WORK FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL

labors, and no little of the year's success
depends upon beginning rightly now.

The manure may now be carted to the
fields, if not already done. The breaking ap
of new fields and plowing of the stubble may
better be attended to as soon as the frost is out, and the soil sufficiently dry to crumble freely. The work is more easily done now than after the ground has become consolida-ted. Plow deeper than has been the usual ted. Plow deeper than has been the usual custom, but not very much deeper than the ground has been plowed before, unless yes manure highly. It is better, except for gardens, and especially high cultivation to deepen the soil gradually—an inch or two a year till you get it ten inches deep. Subsoiling pays. It has not yet become general, but it will. Let every farmer try it, for an experiment, at least; and de not condens the experiment, at least; and do not condempractice hastily if the first crop is no b for it, or even if it is not quite as good. I an acre has been subsoiled with no imme

an acre has been subsolled with no immediate increase of crops, but yet with greatly increased productiveness subsequently.

Let the fences be in the best por repair; but do not make new ones u necessary. Too many inside fences are very expensive, and are a serious dre whack on the profits of farming. For inside fences, and those high and strong, amounting to an absolute prohibition, is the safe rule.

Corn is among our most important crops.
Have the ground early in readiness. If plowed long before planting, it is well to harrow over just before furrowing out and putting in the seed, to put back the weeds. The ting in the seed, to put back the weeds. The bulk of the manure for a corn field may better be harrowed in, and the more perfectly divided and incorporated with the soil the better; but unless the soil is quite warm, something of a warming nature should be reserved for the hills, to give the plant a vigorous start. The early planting of corn is often, and perhaps wisely, urged; but it is early enough when the ground is warm. Before that is too early, whatever the time of the year. Let the ground be warm at the time of planting, and then, if the seed is soaked so as to come quick, and grow "right on," and as to come quick, and grow "right on," and be always "large of its age," you have a better crop in promise, though planted as late as the 20th of May; then if it had been planted a partie against and had attraggled, yellow ed a month earlier, and had struggled, yellow and stinted, against cold soil and cold winds. How thickly should corn be planted? If you cultivate but a few acres, of a small kind, and on land hard to work, it may be your policy to put it three feet each way, and from that to three and a half. But if you are growing it on a liberal scale, of a good size, and on suitable ground, four feet each way, four kernels in a hill, three or four to stand, is near enough, and, by planting nearer, you increase the labor without increasing the crop proportionately.

proportionately. At this season, of all others, do not hill, nor allow others to kill the birds on your premises. They are the husbandman's friends. While they take a kernel of wheat they take a thousand insects; for every beethe king bird takes he saves you a chicken or two; and even the rascally crow, if he should be called so, which is more than doubtful, does you more good, as a general scavenger. does you more good, as a general scavenger, than harm, as a petty thief. It is well now to c the apple trees. The rough bark may be scraped off with a boe, or with an implement offered by the agricultural dealers for that purpose. Wash the trunk and lower li with a weak solution of potash, say one pound to three gallons of water. Whale oil soap, if you can obtain it, is cheaper and safer, because then you are in no danger of hilling the trees by applying it too strong. A solu-tion of soda is perfectly safe, and is a little tion of soda is perfectly safe, and is a little cheaper than potash; or, what is just as well as either, and always at hand, wood ashes and water, two or three shovelsfull to a pailful, applied with a swab. It takes off the dead bark, breaks up the insects' nests, destroys many of the insects, leaves the bark smooth and thrifty, and is well-worth attending to. An application of wood ashes to the ground under fruit trees, as far as the limbs extend and a little further, will pay richly in extend and a little further, will pay richly to the increase of fruit.

Do not fail to keep a fine garden. Now is the time to be getting in the flowers and veg-etables, the tomatoes, early potatoes, early corn, &c., and the time is near for grating choice fruits, or transplanting in place those already grafted. The farmer who will not have already grafted. not have plenty of fresh vegetables and choice fruits falls below his privilege.—N. T. World.
