The Republican journals continue to throw out that the army forces despatched from New York may be for Texas.

It is stated that the Administration feels some alarm of Ben McCulloch, and of a raid upon the Capital.

Old Virginia is warming up, under the naval movements, and having shown her attachment to the Union she thinks she at least has a right to know what Mr. Lincoln means with his ships of war.

All the State Conventions of the Southern Confederacy except Florida, have now ratified the new Constitution.

From all accounts, it appears that Mr. Lincoln's purpose now is not to make, but to provoke, attack by hostile demonstrations on the Southern Coast.
