[New York Correspondence of the Sc THE CENTRAL PARK IN NEW YORK

CITY. In modern times we form our op the intelligence and power of the ancie by the character and durability of those wo of art which yet stand as tombstones of departed nations by whom they were recognize the gigantic Pyramid Egypt as the indices of the greatness once powerful nation. The concentration all refinement and art is denoted by the remains of Roman architecture, mag even in their decay. And so will it ever be; the nations of the earth, now in prosperous conditions, will probably be, at some future day, remembered only through history and those memorials which will be transmitted to our descendants. Our own country p but few constructions which are likely to withstand the effects of decay. The grandest achievement of science,—and that which will figure most prominently in the history of the United States,—is the Central Park of

New York. Begun on the most extensive scale, and wanting neither means nor men of intellect to carry out the work in the magnificent manner contemplated, it is destined to be the great result of the efforts of modern a

and skill.

The extent of land appropriated to the Park was originally seven hundred and sixty-eight acres, bounded on the east and west by the Fifth and Eighth avenues, and on the lower and upper extremities by Fifty-minth and One-hundred-and-tenth streets. Recently, however, an extension of seventy-five acres was granted, and the space enclosed five acres was granted, and the space enclosed is therefore eight hundred and forty-three acres—the length of the Park being thirteen thousand five hundred and sixteen feet.

The old Croton Reservoir occupies thirty acres; the new one, in course of construction, one hundred and six acres. The Lakes are supplied from these reservoirs, and the former having been located with picturesque effects, form a beautiful artificial variety to the landscape. The area of the principal Lake,

in summer, is twenty acres.

In order that communication should not be entirely cut off from the business portions of the city on the two sides of the Park several transverse roads (as they are called) run across the Park. These roads are sunken below the general surface of the ground, and in some instances are tunneled th rock. No carts or vehicles employed in the transaction of business are allowed on the Park, and where carriage-roads cross the thoroughfares, bridges are constructed. These bridges are constructed of stone and iron, and are both elegant and durable. That portion of the Park at present completed is called the Ramble. The walks are laid out in a labyrinth, and it is difficult for a stranger to make his way out, if once en-tangled in it, unless aided by the Police.

In excavating, a cave was discovered by one of the workmen, whose foot went down an apeture in the ground. Upon further in-vestigation, this proved to be the entrance to an extensive cavern arched overhead, and the ground floor of which was quite hard. It is now approached at either end through a deep defile, and at one entrance a running stream defile, and at one entrance a running stream ripples past and loses itself in some unknown cavity. Over the causeway leading to this cave a lofty stone arch is erected, making the scene very picturesque and creating a ren

tic effect. Here and there over the Park are " per fect loves" of little cottages, built after Swiss style, and these are occupied by the keepers and their families.

The great architectural feature of the Park will be the Water-terrace. This is now partially completed, and fronts to the north on the Lake south of the Ramble. Fro the entrance to the Park on the lower end, the Terrace is reached by the Mall, which is a double row of elms on either side of a wide walk as hard and smooth as a floor. This walk is one thousand two hundred and two feet long and thirty-five feet wide, and the

number of trees planted on the Mall alone is one hundred and fifty.

The front of the Terrace will be about one hundred and fifty feet on the water, in which the steps will descend. It is built which the steps will descend. It is the clive free-stone, and in the center a large Fountain will be kept in operation. Back of the Fountain is to be a corridor of seven arches, flanked on either side by a long arches, flanked on which marble statues will flight of steps, on which marble sta be placed. At the extremity of the Mall a Tower is to be erected, from which a bird's-eye view of the whole Park will be obtained. Boats or gondolas will be on the Lake, and at the service of the public. The oriental air of the general arrangement cannot fail to be magnificent in the highest degree.

