EARLY DIXCOVERIES IN AMERICA Charles E. Rafn. author of Antiquitates Charles E. Kain, author of Antiquitates
Americans, has prepared the following paper,
descriptive of the early discoveries of the
Northmen in America. Several disjointed
statements of the Northmen's early explorations have been published, but this paper,
communicated by Mr Rafn in order to correct prevalent errors and give still further publicity to important historical facts, is worth preservation:

worth preservation:

The Dane Gardar, of Swedish origin, was the "first Northman who discovered Iceland, in 863. Only a few out-places as this country had been visited previously, about 70 years before, by Irish hermits. Eleven years subsequently, or in 874, the Norwegian Ingol began the colonisation of the country, which was completed during a space of 60 years. The colonists, many of whom belonged to the most illustrious and most civilized familes in the North, established in Iceland a flourishing Republic. Here, on this distant isle-rock, the Old Danish or Old-Northern language was preserved unchanged for centuries, and here in the Eddas were treasured those Folk-songs and Folk-myths, and in the Sagas those historical Tales and Legends, which the first settlers had brought with them from their Scandinavian motherlands. Iceland was therefore the grade of an historical literature of immense value. an historical literature of im The situation of the island and the rela-

tionship of the colony to foreign countries in its earlier period, compelled its inhabitants to exercise and develop their hereditary maritime skill and thirst for new discoveries across the great ocean. As early as the year 877 Gunnbiorn saw for the first time the mountainous coast of Greenland. But this land was first visited by Erik the Bed, in this land was first visited by Erik the Red, in 983, who three years afterwards, in 986, by means of Icelandio emigrants, established the first colony on its south-western shore, where afterwards, in 1124, the Bishop's See of Gardar was founded, which subsisted for upwards of 300 years. The head firths or bays were named after the chiefs of the expedition. Erik the Red settled in Eriksfirth, Einar, Rafn and Ketil in the firths called after them, and Herinulf on Heriulfsnes. On a voyage from Iceland to Greenland this same year (986.) Biarne the son of the latter, was driven far out to sea toward the southwest, and for the first time beheld the coasts of the American lands, afterwards visited and named by his counbeheld the coasts of the American lan afterwards visited and named by his contrymen. In order to examine these country more narrowly. Leif the Fortmate, son Erik the Red, undertook a voyage of doovery thither in the year 1000. Here he remained for cometime, and constructed large houses, called Leitsbudir (Leif's Booths). A German named Tyrker after him, who accompanied Leif on his works. man named Tyrker after him, who accompanied Leif on his voyage, was the man who found the wild vines, which he recognized from having seen them in his own land, and Leif gave the country its name from this circumstance. Two years afterwards Leif's brother. Thorwald, repaired thither, and in 1003 caused an expedition to be undertaken to the south, along the shore, but he was killed in the summer of 1004 on a voyage northwards, in a skirmish with the saftware. northwards, in a skirmish with the nat

The most distinguished, however, of all the first American discoveries is Thorfinn Karlseine, an Icelander, whose genealogy is carried back in the Old-Northern annals to Danish, Swedish, Norwegian, Scottish and Irish ancestors, some of them of royal blood. In 1006 this chief, on a merchant-voyage, visited Greenland and there married Gudrid, the widow of Thorstein—son of Erik the Red—who had died the year before in an unsuccessful expedition to Vineland. To the amendment of the Constitution as proposed by Mr. Corwin, the President says he has no objection ; a fact that may perhaps aford some comfort to Mr. Ferry and other Connecticut Representatives, who denoanced and voted against the measure in Congress. He avows himself favorable also to a Convention for the purpose of amending the Constitution.

As a state paper, the address is much inferior to those of preceding Presidents—but as an index to the policy of the administration in reterence to the unfortunate state of things in our country it is invested with the high est importance. It contains professions, in deed, of a desire for peace, but breather significantly, at the same time, a spirit for war-and if its suggestions are adopted as rules and carried forcibly into practice, was will be the immediate and inevitable result -and then farewell forever to the Union.

Their capacity is nearly doubled by reducing the water to the tempera-ture of ice. Hence, water kept in the room for a while is always unfit for use. For the same reason, the water in a pump stock should always be pumped out in the morning before any is used. Impure water is more njurious than impure air.
