A QUEER PEOPLE.—Chamber's Journal, liscussing a recent book of missionary travels in Africa, thus alludes to one of the tribes which are found in that terra incognita: But the strangest of all are the stories told of the Dokos, who live among the moist, warm bamboo woods to the south of Kaffa and Susa. Only four feet high, of a dark olive color, savage and naked, they have neither houses nor temples, neither fire nor human food. They live only on ants, mice and serpents, diversified by a few roots and fruits; they let their nails grow long, like talons, the better to dig for ants, and the more easy to tear in pieces their favorite snakes. They do not marry but live indis-crimitive lives of animals, multiplying very rapidly, and with very little maternal instinct. The mother nurses her child only for a short time, accustoming it to eat ants and serpents as soon as possible, and when it can help it-self, it wanders away where it will and the mother thinks no more about it. > all people yet discovered to that terrible cousin of humanity—the ape. THE TUNNEL OF THE ALPS .- The engineers employed in boring the eight mile tunnel under Mount Cenis, in Savoy. I put into operation an ingenious device for supplying the tunnel with air, which dis penses with any necessity for the construction of vertical shafts. They work the boring machines in the tunnel by means of compressed air furnished by stationary engines on the outside. Thus there is no smoke and heat in the tunnel, and the air forced in keeps up an adequate circulation, without which the laborers would soon suffocate. There was considerable difficulty, at first in the adjustment of the pipes and valves, but they have been at work since the first of January with great success. The engineers now fear no other obstacle to the rapid progress of the great work, unless some of the almost unfathomable little lakes on the mountain should be tapped, letting in a sudden and destructive deluge upon the workmen and machinery.

THE EFFECT OF SHOT.—A shot does not make a hole of its own size right through wood, but indents it, the fibres springing back after the shock. Generally, the course of shot can only be traced by a wire, some times by a hole as large as a man's finger The damage most often happens in the inside of a vessel, in splintering and breaking the wood, after the main force of the shot was spent. Forts Hamilton and Richm which are about a mile apart, with a vesselying between them, could not, with their guns, send shot through two feet of its timber. There is rarely an instance where a ship was sunk by a solid shot. Hot shot and shells do the mischief; the latter will sometimes make apertures several feet in extent, through the sides of vessels.

BARLEY BREAD .- The bread made according to the following recipe is excellent, and by many persons is preferred to the best wheaten bread. Take three-and-a-half pounds of barley meal, mix them well together in a large earthen par, add yeast and warn water, and then leave the dough to rise for one hour. It must then be kneaded and well worked together for twenty minutes, after which, make the above into a single loaf, put it into the oven, and let it bake for four hours Care should be taken that the barely is ground fine, and well sifted from the bran through a

Put the spirits and the gums to-gether in a vessel that can be closely corked; place them near a warm stove, and frequen ly shake them; in two or three days the will be dissolved; strain the mixte a piece of muslin, and keep it tightly corked

#### THE REINFORCEMENT OF FORT SUMTER.

The judgment of Gen. Scott and Col. Tot ten, (both eminent in the military profession,) was that Fort Sumter could not be reinforced without a great sacrifice of life, which sacrifice would not be justified by any advantages to result therefrom to the Government or the country. But President Lincoln and his Abolition Cabinet, it seems, thirsted for blood; and discarding the advice of Gen. S. to evacuate the fort, as a choice of evils an expedient preferable to the shedding of blood, went to work secretly concocting plan for throwing additional troops into that fort. The result of their mad determination thus to inaugu and a civil war is now before us-a matter o ....story. Their attempt to needlessly reinforce the fortress proved an utter failure. The winds, and storms, and tides, under the direction of an over-ruling, merciful God, intervened and frustrated the fratricidal plan. As was foreseen, the enraged people of the seceded States, accepted the bloody alternative thus forced upon them by the Cabinet, and commenced active operations against the fort at once, and in defence of what they regard as their rights. Success crowned their efforts-and the fortress is now in their hands; fortunately without the loss of a life on either side. How much better it would have been for all, if the advice of Gen. Scott had been adopted, and the fort been evacuated without any attempt at force. Having thus needlessly, wantonly inaugurated war, and been forced to evacuate a fortress that was of no earthly consequence to the Government, the President now calls upon the people to sustain him in a military crusade thus madly begun against our brethren of the South. How many lives are to be sacrificed in this crusade, remains to be seen. Our prayers are for peace. Our hopes are that some plan will yet be adopted to stop the tide of desolation and bring about a reconciliation between the hostile parties.

#### WASHINGTON AND SOUTHERN NEWS.

Fort Sumter has fallen! Major Anderson and his comrades, after a struggle of some forty hours' duration, in which he sustained a heavy and continuous fire from the batteries of the Southern Confederacy forces, that not only greatly damaged the fort, but also set on fire the wooden structures within it, struck his flag and surrendered. It is stated positively, however, that none of the officers of the garrison were wounded; neither were any of the Carolinians killed. Five of the garrison of Fort Sumter were wounded. The fleet off the harbor took no part in the conflict. Major Anderson and his men were conveyed to Morris Island, and subsequently Major Anderson proceeded to Charleston, where he was the guest of General Beauregard. It is stated that the Major and his men were sent to New York on Sunday night in the steamer

The President and the Commissioners appointed by the Virginia State Convention to oolicy in regard to the seceded States, had a formal interview on Saturday at the White House. The President referred the Commissioners to his inaugural address for an exposition of his policy, and stated that he did not intend to invade any State or community, but at the same time assured the Commissioners that if the Southern Confederacy had made war for the purpose of driving the govrnment from the possession of its property, he should not only do his utmost to hold all the forts now in possession of the government, but would speedily proceed to retake those already seized, and, in any event, to the best of his ability, repel force by force. In accordance with these views, the President has issued his proclamation, calling for seventy-five thousand men to take the field forth-

During the fire, when Major Anderson's flag staff was shot away, a boat put off from Morris Island, carrying another American flag for him to fight under-a noteworthy in stance of the honor and chivalry of the South Carolinians, and their admiration for a brave

Major Auderson expresses himself much pleased that no lives had been sacrificed, and says that to Providence alone is to be attributed the bloodless victory. He compliments the firing of the Carolinians, and the large number of exploded shells lying around attests their effectiveness.

