COCANUT OIL —A valuable oil for ointments, for burns, &c., or to use for the toil-t, entirely inodorous, and clear as water, can be made in the following manner: Grate fixely the white meat of cocuanuts, and boil it half an hour in water enough to cover it four or five times, and set it by to cool. Then skim off the oil into a small vessel, whence you can pour it or skim it again to separate the water. The water still retained can be evaporated by boiling. Cocoanut oil is made on a large scale by rasping the substance fine by machinery, and then pressing out the oil, as sperm oil is pressed out, by pla cing the pulp in stout bags, and sub them to great pressure.

TO KEEP CIDER SWEET .- Professor Horsford's directions are : When the cider is fermenting lively, put in from one-half to three-fourths of a pound of sugar to each gallon of oider; let the fermentation go on, until the cider tastes pleasant, then put in from one-eighth to one-fearth of an ousce of sulphite of lime to the gallon, having first mixed the powder in a pitcher of offer, and pouring it back into the barrel through the bung. Bung up and shake or roll the barrel thoroughly. After standing a few days, until the aulphite of lime has become well incorporated with the older, bottle it di from the cask, as you like.

UNION SPEECH OF MR. LOOMIS. The Republican papers and orators in this State ever since the nomination of Mr. Loomis, have accused him of being a secessionist. Like the rogue, who, to divert attention from himself shouts "stop thief" louder than his pursuers, so they in order to avoid an investigation by the public as to the true and prime cause of all our troubles, now call the Democratic party disunionists and its standard bearer a secessionist. The Democratic party has warned the country of what would be the result of the agitation of the public mind upon the subject of slavery; it has fought inch by inch the sectional aggressive policy of the Republican party : and now that its predictions have been verified, that party with a coolness that is unparalleled and an audacity that is unequaled, accuses the Democratic party of favoring secession and of being responsible for the disruption of the Union; and claim that they themselves are the true and only Union party. More especially do they impute to Mr. Loomis sentiments which he never uttened; knowing as they do that his private character being above reproach, his reputation as a man without ich, and his conduct as a citizen unsullied. their only hope of defeating him is to destroy, if nossible, the confidence of the people in his political views as regards the present condition of public affairs.

We know of no nobler sentiments than Mr Loomis expressed concerning national affairs, in a speech which he made at a Union meeting held in this city in January, 1860. As he had no political ends to serve, as he met as a citizen with his fellow citizens, and not idate for any office, it is but just and did even for his political opponents, to seeds that he spoke the honest sentiments of his beart, unwarped by any idea of politi cal advancement. Upon being appointed President of the meeting, he spoke as fol-

nion men, who desire the prosperity and to advance the Interests of the whole Union. We come together as citizens of Connecticut, discerding all parties; meeting upon a common ground for the common good as our isthers did, to pr mote harmony, advance the public good, and to use our efforts to preserve those institutions which our fathers left us as a priceless legacy. We came not only to deprecate and denounce the fersy of John Brown, and sympathize with Virginia in the time of her trouble and distress, but to express our attachment to the whole country and our determination to maintain the Constitution with all of its compromises.