It is probably known by most of your readers that a very valuable present was sent to the Commissioners from the authorities of Hamburg, in a number of large white awans. They unfortunately fell the victims of "disinterested friendship," and of the twelve sent over only two or three remain. It is sent over only two or three remain. It is supposed they were poisoned by eating food which was thrown to them by ladies visiting the Park. Some English swans have been received in their stead, and to guard against an untimely end, they are fed by the keepers with oats, and ladies are prohibited from feeding them under any circumstances. At the close of a sultry summer day it will be delightful beyond comparison to pass for a while from the noise and dust of the city and while from the noise and walk or ride in the quiet enjoyment of nature as here improved by art. In the winter, when the ice on the Lakes is sufficiently strong to admit the weight of the multitude of skaters who throng to the Park, a red ball is hoisted as a signal, and from one to another the watchword of "
up" is caught up with the rapidity of lig
ning, crowds of skaters flock to the pond, s ning, crowds of skaters flock to the pend, and a general carnival lasts till the ball drops and the red flag tells of danger. The ladies are well represented, there being at times five hundred of them; and at night, what other light is needed than that of their sparkling eyes, is supplied by calcium lights and small quil's-eye lanterns secured to the persons of the skaters.

By a very wise forethought the bridges have fortunately been constructed of materials which will defy the efforts of those possessed with this thoughtless propensity to disfigure anything that is beautiful.

The architect comployed is Calvert Vaux, Esq., assisted by J. W. Mould, Esq. Mr. Vaux is now traveling in Europe. The work was commenced in 1857, and in 1859 an appropriation of seventeen millions of dollars made, intended, we believe, to complete the Park. It has already become one of the great attractions of New York, -second,

perhaps, only to "Barnum's Museum."

The average laboring force employed on the
Park is three thousand five hundred men—the aber amounting at times to three thousand six hundred. The number of Police is about eventy-five. They are distinct from the city Police, and their uniform is of gray military cloth, India rubber over-coats, and white silk gleves. They are required to be shaved smooth every other day and to keep them-selves in trim. One of their regulations, which might be well required of the boys in any common school, (except in Bridgeport) that they must "comb their hair and wash their faces at least once every day."

To strangers in New York it might well to remark that the Central Park may be reached by the Sixth and Eighth avenue railroads,-the ride occupying about one heur from their starting point at the corner

of Broadway and Vesey street.

XXXVIII CONGRESS-SECOND SESSION. SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 .- Several petition ere presented. Joint resolution repealing the resolution in

favor of George Fisher, passed. Oregon war debt bill taken up, and Com-

nittee of Conference appointed. Colorado territorial bill taken up, and House amendment agreed to 26 against 16. House.

Various petitions were presented The Volunteer vill was taken up. Howard of Michigan advocated its passage.

Pryor hoped as the Republicans avowed their hostility to the South, they would pass the bill in order that Virginia and the South may be aroused to a sense of the perils which menace them. He challenged them to assume an attitude of hostility corresponding to their bloody designs. He knew the Republicans had resolved to permit the South no other alternative but submission or subjugation. He said the bill was clearly against the letter and spirit of the Constitution.

Curtis replied to Pryor charging that his speech was not made on reason but for effeet on the Virginia Convention. He said Prvor's statement of the existence of another confederacy should induce us to draw around ourselves all the means in our power for our protection, as no Government could exist without power. He said if gentlemen had any affection for their country, now was the time to rally around its standard.

Bennett asked if the Republicans intended reinforcing forts now held and to take the forts now held by the seceding States.

Cartis replied that it was his purpose to support the Constitution as it is. He did not believe it necessary to move an army South until hostilities were carried farther than at present, and it might not be necessary to reinforce the forts in the present exasperated state of the public mind there.

Bennett asked if by enforcing this bill it was not intended to reinforce Southern forts and re-capture property.

Curtie said he would not reply in open session what it would be the duty of the country to do. Curtis said murder came from the other side. Acts from the assassins were not from Republicans against the Government. They were by those speaking in the Executive Chamber and in the Senate.

FROM WASHINGTON. AFFAIRS IN TEXAS.

THE PEACE CONFERENCE. WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 .- The dispatch relative to the surrender of Twiggs was from Commissary Subsestenio. The troops were allowed the use of Government transportation to the seaboard, taking their side arms and three or four cannon. Documents have been received at the War Department, showing that Twiggs entered into negotiations with Texas as early as the 7th mst. for the surrender. Col. Wade some weeks since was appointed successor to Twiggs and chief of the military department, but had not arrived in season to prevent the surrender. Twiggs' graceful.

The Peace Conference was in session until two this morning. Most of the amendments to Guthrie's proposition were voted downleaving it substantially as at first, with a modified verbiage. There will be a definite vote to day.