The public feeling in Charleston against the fleet is very strong, it being regarded as cowardly to make not even an attempt to a ic fellow officer.

When Colonel Chesnut, Aid of General Beauregard, went to offer assistance, after the fire, he says the fort was like an oven, and he could hardly breathe. It was so hot that Major Anderson received him in one of the casemates. Inquiry being made how many were killed, he said "None." "Hew many on your side?" "None," was the response. "Thank God," replied Major Anderson, "there has been a higher Power over us."

Major Anderson says it is preposterous to fight such a people. One of the officers in the fort remarked that they had endeavored not to fire on exposed individuals. "Yes," said Major Anderson, "I gave orders not to

sight men, but silence batteries." Fort Moultrie is badly damaged. The officers quarters and barracks are torn to pie The frame houses on the island are riddled with shot in many instances, and whole sides of houses are torn out.

It is stated that Major Anderson is highly ncensed against the United States officers for not coming to his assistance during the fire, in response to frequent signals of dis

Before going into action, Major Anderson sent word by an aid of General Beauregard to the Governor, thanking him for kind attentions during the past two months, and very solemnly said "farewell, gentlemen.-If we do not meet again here, I hope we shall meet in a better world."

When Major Anderson evacuated with his command, he saluted his flag, and the company, then forming on the parade ground, marched out upon the wharf, with drum and fife playing "Yankee Doodle."

#### BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES. A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, The laws of the United States have been for some time past, and now are opposed, and the execution thereof obstructed in the States of South Carolina, BOOK PRIN INC. Georgia, Alabama, Florida Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas, by combinations too powerful to be suppressed by the ordinary course of judicial proceedings, or by the powers vested in the marshals by law; now therefore I, ABRAHAM LINCOLN, President of the United States, in virtue of the power in me vested by the Constitution and the laws, have thought fit to call forth, and hereby do call forth the militia of the several States of the Union to the aggregate number of seventy five thousand, in order to suppress said combinations, and to cause the laws to be duly executed.

The details for this object will be immedi ately communicated to the State authorities through the War Department. I appeal to all loyal citizens to favor, facilitate and aid this effort to maintain the honor, the integrity and the existence of our national Union, and the perpetuity of popular government, and to redress wrongs already long enough endured I deem it proper to say that the first service assigned to the forces hereby called forth, will probably be to repossess the Forts, places, and property which have been seized from the Union, and in every event the utmost care will be observed, consistently with the object aforesaid, to avoid any devastation, any destruction, of, or interference with property, or any disturbance of peaceful citizens, in any part of the country; and I hereby command ne persons composing the combinations foresaid, to disperse and retire peaceably to their respective abodes, within twenty

days from this date. Deeming that the present condition of public affairs presents an extraordinary occasion, I do hereby, in virtue of power in me invested by the Constitution, convene both Houses of Congress. The Senators and Representatives are therefore summoned to assemble at their respective Chambers, at twelve o'clock, noon, on Thursday, the fourth day of July next, then and there to consider and determine such measures, as, in their wisdom, the public safety and interest may seem to demand.

In witness whereof, 1 have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington this fifteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixtyone, and of the independence of the United States the eighty-fifth, By the President,

ABRAHAM LINCOLN. WILLIAM H. SEWARD, Secretary of State.

Dr. E. J. Fountain, of Davenport, Iowa, had an idea that chlorate of potash would cure consumption. Last summer he read a paper on the subject before the National Medical Convention at New Haven. It attracted muchattention in that body, and he was re quested to continue his labors another year. The report is that he has been experimenting on himself with small doses of this medisine, gradually increasing them, till, a few days since, he took an ounce, which proved too much for him, and he died.

CHARLESTON, April 15 .- Anderson's quarters are burning. Beauregard sent offers of assistonce before

NEW YORK, April 15-A special dispate to the New York Herald from Charleston says that Anderson saluted his flag. The company present formed his command on the parade ground and they marched out on the wharf, with drum and fife playing Yankee Doodle.

During the salute a pile of cartridges burs in one of the casemates, killing two and wounding four. One was buried in the fort with military honors. The others will be buried by the Charlestonians. The wounded men were taken to Charleston.

The fort is burnt to a mere shell. The guns on one side of the parapet are entirely nounted, others split, and the gun carriages knocked to splinters.

MILITARY BILL OF NEW YORK. ALBANY, April 15-The Assembly this morning took up the bill authorizing the Governor to enrol 30,000 men for public defence for two years, unless sooner discharged. They are to be officered, organized and equipped in such manner as the Governor directs, without regard to existing military districts, and be in addition to the existing military organization of the State. Officers and men are to receive the same pay and rations as the same in rank in the army of the United States, and be liable to be turned over to the service of the federal government on the order of the Governor. The remainder of the bill is detailed provisions for maintenance

The bill appropriates \$3,090,000 to carry out its provisions and takes effect immedi-

The bill has passed, and the Gover nor has issued a proclamation accordingly.
