LITCHEIGIELD COUNTY A BIRTH PLACE OF DISTINGUISHED MEN. From an address delivered before the His

orical and Antiquarian Society of Litchfield County, by Hon. Gideon H. Hollister, author of the "History of Connecticut," we make the following extracts:

Our county contains less than one five-hundredth of the population of the United States; yet it has been the birthplace of thir-teen United States Senators,* which is about one fortieth of all that have ever been in Congress from all the States.

Its population, as compared with that of the State of New York, is in the ratio of one to seventy; yet it has given birth to twentytwo Representatives in Congress from that State, which is about one-twenty-eighth of all that have been sent from that State. It has also been the birthplace of nine judges of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, t and of at least fifteen judges of the higher courts of this and other States. Ten presidents and eighteen professors of col-

leges can also be counted who were born within our territorial limits. In 1831 the Vice President of the United States and one eighth of the United States Senators were either natives of this county or had been educated in it.

In 1850 one-seventh of the whole num of United States Senators were found to have been educated in this county. Almost every old house in this village was built or has been inhabited by an historical personage, whose reputation could be called neither local nor sectional. Oliver Wolcott, for some time high sheriff of this county, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and afterwards Governor of the State, built one of the oldest houses now standing here. In the rear of this house he sheltered the leaden statue of His Majesty King George III., and around his fireside, assisted by youths and maidens of his own family and neighborhood, melted up the king's image into bullets to shoot at the king's troops. I suppose it is not necessary for me to add that he was one of the first Americans of his time. Under of the first Americans of his time. Under this same roof were born his two sons-Oliver and Frederick—the one distinguished for his bility as a statesman, and as being the founder of a new order of things in the State; the other for his integrity, his truthfulness, and all the attributes that go to make up the per-fect gentleman. In the same house was born his daughter Laura, afterwards the wife of Hon. Chauncey Goodrich. She was one of

the most witty, accomplished, and beautifu romen of her time. Next door to Governor Wolcott, on the south, dwelt the celebrated Reynolds Marvin, the king's attorney; and at a later day, in the same house, lived Ephraim Kirby, where he prepared the first volume of law reports ever published in the United States.

Oppisite Governor Wolcott resided Tapping Reeve the founder of the Litchfield Law School and chief judge of the State.
In the North street lived James Gould, the most accomplished American lawyer of his day, and the author of the most analytical and perfect treatise upon the title of Pleading in the English language. That the law school was long kept alive under his personal superintendence, and that he was as great in the form and upon the bench as he was distinguished for his learning and scholarship, is too well known to need repetition here. The same house, his father-in-law, General Tracy, of the United States Senate,

occupied before him—one of the most lively and pugent wits of the age of Washington. Our county has also, from the first, been peculiarly fortunate in the character of its

eligious pastors and teachers.

Joseph Bellamy, the most powerful pre er of his day, and whose works are sought for an sch lish language is spoken, spent almost his en-tire ministerial life in the little town of Bethlem. Jonathan Edwards, the younger, passed the last years of his ministry in Colebrook, on our northern border, and there wrote some of his most elaborate and finished works. From that place he was called to the presidency of Union college, and died in that office soon after his removal. The late learned and pious Bishop Griswold, of Massachusetts, commenced his ministry in this county, and continued for several years in charge of the Episcopal churches in Plymouth, North-field and Harwinton. Azel Backus, the justly renowned president of Hamilton College, in the state of New York, succeeded Dr. Bellamy as pastor of the church in Bethlem, in 1791, and remained there in the pastoral office twenty-four years. Edward Dorn Griffin, afterward president of Williams Col-lege, was for several years pastor of the Congregational church in New Hartford. Ebenezer Porter, president of the theological seminary at Andover, Mass., was born in Cornwall, and for sixteen years was pastor of the church in Washington, in this county. John Graham a native of Scotland, and a son of the Duke of Montrose, was for forty years minister at Southbury, then a part of Litch-field county. "He was a learned theologian and a consistent, devoted and indefatigable pastor, universally revered for his piety, and exercised an extensive influence in all church affairs throughout the State." To Stop Bleeding.—Ass Kemper, Ro Co., Ohio., writes to The American Agricul-turist that bleeding from a wound on man or turist that bleeding from a wound on me beast may be stopped by a mixture of wheat flour and common salt, in equal parts, bound on with cloth. If the bleeding be profuse, use a large quantity, say from one to three pints. It may be left on for hours, or even days, if necessary. A Dog TRIP.-The St. Cloud Democrat gives an interesting account of the trip of Gov. Barber of Dakota of five hundred miles on a sled pulled by dogs. He traveled from Selkirk to St. Cloud. The vehicle is a very thin board split from an oak log. It is about as wide as a chair-seat, and eight feet long. It is bent upward in front like a sled-runner and lies flat on the snow. The first of the three courses is the best, and would be that of a statesman. The second is the next best course, because the most successcourses is the best, and would be trait of a statesman. I second is the next best course, because the most successful war could only lead to the same result, after inflicting an amount of suffering and calamity upon the country at which the imagination is appalled. As for now restoring the revolted States to the Union by war, that is the wildest chimera that ever entered the brain of man.

If is a noteworthy fact that among all the marines, sailors, and soldiers now going South, not a solitary Republican leader can be found. These are the philosophers that lay the train for an explosion; that place the gunpowder and prepare the faggots, but when somebody is wanted to apply the match, these are the very philosophers that are not there. CIVIL WAR COMMENCED.

