

HOW TO CURE KICKING HORSES AND RUN How to Cure kicking Horses and Run-AWAYS.—The experiments of Rarey, the horse tamer, and the promulgation of his theory of horse training and management, are bringing before the public much useful knowledge upon this interesting subject. Whatever may help to bring the horse, es-pecially vicious horses, as they are called, more completely under the subjection of man without the necessity of resorting to cruel treatment, ought to be known by all who have treatment, ought to be known by all who have the management of equine quadrupeds. We heard a day or two since, a description of the taming of a kicking horse, and and was an inveterate runaway, by methods so simple and Rereyish that we cannot to publish them for the benefit of he

gists generally. gists generally.

If you have a horse that has a habit, when in harness, of bringing his heels in contact with the dasher, and damaging the vehicle by kicking, proceed as follows: Place around his neck a band like that used for sustaining a riding martingale. Then take two light stress tackle them to the hit on either side. straps buckle them to the bit on either side. pass them through the neck band and thence pass them through the neck band and thence inside the girth, and strap them securely to each fetleck of the hind feet, taking care to have them of the proper length. When a horse is rigged in this manner, if he attempts to "kick up behind" each effort will jerk his head down in such a way as to astonish him and, perhaps, throw him over upon his head. He will make but a few attempts to kick when he finds his head thus tied to his head. when he finds his head thus tied to his he and two or three lessons will cure him alt

The method of reforming a runaway is equally simple and effectual. First of all. fasten some good thick pads upon your horse's knees, then buckle a light strap, through the hame rings or some part of the harness near the shoulder on each side, and lead the straps back to the driver's hand as he sits in the buggy. He has thus four reins in his hand. Start the animal without fear, don't worry him with a strong pull upon the bits, but talk to him friendly. When he at-tempts to run, he must of course bend his foward legs. Now pull sharply on one of the foot reins, and the effect will be to raise one of his forward feet to his shoulder. He is a three legged horse now, and when he has gone on in that way a little distance, drop the constrained foot and jerk up the other. He can't run faster on three legs than you can ride, and when you have tired him on both sides mostly the constraints. both sides pretty thoroughly, or if he refuses to take his trot kindly and to obey your voice and a moderate pull on the bit, you can raise both his fore feet, drop him upon his kneed and let him make a few bounds in that post tion. The animal will soon find that he can't run away; that he is completely in your power, and by soothing words you will also be able to convince him that you are his friend. He will soon obey your commands, and will be afraid to extend himself for a run. Within a week or two, some horses that were quite valuable animals in respect to everything but their bad habits of kicking and running in harness, were cured by the methods de above. The experiments are such as can be made by any person at all accustomed to managing horses, and we hope it may prove serviceable to some of our readers,—Beston Herald.

Those who wish to get on in the world must have a stock of pa-tience and perseverance, or hopeful confi-dence, a willingness to learn, and a disposi-tion not easily east down by difficulties and disappointment.

A MORTAR.—A mortar is a very short can non with a large bore, some of them thirteen inches in diameter, for firing shells. Those in use in our army are set at an angle of for-ty-five degrees, and the range of the shell is varied by altering the charge of powder.— The shell is caused to explode at just about the time that it strikes, by meanes of a fuse, the length of which is adjusted to the time of flight to be occupied by the ball, which, of course, corresponds with the range. The accuracy with which the time of burning of a fuse on he adjusted by varying its bands is fuse can be adjusted by varying its length is surprising; good artillerists generally suc-ceed in having their shells explode almost at the exact instant of striking. In loading a mortar, the shell is carefully placed with the fuse directly forward, and when the piece is discharged, the shell is so completely enveloped with flame, that the fuse is nearly always fired. The fuse is made by filling a wooden cylinder with fuse powder, the cylinder being of sufficient length for the longest range, to be cut down shorter for sherter ranges as required. ranges as required.

To the House, majority and minority reports from the Special Committee of five on the Special Message of the President of January 8th,in reference to the condition of the Navy .were presented. The Committee also pro posed a resolution censuring the Secretary of the Navy, for his conduct in reference to the resignations of officers in Navy. The debate on Mr. Stanton's Volunteer bill was resume by Messrs. Bocock and Howard; but was interrupted by the expiration of the morning hour. The further consideration was postponed until Monday. Mr. Barrett of Mo., spoke on the report of the Committee of Thirty-Three. The Senate bill to provide for the payment of expenses incurred in Oregon and Washington in the suppression of the Indian hostilities in 1855-6 was discussed. The amount appropriated by the Senate bill is \$3,400,000; reduced by the House to less than \$3,000,000. Without definite action, the Senate adjourned until Saturday.

MR. LINCOLN IN PHILADRIPHIA PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 22.-Mr. Lincoln was escorted this morning to Independence Hall, where he received a welcome from Theodore Tyler. Mr. Lincoln responded, saying. "I am filled with deep emotion at finding myself standing in the place where were collected together the wisdom, patriotism, and devotion to principle from which sprang the institutions under which we live. You have kindly suggested that in my hands is the task of restoring peace to the present distracted condition of our country. I can say in return, that any political sentiments I entertain, have been drawn from sentiments originated and given to the world from this Hall. I never had political feelings that did not arise from sentiments embodied in the ration of Independence. I have often ndered on the danger incurred by the men who assembled here and adopted the Declaration of Independence, have pondered over toils endured by officers and soldiers of the army who achieved that independence. I have often enquired of myself what great principle or idea it was that kept this great eracy so long together. It was not the mere matter of separation of the colonies from the mother-land, but that sentiment in the Declaration which gave liberty not alone to the people of this country, but hope to the world in future time. [Applause.] It was that which gave promise that in due time would be lifted from the shoulders of all men. This is the sentiment embodied in the Declartion of Independence--Can this coun try be saved on that basis?

If it can, I will consider myself one of the happiest men in the world if I can help save it. If it cannot be saved upon that principle it will be truly awful, but if this country cannot be saved without giving up that principle I was about to say, I would rather be assassinated on this spot than surrender it. (Applause.) Now in my view of the present aspect of effairs there is no need of bloodshed or war-no necessity for it. I am not in favor of such a course, I may say in advance, unless forced upon the government, and then twill be compelled to act in self-defence. (Appleuse.) I did not expect to be called upon to say a word. I supposed that I was merely to do something towards raising the flag. (Cries of No. no.) but have said nothing but what I am willing to live and die by. He concluded amid great applause by saying that our future is in the hands of the people.


