

OF THE GREAT EARTHQUAKE IN CANADA AND

ITS FEARFUL EFFECTS. On the 5th of February, 1663, about half past five in the evening, a great rumbling was heard throughout Canada. The noise was so like the roar of a fire among the houses, that every one rushed into the open air to es it, but instead of the expected smoke lames, they were surprised to see the walls shaking, and the stones composing them threatening to fall asunder; every roof appeared to bend, first one and then the opposite way; the bells rung of themselves; the door posts, joists and floors cracked, and the earth heaved, so that the stakes of the palisades danced in a manner that would a incredible, if we had not ourselves bel

in many places. Every one sought the open air; the and women, overcome with fear, knew not where to escape, expecting every moment to be buried under the falling houses, or be engulfed in some abyss which seemed ab open beneath their feet. Some upon their knees upon the snow begged aloud for mer-oy; others passed the rest of the night in prayer, for the motion of the earth still con-tinued; so like was it to that of a ship at see that the same sickness of the stom

We gave yesterday a further exhibition of the donkeyism of the Standard on the subject by copying the resolution passed by the Leglature of Kentucky in 1798. This resolution, as we then stated, was drawn up by Mr. Jefferson, and, in the most emphatic manner rates the declaration of the ratifying Act of the States of Massachusetts and New Hampshire, viz :- that the Constitution of the United States is an explicit and solemn COMPACT-and that to this COMPACT each State accoded as a State, and is an intregal party. Such, it thus appears, was the view then entertained by the founders and fathers of the Government in three of the States. But again. In the same year, 1798, the Legislature of Virginia passed a resolution in the following words, viz :-

RESOLVED, That this Assembly doth explicitly and peremptorily declare, that it views the powers of the Federal

Mr. Ferry was then introduced, and com nenced one of his usual high spiced, pettifogging addresses. He said he arose for the purpose of pleading the cause of the people efore themselves; for the government under which we lived; the Constitution under which that Government was instituted, and which he hoped would be transmitted unaltered to our posterity; and for the flag which never until now had been trailed in the dust. He hoped, too, that the people of Connecticut would plant their feet upon the neck of that treason which was springing up in their State. He then gave a history of the struggle which commenced at the opening of Congress last December, stating that a conspiracy which for years had been maturing in the Cotton States, was brought into action: that illegal conventions had assem bled in those States; the people had not been consulted, &c. He characterized Buchanan as an imbecile and treacherous old man, and used the same distribes against him and his Cabinet that have filled the Tribune for the past three months. In both houses of Congress, he said, the Republicans were in a minority; but the cry went up that that party ought to do something to save the country. The election, last fall, resulted in the choice of Abraham Lincoln as President by a majority of the electoral, though receiving a minority of the popular vote. Mr. Lincoln was elected upon the platform of the non-extension of slavery; while opposed to him were the platforms of the Bell and Everett, Douglas, and Breckinridge parties. The Gulf States demanded that the Republican. Bell and Everett, and Douglas parties should give up their principles and accept the Breckinridge platform, or they would not emain in the Union. He went to Congress ast winter, instructed by a majority of the people of this District to go against the principle of protection of slavery in the territories. He then made an appeal to the Douglas Democrats to vote for him, by asserting that he also represented them; but his appeal met with no response. Mr. Ferry, perhaps, had forgotten that it is not two years since he characterized the principles of

Mr. Douglas as false in theory, and applied o that statesman the most insulting epithets. These remarks were introductory to what nay be considered as his defense of the course ne pursued last winter. We have given a nere synopsis of them, but sufficient to show the wonderful unanimity in sentiment and lanruage between him and Horace Greeley who s characterized by the conservative men of his own party as an Abolitionist of the Gar-

ison school. Mr. Ferry then gave a sketch of the labors of the Committee of Thirty-three, of which ne was a member. He went into that Committee knowing that disaffection existed, and anxious to know what the grievances were of which they complained. With a great deal of circumlocution he endeavored to shew that what the South desired was a recognition of their right to go into the common territory of the country on the same equality as the North.

He next pitched into the Crittenden propositions, and said he did not believe that the Democracy of Connecticut would sustain them. This remark fell flat.

