

BOOK NOTICES, &C.

FAST DAY SERMONS; or the Pulpit on the State of the Country: New York; Rudd & Carleton. This volume is composed of the most marked discourses called forth by the present state of the country. It comprises the opposite extremes of opinion—the South as well as the North being fully represented. It embraces the strong disunion sermons of Dr. Thornwell of South Carolina, and Dr. Palmer, of New Orleans; along with the milder and more Christian utterance of the ex cellent Dr. Dabney, of Virginia, and the stern rebuke to secession by Dr. Breckinridge, of Kentucky. Of the ministers of different denominations at the North-Rabbi Raphall argues learnedly for Hebrew slavery and Mr. Van Dyke pours out his just denunciations of the character and influence of Abolitionism-a spirit which he fully believes to be not from above, but from beneath. Dr. Vinton, too, the accomplished minister of Trinity, in stately and flowing speech, reproves the fanatical spirit of the North; while on the other hand, Mr. Beecher, in his usual, sectional, stump-speech style, sets forth the irrepressible conflict, and Dr. Bellows argues that the present strife is nothing more nor less than a war between civilization and barbarism. This miscellaneous collection winds up with a middle-ground discourse by Rev. Dr. Adams, of New York, a pastor who always loves to preach conciliation and peace, and who, while he describes with sad fidelity the present agitation and alarm, closes with words of trust and hope. Such is the character of this very unique collection-one that we believe will be eagerly sought and widely circulated. Such sermons, preached at a crisis like this, have a historical interest, and will be referred to half a century hence as exponents of the differing opinions of our times. STATE ITEMS.

A serious accident occurred to the noen train from New Haven to North ampton Wednesday when about half way between Cheshire and Hitchcock's Station. While in a hollow, caused by two heavy grades, and while pro ceeding at the usual speed, which is always rapid at this place, a broken rail threw the entire train, with the exception of the engine itself, down an embankment, one end of the passenger car landing full forty feet from the track. Hardly a person on the train escaped injury, some of them of a most serious nature. Dr. C. B. Every attention possible was shown to the injured persons. The entire train excepting the engine was completely demolished. The ac cident was entirely unavoidable, as the rail was evidently broken by the engine itself, when it passed over it.

The consideration of the report of the Committee of Thirty-Three was resumed, and Mr. Vallandigham of Ohio, warmly advocated the preservation of the Union. The Senate's smendment to the Navy bill, appropriating \$1,200,000 for the construction of seven sloops of war, came up, and Mr. Garnett of Virginia, offered a proviso forbidding the use of said vessels against States claiming to be without the Federal jurisdiction. A sharp debate followed, in which Messrs. Garnett, of Virginia, Stanton of Ohio, Anderson of Kentucky, Stevens of Pennsylvania, Brown of Kentucky, and others took part, and which resulted in the defeat of Mr. Garnett's mendment and the passage of that of the Senate. WASHINGTON CORRESPONDENCE. WASHINGTON CITY, D. C., ? Jan. 12, 1861.

EDITORS SCHOOL BELL-SIRS :- In my last I gave you a very imperfect account of the city. I will now endeavor to give you a scription of the public buildings. Capitol is situated on a hill a little east of the central part of the city; it is a magnificent structure, composed of white marble.-all of which passed through your city on its way hither. The rotunda is in the center under the dome, the walls of which are decorated with large paintings and portraits of distinuished men,-and amongst others, those of Polk, Tyler, Pierce, Fillmore, and Cass. To the right is the old Hall of Representatives, which is built in the form of a semi-circle, with galleries extending entirely around it. Joined to this is the new wing, in which is the present House, with committee rooms, &c. The new Hall is in the form of a parolelogram, the speaker's desk in the center and the members' seats in the form of a half circle around him; each member has his separate desk and chair. The galleries extend entirely around, and are capable of seating twenty-five hundred people. The Hall is lighted from above, and in the evening presents a beautiful appearance. To which is the same as the old House. It is now used by the Supreme Court. The new Senate is smaller than the House, but is on the same plan, and is considered by some to ndsomer. The whole building is heated by steam on an entirely new plan, which has lately been introduced in the Post

Office building.

The President's house is situated on the avenue, one mile west of the Capitol. It is built of a white stone resembling marble.

The east room is eighty by forty feet, and is upholstered with red. The carpet is woven one piece and is very handsome. Attached is the Green room, which is half the size of the east room, and takes its name from its tering. Next comes the Blue room, which is circular, and is likewise named from e upholstering. The President's office is over the Green room. During the levees, the President stands in the east room and Miss Lane in the Green room. In the rear of the house is a fine lawn, laid out in walks. In the center of the lawn is a fountain, near which the Marine Band play every Wednesday evening; they also play at the Capitol

every Saturday.

The War and Navy Departments are on the left of the President's mansion, and are two-story brick buildings. To the right are situated the State and Treasury Departments; the State Department building is like those of the War and Navy. The Treasury Department is a large granite building, and, next to the Patent office, is the largest here. The Treasury Department has more clerks, but they are not all in the building itself. The Patent office is one of the finest buildings in the world, being built of white marble in the form of a square. It is plain and neat, but at the same time is grand and imposing. The Patent office, General Land office, and Interior Department, are in this building. In the third story is the Model room, which extends around three sides, and, as soon as the building is completed, will extend entirely around the building. Opposite the Patent office is the Post-office Department, It is smaller than the Patent office, and also ins Sixth Auditor's office. The Navy Yard is situated at the end of the avenue, one mile east of the Capitol. This yard is re of a manufacturing yard than the others in the country. They are at present engaged in putting in the engine of the United tes war steamer Pensacola, which was built at Norfolk and has just arrived here. The engine is the finest ever put into any

Mr. Seward made a speech here to-day in the Senate, which was rather conciliatory in its tone. Everything is dull here except politics. People seem to be waiting to see hat will turn up next.
