Now the Springfield Republican bases its hopes of a \$12.000. Republican victory in that District solely upon depriving fifteen hundred men of their

votes by the operation of this Law. Last Spring the Republicans were constantly charging fraud upon the Democrats of this Town. Mayor Wood's men-three hundred illegal votes were claimed to have peen polled in this Town alone; and yet the Standard has not nor cannot name one ill-gal Democratic vote that was cast at the last State Election. CORRESPONDENCE OF THE FARMER.

TOWN WIDE AWAKES, &c.

NEWTOWN, March 5, 1861.

The Republicans of this tewn met last night for the purpose of celebrating the inauguration of Lincoln. Letters had previously been sent to the Republicans of adjoining towns asking them to join in the celebration, as there was to be a grand turn-out. Besides, an oyster supper had been provided by some of the anxious ones; for it was thought the supper would be a great help in keeping the organization together, and would strengthen the back-bones of many who, of late, seemed undecided whether to remain in the party or to come out in favor of the Constitutien and the Union.

About nine o'clock the Wide Awakes made their appearance—the whole of twenty-nine in all. Nearly half of them were voters and the r. mainder were small boys—many of them out probably without their mother's knowledge. As they marched past the new Town Hall, where the Democrats had assembled to nominate the


