#### THE REGISTRY LAW-DEMOCRATS BE PREPARED.

The Democracy of the Second District—New Haven and Middlesex Counties—have nominated James E. English, of New Haven, as a candidate for representative to Congress. The district gave Seymour over 1,500 majority last spring, but this was mainly made up of Fernando Wood's bogus voters, who will be cut off this year by the amended registry law. Two years ago Mr. Woodruff received 322 majority over Bishop.—Springfield Republican.

We would call the attention of the Democ racy of Connecticut to this assertion of the Springfield paper that 1,500 voters are to be out off this year in the Second Congressional District, by the amended Registry Law .-The editor, remarks the Hartford Times, has evidently got this idea from some of the Republicans of Connecticut, who intend to make a great deal by their Registry Law. The law provides :-

1.-That the Town Clerk and Selectmen shall be a board of Registration. (Except in the large Towns having special provision.) 2.—That fourteen days before the annual

election, the Board shall make a list of the names of Electors, and twelve days before the election shall deposit the same in the Town Clerk's office and post copies on all the public sign-posts in the Town.

3.-The Board shall meet on the last Monday of March, at 10 A. M., and remain in session till 5 P. M., to correct and revise the list; and said Board "may adjourn from time to time. but shall not be in session after Wednesday of the week next preceding the holding of the election," from 10 A. M. to 5 vere on Mr. Buchanan because he has not have it. P. M. (Except to admit those whose quali- done something to stay the tide of secession. es mature after that time.)

5 .- At the request of any Elector of the Town, the Board shall examine any person applying to be registered, and also require \* the evidence, under oath, of an Elector of the State, that said applicant has resided in the Town at least four months next preceding the election.

6-Persons whose qualifications accrue after the meeting of the Board on the Wednesday previous to the election, must give notice to the Board on or before said Wednesday. that they "intend to apply for admission" the next Monday. And on the day of Election the Board shall sit till 12 o'clock at noon, to admit such applicants, and none

7.-No person shall vote whose name is not on the Registry list, unless he can prove it was on the "original corrected list."

Freemen will remember! That they must be registered at least five days before the election, viz., the Wednesday previous, or their votes will be cut off !

Foreigners will remember! That if their second papers become due after the Wednesday previous to the election, and before noon on election day, they must give notice to the Selectmen, as early as the said Wednesday, of their "intended application." They should remember to get their second papers as soon as possible, and be ready for this Registry List, which was made to trouble them and others.

New Voters must remember ! to be registered in season.

This law was evidently made to deprive voters of their rights. Democrats in every Town should see that all their voters' names are registered in season. Have a careful canvass in good season, so as to be ready for this trap.

We do not believe the Legislature has a right to compel a freeman to see that his name is registered five days before the election, on the penalty of a forfeiture of his vote, which the Constitution guarantees to him on the legal day of election. But let no Democrat run any risk. If his name is not registered five days in advance, the Board will refuse his vote, and it is difficult in such cases to get redress. The Republicans will have all their names registered, and the object imitation of mahogany. of the law is to cut off Democrats who do not see to it. The Republican managers mean that this law shall cut us out of 1.500 votes in a single Congressional District! Demorare! See that your names are entered on the Registry List in season!
