SKETCH OF CHARLESTON, S. C. The foundations of Charleston were laid in 1672; it was then called Oyster Point Town, afterwards New Charestown. It is lo on a peninsula, washed by the waters of the Cooper and Ashley rivers. The harbor is spacious and secure. The bar has some obstructions, but there are four channels, with structions, but there are four channels, with different degrees of depths; the ship channel between Forts Moultrie and Sumter being the largest, and affording seventeen feet at high water, and ten feet at low. The city was incorporated in 1783, when its name was changed from Charlestown to Charleston. The advantages afforded by its position on the coast, and its excellent harbor, soon made it a place of considerable trade. Its first ara place of considerable trade. Its first exports were staves, lumber, furs, peltries, considerable quantities of rice—first planted in 1603—to which were added in 1747, indige;

in 1782, tobacco, and in 1790, cotton.
In 1723, the import of Charleston was
£122,000, over half the foreign import of
1845. The exports of the same year was, in rice alone, 26.468 barrels. In 1744, two hundred ships were laden at its wharves. Ship-building which was at one time carried on to some extent, has nearly ceased, and few are owned in the city. The revenue collected on the imports of Charleston was very nearly as large under the light tariff of 1789 as under the high one of 1842. From the com-mencement of the Federal Government in 1825, the revenue collected amounted to \$22,337.381. In the year 1800 the imports yielded a revenue of only \$2,203,812; in 1848, they yielded a revenue of only \$324,-468. The decrease in imports has been more than counterbalanced by the increase in exports. In 1744, the exports amounted to £161,-365 sterling; in 1848, they amounted to \$8,084,917.

The white population of Charleston in 1790 was 8,039, slaves and free colored, 8,270. In 1848 it amounted to 14,187 whites and 12,264 slaves and free colored. The cent THE ONLY ESTABLISHMENT OF THE KIND IN BRIDGEPORT.

SPOONS, FORKS, LADLES, &c., &c., &c., MADE FOR THE WHOLESALE AND BRTAIL TRADE, contains about 15,000 inhabitants. The largest portion of the population is native, being fifty per cent.; the proportion of foreigners slightly exceeds those born in the United States, but out of Charleston. The productive class, or those between fifteen and sixty, is quite as large as in other American cities, except in Lowell, Lawrence, and manafacturing places of that kind. There were 600 dwelling houses in Chareston in 1731; in 1820, 2,336; in 1848, 3,147. The expense for supporting paupers has dimin-ished about sixty per cent. since 1823. while the difference in the number has varied but little. The number of free public schools in 1850 was 394; amount expended for them, \$3,900; average to scholar, \$10; average attendance five years.

The crops of Sea Island cotton have de creased from an average of about 35.000 bales in 1820, to an average of 22,000 bales between 1840 and 4850. If we are precipitated into a civil war, it will be to gratify the insatiate and bitter Abolition wing of the Republican party.