Civil war has begun! General Beauregard, in accordance with instructions received on Wednesday, from the Secretary of War of seven minutes after four o'clock. Forts Johnson and Moultrie, the iron battery at Cum mings' Point, and the Stevens' Floating Bat tery, kept up an active cannonade during the entire day, and during the whole night. The damage done to Fort Sumter had been, up to the last accounts, considerable. Guns had been dismounted, and a part of the parapet swept away. Major Anderson had replied vigorously to the fire which had been opened upon him, but despatches represent the injury inflicted by him to have been but small. The utmost bravery had been exhibited on both sides, and a large portion of the Charles ton population, including five thousand la dies, were assembled upon the Battery to witness the conflict. The battle was carried on solely by the batteries of the revolutionists and Fort Sumter. The Harriet Lane, Captain Faunce, the Pawnee, and another United States vessel, were off the harbor, but had taken no part in the conflict. The Harriet Lane is said to have received a shot through her wheelhouse.

The opinion prevailed in Charleston that an attempt would be made during Friday night to reinforce Fort Sumpter, by means of small boats from the three vessels seen in the

No one had been killed by the fire of Major Anderson and the casualties among the Confederate troops in the batteries were inconsiderable. There is, of course, no account of the loss, if any, among the garrison of Fort

It is not unlikely, in the present aspect of affairs, that hostilities will soon begin, if they have not already commenced, at Fort Pickens. The same policy that dictated the bombardment of Fort Sumter, before the arrival of reinforcements, no doubt directed similar perations at Pensacola.

If any good result could come of using lorce against the seceded States, there might be a plausible reason for its exercise. As it is, the most cogent argument we have heard is, that we shall thus determine "whether we have a government." With all respect for those who feel solicitude on that point, we suggest that one thing is likely to be demonstrated, viz., that we have not, and in the event of thes ubjugation of the Southern States are not likely to have such a government, as the Constitution contemplates, or such as our fathers undersod to be instituted, when the Union was formed. The Government then established, was a Government of equals, in which all the States would perform willing parts. The one which our warlike friends, propresented it seems—by the Lincoln Administration, would prove to exist, is a government of force, where a majority of States, or of the Representatives, as the case may be, shall hold the minority in subjection to their will. If it is to demonstrate this fact, that war is to be precipitated upon the country, then we doubt whether the motivo is one of humanity—much less of right.

NEWS SUMMARY.

Kelley's Island, in Lake Erie, near Sandusky, is famous for its vineyards. The number of acres on this island set to grapes is two hundred and thirty; of these sixty-two are in bearing; the others were set in 1859 and 1860. These are divided among fiftyseven proprietors, each one having a vinevard of from one to twenty three scres. About one-tenth of the land is occupied. In one of the vineyards the vines are six feet apart one way and eight feet the other. At hree years the yield should be three thousand pounds to the acre, which is about half crop, but an acre in full bearing will produce seven thousand pounds, worth four hundred and fifty dollars. About one sixth of the grape crop this year was made into wine. The value of last year's crop, which was about twenty acres in extent, was eight thousand dollars; there are sixty-two acres of grapes, worth one hundred and forty dollars er acre: in all twenty-five thousand dollars. An ox belonging to a Pennsylvania farmer

was grazing near where he was at work ma king fences. Unfortunately the animal stepped into one of the post-holes and broke his leg. As it was too lean to kill, the farmer consulted a physician who lived close by and the result was, that it was determined to cut off the broken leg. The ox refused food one day only, atter taking off its leg. A wooden leg was substituted in proper time, and when the ox was finally killed, it presented as fine a beef as seen in the Philadel

The Steamship Tennessee has arrived with Vera Cruz dates to April 13th. A conducta of \$3,000,000 arrived at Vera Cruz on the 13th, and two and a half millions was taken by British packets. Lerdo de Tejada is ad. The roads to the Capital were newly atrolled. Juarez has certainly been elected President. GREAT EXCITEMENT IN CHARLES TON.

THE HARRIET LANE REPORTED SUNK

CHARLESTON, April 13, 10.30 A. M.-At intervals of twenty minutes the firing has been kept up on Fort Sumter all night. Anderson ceased firing at six in the evening. He was engaged all night in repairing damages and in protecting his barbette guns.

He commenced to return the fire at seven this morning. He seems greatly disabled .-The battery at Cummings Point does Fort Sumter great damage.

At nine a dense smoke poured from Sumter. The federal flag was displayed at half mast, signalling distress.

The shells from Fort Moultrie and Morris Island fall into Anderson's stronghold thick and fast. They can be seen in their course from the Charleston armory.

The breach made in Sumter is on the side facing Cumming's Point. Its port holes are knocked into one, and the walls from the top are crumbling.

Three vessels and one large steamer are over the bar and seem to be preparing to participate in the conflict. The ships have not yet opened fire.

LATER

An explosion has occurred at Sumter. A dense smoke was suddenly seen to rise. Anderson ceased firing for about an hourfing still up.

ANOTHER ACCOUNT.

CHARLESTON, April 13 .- Morning .- An other account says the batteries at Sullivan's Island, Cumming's Point, and Stevens' battery are pouring shot and shells into Fort Sumter. Anderson does not return the fire. Sumter is still on fire.

SECOND DISPATCH.

CHARLESTON, 2 e'clock.—Anderson's magasines have exploded. Only occasional shots are fired at him from Fort Moultrie. The Morris Island battery is doing heavy work.



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
