CHINESE FARMING. An American never ceases wondering at the ingenuity and skill of the Chinese agriculturist in so arranging the crops and tillage of the soil as to secure the largest possible

of the soil as to secure the largest rossible yield of grain or vegetables from his acres.—
The staple crop of the valley of the river Yung, in which the old city of Ningpo is situated, is rice. Wheat is cultivated to some extent, and a variety of vegetables. Backwheat and beans grow well, and cotton is seen occasionally. The rice crop is, however, that on which the people mostly rely for their sustenance. The rice crop is transplanted from the little beds, where the grain is uproceed, into the rice fields, in the month of May. The grain is sown much earlier, in of May. The grain is sown much earlier, in a little bed, which is exposed to the warm sun, where it is a lowed to grow to the height of about two inches. The field being prepared for the planting, these plants are carefully removed from the bed. A few plants are taken up with earth enough upon the roots to secure them from perishing. This process of transplanting rice may be said to take place under water, as the fields are very wet at the time of the operation. Every spire of rice in this valley has been transplanted thus by the hand of the laborer. It orde to insure a crop, the first planting is followed by a second a few weeks later. This second plant is not so old as the first, and it is planted in the same field in alternate rows.

Great attention is paid to the application of manure while the plant is young. At the time of the transplanting, and for several weeks, men may be seen applying liquid manure directly to the plant. When the plant is fairly rooted and begins to grow, water is let on and the rice is fairly under The irrigation of the rice is accom by raising water from the river or canal by means of a buffalo and wheel attached to a very simple contrivance, which raises the very simple contrivance, which raises the water by means of a machine precisely similar to the chain pump run in wells in the United States. There are two crops of idea growing on the same ground at the same time one [considerably in advance of the other. The first matures, and in a good rice season is ready to harvest, in the month of August. As soon as the first is harvested the later plant, which had been shaded by the earlier growth so as to prevent it from coming forgrowth so as to prevent it from coming forward, now begins to grow. Another sprinkling of manure is applied, and it springs up, matures late in the autumn, say in October or November. Thus the same field is made to produce two crops of rice in one season, and this process is repeated with the same field year after year; often both these

crops are good, as is the case the present Should any outward event prevent the maturing of the early crop, the later one is looked to as the hope of the farmer.

The earth is by no means allowed to re-

main idle during the months intervening between the time of harvesting the late rice crop and planting the early. Immediately after the harvest is over steps are taken to dry the soil, as much as it can be done in this valley, where the water in the river at high tide is very little if any below the com-mon auriace of the ground. Then it is ploughed and thrown up into beds with trenches between, and thus prepared to re-ceive a winter crop. The ploughing is done by one animal—a buffalls—attached to the plough by a yoke and two ropes; like traces. The plough itself is a very primative aff ir, consisting of a very crooked wooden beam, one handle, and a small wrought iron point, DIAMONDS, WATCHES, JEWELRY, SILVER WARE, &c., SI plough is shallow, not exceeding two or three oches in depth Indeed, this ploughing is othing more than scratching over the surface of the earth. The preparation is mostly done by men who follow the plough; and with an instrument attached to a long handle. Ithe our garden rake, only having three or four teeth six inches long, the ground is torn to pieces, and nicely arranged in beds and trenches. This whole operation is often done when the soil is liferally saturated with water. I have seen farmers preparing their tie ds for planting when they were literally wading and working in the mud. - Cor. Eve

GREENHOUSE PLANTS IN ROOMS .- The Vaious greenhouse plants which are kept in come, require a contant supply of water, which hould always be applied on the tops of the pots, and from no consideration whatver should any be suffered to remain in the water pans or saucers under the pans, par-ticularly in the winter season, when they must also be kept clean from dead leaves When the plants begin to draw, which will be indicated by their weak and sickly appear-ance, and the branches growing long weak. ance, and the branches growing long weak the tops of the shoots should be just nippe off with finger and thumb, or a pair of soil sors, which will cause them to grow bush and handsome. They must also be famigated when there is any appearance of insects. With regard to air, the plants should have a good share in fine, warm weather. It is a very common, but not a good practice, to open the under sash window where the plants stand, as they are thus exposed to the draft, which injures them more than if they were entirely exposed to the open air. If the top sash be drawn up, or a window opened, where there are no plants, in fine weather it will prove beneficial. If the under sash be opened where the plants stand, they show moved out of the draft to some other part of

STAMPING GLASS .- The art of stamping glass has been successfully practiced for several years by Mr. Moore, of London and the process is thus described in the Mechanic ics' Magazine: - A sheet of glass is placed in a suitable furnace, and submitted to heat until it becomes romewhat soft. It is then taken out, placed between two cast iron plates, on of which has an impression on it in alto, and the other in relieve—that is, projected on one and indented on the other. These two places are then pressed together by a lever, and the glass compressed between them as in a mold.

We have always advocated the enforcement of the laws. We have protested against that disregard which has been shown by individuals and States for a fundamental law of the land. We have always decried that spirit of exultation and that adulation showered upon these who successfully resisted that law. We have protested against that feeling which led some to exalt as martyrs those who defied the law, or those whose duty it was to execute it. We have protested against that growing disregard of law in one section, which would ultimately result in the same feeling in another.

These are the sentiments we have expressed, as a public journal; a reverence for the Constitution; a love of the Union; and a desire that the laws should be enforced. We defy any one to turn to our record and see if we boast of any thing which that record will not prove. And yet we have in the bitterness of party spirit, been denounced as traitors; our devotion to the Union been jeered at ; our statements based upon facts, and our predictions, which have been verified, have been called lies. Even now the cry is raised against us as being traitors. If our devotion to the Union and Constitution; if our rebukes of sectionalism; if our love for the whole Union without regard to locality constitutes treason-then we are still traitors.

In the few months which preceded the commencement of hostilities, we urged upon the people the necessity of using something more than taunts and reproaches towards those of our brethren who thought a withdrawal from the Union a remedy for what they considered as wrongs. We counselled peace; we urged conciliation and compromise; we advocated a trial of that kindly feeling which a neighbor and friend would exercise toward another in a dispute. We were not ready to brand them as traitors: for knowing that human nature is the same everywhere, it is useless for one to claim that he is entirely honest and right and the other entirely dishonest and wrong.

The present is momentous; the future full of gloom. But is it too late yet for better feelings to work? It may be that our excited brethren even now are open to the convictions of reason, and sensible to expressions of kindness. A man may in the height of passion strike another but when that passion has subsided, he may thank Heaven that it has not proved fataland upon sober second thought, if more particularly their former relations have been pleasant and intimate, he may be ready to apologize and forget past differences. Huwhat they not otherwise would. Let us even now obey the dictates of reason.

War is a dire calamity, and is the last re sort of nations to settle differences. Diplo macy and negotiation are entirely exhausted before they will resort to the sword. If such a feeling actuates nations, how much more ought it to govern the citizens of a common country. Let peace be restored, if possible, now it is not too late. 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
