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

AN ADVENTURE WITH RATTLE SNAKES

A writer in the Boston Courier, several years ago, communicated the fo singular and exciting adventure to that pe I noticed a "sketch" in the Courier a few days since, entitled "Taugkannue Mountain," that called to my mind an incident that occurred to me on those mour some twenty-five or thirty years ago. I was at that time a resident of Sheffield. At the time to which I refer I formed one of a party of young men who made an excursion summit of those mountains to hunt partridges, &c. There are, or were at that time,

there so infested with rattlesnakes that it was there so infested with rattlesnakes that it was dangerous to approach them. To avoid these abodes, we relied on the acquaintance of one of our party with their locality. After chasing over the hills for six or eight hours, we were tired enough to think of returning to our homes. We were proceeding along in an "Indian file," through a defile some four rods wide, one side of which was a mountain; the other some forty feet high, composed of loose ledges that were overgrown with iries. loose ledges that were overgrown with ivies, when a sharp rattle was heard that sent a chill to our hearts. The foremost of our line saw the reptile just shead of him, and without thought raised his gun and fired. As the report of the gun echoed along the crags a most hideous rattling and hissing arose on all sides. We were in the midst of the "de Each rock and bush seemed populous with rattlesnakes, and we could see them descending from the higher crags. We stood still not knowing what to do. To go back would be as dangerous as to advance; and to remain where we were as perilous as either, for several were moving in the bushes near us. The slightest touch of a fang was certain death, as we were too far from any to enable us to reach it before the deadly virus would have taken effect. We feared to stir lest we should attract their attention sooner than if we remained quiet. What passed in the minds of my companions I know not, but remember that my own thoughts were of no

ery agreeable nature. At this juncture one of us perceived a large flat rock, some three rods from us, and proposed in a whisper that we should make for it. Having ascertained that none of our assailants were between us and it, we made a rush for it, and gained it unscathed. Our last movements notified our creeping toes of our whereabouts, as well as to irritate them more,

and they made for our position.
Our weapons of defence were four two pistols and an axe. We were then so situated as to be able to defend ourselv some measure. We cut a couple of valender sprouts that grew close by the re sationed ourselves in the centre, and as the snakes came on the edge of our citadel we killed them. Only five or six made the at-tempt, and we pitched their mangled carcases back to their comrades. It was evident that so long as we remained on the rock we were safe; but how to escape was more than we could predict. If we could have killed all the reptiles on one side with our guns and cudgels, we should have encountered more

scaling the ledge. We remained quietly on the rock, and in a short time, the rattlesnakes ceased their at tacks, but on our making any movement, they commenced their hissing again. These snakes emit a disagreeable oder when disturbed, and the air was filled with it. had noticed a tall tree growing close by us, and one of our party proposed to cut it, so as to cause it to fall against the top of the ledge, and thereby form, if it did not break, a way and thereby form, if it did not break, a way by which we might extricate ourselves. We instantly commenced cutting it, ke sharp lookout for the spotted ras were doubly enraged by the resounding blows. The tree fell, with its top mit of the ledge, and we ascended its trunk and escaped. Before we left we just took a had then taken possession of our rock, and were engaged in snapping a handkerchief dropped by one of us. We formed a line, and shot at them, and then left.

Fatal as is the bite of a rattlesnake, yet to which I refer grows from twelve to eigh inches high, one stalk, leaves narrow, and grow singly from the stem from one to two inches apart. The weed is surrounded with small bluish blossoms that have five leavesthree on the lower portion and two above. If this weed be bruised in cold water and applied, the bite is harmless. Were I a botanist I might give a better description of it.

THE NECESSITY OF EXERCISE.—The

benefit of exercise to those whose occupation does not lead them to make any physical ex-ertion, cannot be too highly estimated. The body must undergo a certain amount of fatigue to preserve its natural strength, and maintain all the muscles and organs in proper vigor. This activity equalizes the cir tion, and distributes the blood more effectually through every part. Cold feet, or a chill anywhere, shows that the circulation is languid there. The muscles, during exercise, press on the veins, and help forward the currents by quickening every vessel into activity. The valves of the heart are in this way aided in the work of sending on this stream, and relieved of a certain amount of labor .-When exercise is neglected, the blood gat too much about this central region, and oppression about the heart, difficulty breathing, lowness of spirit, anxiety and heaviness, numerous aches and stitches, are evidences of this stagnation. People are afruid to take exercise, because they fancy they want breath, and feel weak, but the very effort would free the heart from this burden, by urging the blood forward to the extrem-ities; it would ease their breathing by liberating the lungs from the same superabun-dance; it would make the frame feel active and light, as the effect of equalized circulation and free action.—Laws of Health.

Bragg, Polk, Pugh, Baker, Green and Lane, until the Senate adjourned. In the House, the report of the Committee of Thirty three was resumed, the pending proposition being the admission of New Mexico into the United States of America; it was laid on the table. The House then took up and passed an amendment of the Fugitive Slave Act, which provides, in substance, for the arrest of a fugitive slave and bringing him before a court, judge or commissioner for the State where the arrest is made, as the law of 1850 requires; this court, or officer, after an examination, certifies the facts shown in the case, deliver the fugitive to the Marshal of the State or district from which the fugitive comes. He is then ordered to be carried before one of the U.S. Judges in the last mentioned State or District, where he is tried by a jury; and when the Judge is dissatisfied with the verdict, he may order another one forthwith, whose verdict is final. An elaborate certificate was then filed in the office of the Clerk of the United States District Court for the State or District in which the arrest was made. No citizen shall be compelled to aid the Marshal in the arrest unless force is employed or there is appre hension of preventing such a capture too powerful to be resisted by the Marshal or wner. There was offered an amendment of the act for the rendition of fugitives from justice ; it was rejected. After a discussion amid some confusion in reference to what subject should be taken up, the House adourned over to the evening, in accordance with previous order. At the evening session. there was a "wishy-washy" conversational discussion as to whether the Territorial question or the Conference propositions should be taken up. No debate took place, after all, on either of these questions. A bill proposing a government for the Western part of Utah and Washoe river mines was passed. A similar bill in reference to Dacotah was also passed. The evening session adjourned at 10 P. M. having literally accomplished nothing.