He ought to know that the reason for their disaffection is the persistent efforts of a Northern sectional party for the last six years to deprive them of their rights in the ommon territory of the country; of the repeated declarations of leading Republicans that the North would, as soon as it obtained the power, make such amendments to the Constitution, and so reconstruct the government as to make it an instrument of oppression to the Southern States; the denial to slaveholders of the least moral or religious feeling; and the denial to them of fellowship in the church; the assertion that they were barbarians, and should pe treated as such ; that slavery was an evil, and should be rooted out; these have been urged upon the Northern mind from the Northern stumps and Northern pulpits until the Southern mind has become convinced that the whole object and aim of the Republican party was to make war upon their domestic institutions. As a man who is constantly threatened with assassination will not wait for the blow of the assassin to be struck, and be rendered incapable of defence, but will take measures to defend himself; so the Southern people, driven by desperation, have taken means to defend themselves. Does any reasonable man suppose that this trouble would now be upon us were it not for the existence of a Northern sectional party, whose power and ascendancy has been obtained by appealing to the prejudices and passions of the Northern mind? Was there any such trouble when the political parties of the country were divided upon national instead of section-

al issues? That this spirit of sectionalism is the cause of all our trouble, is sufficiently proved by Mr. Ferry's own reasons for voting against the proposed plans of adjustment. He said, because by so doing he would sacrifice Northern principle. Section, then, is to be preferred to country. Is not Mr. Ferry willing to concede that Southerners are just as tenacious of their principles as he of his; and equally as honest in their advocacy and maintenance? Yet he blames our Southern brethren for standing by their views and principles, and thinks it is something to boast of that he stands by his. When men are thus so dis metrically opposed to each other, no settlement of difficulties can ever be made if each waits until he draws or forces the other to his belief. A middle ground; a concession; a deference to another's feelings, and an acknowledgment of each other's honesty is the only way in which to settle such differences. Mr. Ferry stands, therefore, committed to the no concession, no compromise platform ON TUESDAY EVENING, MARCH 12.

which he laid down in his speech in Congress Mr. Ferry referred to the rumored evacuation of Fort Sumter, and took the Tribune ground that if such a thing is done i will be the fault of James Buchanan. Such a puerile dodge as that is contemptible, and is no honor to his undeniable talent.

There are other points in Mr. Ferry's speech which space does not allow us to comment on now, but which will be noticed at some other time.

The speech shows that Mr. Ferry offers himself to the suffrages of the electors of this District upon the radical no-compromise Greeley platform, and we are yet to see whether the people will acknowledge that he represents their views upon the present issues of the day.

The rumors about removing the troops at Fort Sumter are discussed at Washington, and approved not only by Union men South, but by several intelligent Republicans. It is believed that it will cost eight or ten thousand lives to keep the Fort and involve the country in a protracted civil war. Radical Republicans of the Ferry stamp are, how ever, trying to force the administration to reinforce the Fort and adopt a coercive policy.

It is to be hoped that the conservative Re-

publicans will defeat the bloodhounds. The "Irrepressible Conflict" has ac tually reached the Cabinet, and thus early. we are told there is imminent danger of a break up on the now all important point, shall Sumter be evacuated or not? SEC. 7.—The Board of Registration in each of said town respectively, shall at least 12 days before any of said Electors' meetings, deposit the lists thus made, each list being signed by said Board or a majority of them, in the Town Clerk's Office for public inspection. Said Board shall also 12 days before any of said Electors' meetings post at the place of voting in each district, in their respective towas, and also in at least two other public places in each district a copy of the lists of said district, giving the boun aries thereof, which list shall be certified by the Clerk of said Board.

The Lists will remain in the districts until March 18th, when they will go into the hands of the Board of Registration, for revisions, alterations and additions. On the 20th day of March the lists as corrected will be placed in the different districts for further examination, until the Wednesday preceding the election, when the Board of Registration will make their final corrections and alterations of the same, and no alterations or corrections can be made after ead Wednesday preceding the election. Due notice will be given of the time and place of meeting of said Board for the admission of Electors and corrections of the Registry Lists.
