New York; Harper & Brothers. The name of Motley is one of which the of Motley is one of which the American peo of Motley is one of which the American people may well be proud, for he has already ranked himself high in the list of historical writers. We doubt if any of them, excepting perhaps Irving and Prescott, ever excelled him in the development of European events. We may, indeed, almost classify the present work along with "Philip the Second." The Edinburgh Review and the London Quarterly have paid it the highest praise ever offered to an American publication. The issue of the history of the rise of the Dutch Republic a few years since, at once attracted the attena few years since, at once attracted the atte-tion and admiration of all enlightened natio by the depths of its graceful and pictures style and the enthusiastic eloquence of which it reproduced the most importa-events connected with the birth of a ne-Republic. The present work takes up the protracted struggle between England and Holland on the one side, and Spain and Rome on the other; although the period occupied by the two volumes is a comparatively short one covering four years, beginning in 1584. 
