Abolitionists, as the passage of a law requiring the county to pay the cost of the property damaged. Under this law Pennsylvania Hall, burned down by an anti-Abolition mob, was paid for out of the County Treasury. A Catholic church burned in the time of the Native American riots, was paid for in the same way. So soon as the tax-pay ers began to find these public amusements were growing expensive, they provided a police force to put a stop to them. A law which shall make the county liable for the value of a slave, when he escapes through the interference of the citizens, would put a practical obstacle to the operation of any Personal Liberty Bill.
