A great mistake is made by many parents and teachers in overtaxing the minds of children with long lessons and protracted study, when it would be far better for the child to spend but one-half the time in study and the rest in some amusing, healthful sport. Children must play; if any one doubts it,

let him step into some of our school-rooms, and he will be satisfied that there is in every little bundle of muscles and nerves an irrelittle bundle of muscles and nerves an trrepressible tendency in that direction. And
this playful nature should be encouraged and
cultivated; not by any means would we encourage play of any kind during the hours
devoted to study, and play in disobedience of
school regulations, but this we mean to say,
hat in every school house there should be ome apartment fitted up on purpose for all inds of healthful exercises—a room into which a class of scholars might be taken by their teacher at any hour, and there, for a few minutes, engage in healthful recreation. Ten minutes each half-day spent in dancing, in jumping the rope, or in rolling ten-pins, would enable the scholar to apply the mind to study much more closely than if no such exercise had been enjoyed.

ercise had been enjoyed. And then such exercises, properly conducted, would ever be a source of enjoyment to scholars; school-life would never be dull and piritless; boys would not be so much inlined to play the truant, since a part, at least, of the temptation would be removed. But the chief advantage would be the increased degree of health which the children would ed degree of health which the children would possess; and this is a matter which demands the attention of parents and teachers especially. There is nothing which can compensate for a slender constitution, a diseased and sickly body, and the almost absolute certainty of a brief and unhappy existence. Excellent scholarship is not to be obtained at the expense of health, without which all mental accomplishments prove of but little value.

A little girl is fond of study—she is slender and delicate—often goes to school in the morning without eating but a morsel of breakfast—she studies faithfully, is encouraged by teachers in school and by parents at home—is pointed out to visitors in the school as an unusually forward scholar; and she is,—she could not be otherwise; her mind is ever active—her brain finds no rest, except during a tive—her brain finds no rest, except during a few hours of unrefreshing sleep—she of course is in advance of her schoolmates of

A MIGHTY RIVER.—The Amazon, in South America, the largest river in the world, has an area of dramage nearly three times as large as that of all the rivers of Europe that empty themselves in the Atlantic. This plain is covered with a dense forest, through which the only paths are those made by the river and its tributaries. This forest is literally impenetrable. Humboldt remarks that two mission stations might be only a few miles apart, and yet the resident would require a day and a half to visist each other, along the windings of small streams. FORWARDING CUCUMBER AND OTHER VINES.—Cucumbers may be forwarded some weeks simply by planting them in the open soil, placing around them, when up, four bricks laid flatways, and laying over them a night. The bricks will retain a portion of the heat absorbed during the daytime, and fully to accelerate the development, and producing a vigorous action of the system throughout. Melons, squashes and other vines of a similar description may be advanced by the same very simple and economical process. 
