DESTRUCTION OF A PORTION OF BLEN-DESTRUCTION OF A PORTION OF BLEN-HEIM PALACE.—The steamer Kangaroo brought intelligence of the destruction of a portion of this celebrated palace at Wood-stock, and of the loss of the valuable paint-ings known as the Titian Gallery. Most of these were presented to the Duke of Marl-borough by Victor Amadeus, King of Sar-dinic and were of secret value. The pile of buildings constituting Blenheim Palace was erected in the reign of Queen Anne, by special act of Parliament, to reward and commemorate the services of the great Mariborough, who, previous to the time of Wellington, was considered the best soldier that Freeland had ever produced. His skillthat England had ever produced. His skill-ful movements on the continent, and especiful movements on the continent, and especially at the battle of Blenheim, on the 13th of August, 1704, where, with the assistance Prince Eugene, he gained a complete over Marshal Tallard and the Elec Bavaria, made him exceedingly popular in his own country, and procured for him the Manor of Woodstock and title of Duke, which were settled upon him and his heirs forever. Although £500,000 were appropriated for the erection of the palece, jealousy of a tory ministry withheld the funds, after an advance of £240,000, and the remainder of the cost, £60,000, was paid from his private fortune. It was not completed until after his death, in 1715. The style is the Italo-Corinthian, the whole occupying three sides of a square, with a from measuring 348 feet from wing to wing. The architect was Sir John Van Brugh. The architect was Sir John Van Brugh. The exterior is richly ornamented and set off to the greatest advantage by the artistic arrangements of a park of 2,940 acres, a model of landscape gardening. The interior is furnished with corresponding elegance and taste. Within the chapel are the remains of the first Duke, his wife and two children, and their statues, executed by Ryabrack. 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
