

Leonard, of South Groton, Mass., gives the following statement, in the New England Farmer, of his experience with coal ashes as a manure: On an old mowing field too m ground fairly with clear coal ashes early in the spring. While the crop was growing at the spring. While the crop When ready for the scythe, it was more in quantity; and as to quality, it produced about equal parts of herds-grass and red clover.—
If the clover was not introduced by the agency of the ashes, we know not how it was introduced; for four years none was seen there before, or any other part of the field, and this was the only clover seed in said field the past season. THE RUSH FOR OFFICE.

The rush for office under the Lincoln adninistration surpasses anything of the sort ever witnessed in America. In 1840, remarks the Hartford Times, the clamor and throng of office beggars was bad enough, in all conscience; it was not quite so bad at the beginning of Pierce's administration, and much less with Mr. Buchanan's, as there was then no political change; but the strife and pressure now, by the Republicans, is beyond all precedent, and the scenes at Washington already are described as disgraceful. With the spectacle before them, of the country going to rain by dismemberment, these Relican office-seekers are intent only to secure plunder for themselves while there is yet a chance-feeling instinctively that even if the Union shall hold as it is, there will never be another Abolition Republican President. So the wild hunt goes on, and the contest will increase for some months

Here in Connecticut the wire-pullers are extremely anxious to keep down all competition until after next month's election. The plan is to prevent divisions in this State, by refusing all applications till after the spring rill be unable to help themselves: votes, and this is to be done by helding out a pe to each and all.

Let us have a Union er let us sweep away this remnant which we call a Union. I go for a Union where all men are equal, or for no Union at all." Probably no man in this country was a more bitter reviler of Gen. Jackson than this same Mr.

It is marvellously proper, therefore, that he should now claim to be one of his admirers, and call for his ghost to appear on earth. It is proper, also, that he should now be a reviler of what he calls modern Democracy, for the obvious reason that modern Democracy has been true to the Constitution and the Union, and its policy eminently favorsble to the peace, prosperity, and rapid growth of the whole country. It is proper of a peaceful adjustment of our national diflikewise, that he should "ridicule the idea of ficulties. ceable secession," because, if war ween the two sections is avoided, the Union may, sooner or later, be restored, contrary to the determination of the Abolition branch of the Republicans. MATTERS SOUTH, &c.

In the Missouri State Convention on Tuesday, resolutions were adopted appointing a ommittee to wait on the Commissioner from Georgia and inform him that Missouri dissented from the position taken by his State, and very respectfully but emphatically declined to accept the invitation of Georgia to share with her the honors and responsibilities of secession.

A dispatch from Raleigh gives some fur ther returns af the North Carolina election for State Convention. So far as the results have been obtained the Unionists are in a large majority. The vote on the question of holding a convention is said to be so close that the official returns will be necessary to decide it.

There was a debate in the Virginia Convention on Tuesday, on Mr. Lincoln's inaugural address. The secessionists are death on the inaugural and are for hard blows, and this feeling is apparent among the people; but the Union men will oppose basty action in the Convention, and, perhaps, prevent the passage of the ordinance of secession.

Mr. Lincoln's inaugural was received in New Orleans in three hours from Washington. It is regarded as incongruous and contradictory relative to constitutional rights. The assertion that the ordinances of the seceded States are void, and their acts insurrectionary, coupled with the determination io hold, occupy and possess the government property, and to collect revenue, are received as an open declaration of war. The assertion that no blood will be shed and no invasion made unless the South resists, is ridiculed.

Dispatches from Montgomery on Tuesday universally concede war to be inevitable. The Southern Congress was engaged in organizing a standing army of ten thousand men. Eight thousand men can at once be placed on a moveable war footing.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

Notwithstanding the powerful efforts of the conservatives to induce Lincoln to keep Chase and Blair out of the Cabinet, he succumbed to the radicals, and the slate remains as at first decided on. It is generally conceded that it is now but a homogeneous Cabinet, and that it will not hold together two months. Everything was said and done to persuade Lincoln to change his programme, but all was of no avail.

John Woodruff is also nominated for re-election in the Second District. Like the others, he swears by the Chicago platform, and would not take a splinter from it to save the Union.
