POWER OF ENDURANCE AND DIET .- Even the experienced trainers of the prize ring cannot decide what is the best food for traincannot decide what is the cest rood for train-ing men up to their greatest power of en-durance. They have a prejudice in favor of mutton-chops and under-done beef-steaks; but is by no means sure that these are the best. The Roman soldiers, who conquered the world, and built roads from Lisbon to Constantinople, and who were all trained athletæ, marching under a weight of armor and luggage that few men in our day could carry, lived on coarse, brown wheat or barley bread, which they dipped in sour wine. In our own day, Spanish peasants are among the strongest and most agile men in the world. They will work all day in a copper mine, or the wine press, under a hot sun, and mine, or the wine press. under a hot sun, then dance half the night to the music of a quitar. What does he live on? A niece o black bread and an onion; perhaps half of a watermelon. You may see him dipping his piece of bread into a horn of olive oil, and piece of bread into a norn of clive oil, and then into some vinegar, made hot with pepper and garlio, and then he is happy. Sometimes he gets a draught of harsh, sour wine, but not atrong. All the strong wine is sent to England. The Smyrna porter walks off with a load of eight hundred weight. His only food, day after day, is a little fruit—a handful of dates, a faw figs, a hunch of granes, some of dates, a few figs, a bunch of grapes, some olives. He eats no beef, pork or mutton.— His whole food does not cost him a penny a day. The Coolie, living on his rice, can outwork the negro fed on bacon. The Arab, iving on rice and dates, conquered half the world. The most tremendous muscular force, and the greatest powers of endurance, may be nourished upon a very moderate diet.

#### FORT SUMTER.

It appears from the Tribune, that a part, at least, of the troops just sent from New York to the South, were under instructions to make another attempt to effect a landing at the force of the commander at that Fort. Totten, based upon the admitted fact that it could not be done without a terrible sacrifice of life, which the necessities of the case did not and could not justify. The Fort is of no earthly consequence to the General Government, and never was, except to protect the city of Charleston from the assaults of a foreign enemy coming by way of the sea. That city not being now in danger from any such assaults, there is, of course, no necessity for increasing its force, in order that the Government may fulfil any duty it owes to Charleston, or, indeed, any duty enjoined upon it by the Constitution and laws. To attempt, therefore, to throw an additional number of troops into that Fort, new. can have no other object than that of inaugurating and commencing active hostilities against the people and States of the Southof plunging the country into all the horrors of civil war.

THE WAR PANIC.
