Perhaps it is for the same reason that people in the United States spend their money freely because it is acquired with facility. The Yankees, however, are diligent because they cannot live without work; but in South America, it would seem, Nature is so prodigal of her bounties that people have no occasion to provide for the day that is passing over them. An article in the last number of the North British Review, writtan, we believe, by a Liverpool merchant, throws number of the North British Review, was we believe, by a Liverpool merchant, the considerable light on the state of societ the various Spanish Republics. That I we regret to say, falls upon barren plast ish America to a state of positive decade ish America to a state of positive decadence. During the last sixty years the population has not increased. It is now set down at 19,500,000, in which the Indian population is included. The accuracy of the return may readily be doubted, and this must be regarded as an approximation to the truth. Mexico, which is also numbered in the estimate, has a population of 7,000,000. Her exports, although her silver mines yield annually \$25,000,000, amount to only \$1,500,000. chiefly in cochineal and dyewcods. In 1804 the silver mines yielded \$28,000,000, and are now reduced to \$24,000,000. Nueve Grands and Venezuela export only tobacco, dyewcods and coffee, estimated at a few millions of dollars. Six years ago her mines yielded \$3,000,000 per annum; they now yield nothing. Equador imports about \$3,000,000, and arports to the value of \$8,500,000. This is inports to about the same amount. Peru ex-ports to the value of \$8,500,000. This is inports to the value of \$8,500,000. This is independent of the guano exports. Her coinage in 1791 was \$5,000,000; the yield of her silver mines now is only \$8,000,000. In 1790 she owned 41 ships, averaging 400 tons. Her ships and tonnage since then have fallen off. Her far-famed riches, we are told, are now like the legends of the past, and, with an immoral, degenerate and indelent population, the result is not strange. Bolivia has very little intercourse with toreigners. Her exports do not exceed \$500,000. The famous mines of Potosi now yield only about \$2,000,000 per annum. Their average yield formerly was \$2,400,000,000. Whether the mines have been worked out, or are imperfectly worked, is not easily ascertained. Uruguay exportain hides, tallow, and wool to the amount of \$6.000,000 annually. The Argentine Confederation is making progress, and destined to make still greater. Civil war has ceased, and she has now an opportunity of developing har

make still greater. Civil war has ceased, and she has now an opportunity of developing har natural resources. Chili, of all the Spanish republics, has made the most rapid progress. Her imports in 1855 for home consumption were \$18,460,000; her exports \$19,180,000; The country is possessed of great natural resources, mineral and agricultural. The annual exports therefore of the Spanish American republics are only about £17,000,000.

The population, as we observed, has not increased; and this will excite very little wonder when we find that death absorbs the increase of the population.

A FRESH WATER SPRING AT SEA.—Mr. W.A. Booth, the coast pilot of the revenue cutter Harriet Lane, reports the discovery of a boiling fresh water spring at sea off the coast of Florida. He says the spring is situated twelve miles north by east, from St. Augustine, Fla., and eight miles off shore.

It boils up with great force, and can be decried at a distance of two miles. When first seen it has the supergrance of a breaker. cried at a distance of two miles. When first seen it has the sppearance of a breaker, and is generally avoided, but there is no danger in the vicinity, as there is five fathoms of water between it and the shore. Ten fathoms of water are found to the seaward, but no bottom can be reached with the deep sea lead and thirty fathoms of line at the spring itself. The water in the spring is fresh, and is by no means unpalatable. One peculiarity about this phenomanon is that when the St. John's river is high it bolls up from six to eight feet above the level of the from six to eight feet above the level of the sea, and presents rather a fobidding appearance. This spring has doubtless deceived hundreds, who have hastily put about from, as they thought, imminent danger, and reported seeing a "rock with water breaking over it." The Harriet Lane has passed through it saveral times and make her has passed through it several times, and water has been drawn from it by a bucket thrown over the side, and when drank no unpleasant taste or smell has been found. Its position and harmless character have been long unknown, but now the supposed danger has become, as it were, "a well of water in a barren land."

THE MORRILL TRHIFF BILL IN ENGLAND.—At a moment when the destines of the great American Union are trembling in the balance, and the Republic is menaced with the worst catastrophes of civil war, its legislature is engaged upon a measure which seems calculated at once to alienate foreign nations, to embitter domestic strife and to provide an inexcusable aliment for the antagonism, unhappily subsisting between the two sections of the confederacy. The bill called the Morrill tariff bill is an act for the establishment of protective duties on a most extravagant scale. If it were designed to condemn the very principles of free trade, and to introduce those of protection as forming the only true theory of international commerce, it could not be more strongly framed. The duties imposed by the bill are not only immoderately high, but they are levied upon imports of the first necessity. The articles taxed are not mere luxuries or commodities entering into the consumption of the opulent high, but they are levied upon imports of the first necesity. The articles taxed are not mere luxuries or commodites entering into the consumption of the opulent alone. It is upon cotton goods, woolen goods, and hardware, that the imposts will fall, and so enormous are the duties proposed, that the result can be little short of absolute prohibition. Cutlery is to be taxed upwards of fifty per cent. In the lowest instance—in the highest nearly two hundred and fifty. In addition to this, the bill enacts so many complicated arrangements, and throws such interminable obstructions in the way of business that commerce will be next to impossible under conditions so difficult. We need not enter into the particulars of the act, which is said to be scarcely intelligible even to Americans themselves, but we can convey a very good idea of its character and purposo by observing, that if it should be passed, it will almost prohibit all imports into the United States from England, France and Germany. That, and no less, is the effect anticipated from the measure in New York itself. Of our own position under such circumstances we shall presently speak; but as the consequences of the measure would be felt most deeply by the Americans themselves, we may give them the precedence in our remarks upon the subject.

MANAGEMENT OF HYACINTHS IN POTS

ND GLASSES .- The hyacinth is one of the most desirable parlor and drawing-room plants that the florist's art affords. It is leanly, thrives with but little care, is not numbersome, and flowers in the mid-winter and in succession until the frosts have released the gardens in the spring. They throw up their delicate, flourishing stems in December, and as they unfold they fill the room with a soft but pervading perfume from flower-spikes, which present every color in nature, and every modification of color, from snowy white to black. There is no more delicate or grateful perfume emitted from flowers than that which the hyacinth sheds. We avail ourselves of some practical directions for their management which we find in the October number of the Horticulturist, recommending them to the attention of readers who may be interested in the subject. 
