New York Correspondence of the School Bell.]

THE NEW YORK HOUSE OF REFUGE. This institution of Charity and Correction is carried on under the auspices of the Society for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquents, which was organized in 1825, and to the present day has continued with increasing success the noble enterprise over which they have control. Like most other great undertakings this had its origin under very disheartening prospects, and with very hum-

The house occupied at the beginning was formerly a U. S. Arsenal, and was located at the junction of the Bloomingdale with the old Boston Post-road, now 3rd Avenue. In 1839 it was removed to the foot of Twenty-third street, East River, and in the same year, the building was burned down-having been fired by one of the boys confined therein It was found to be impracticable to maintain the institution within the limits of the

city, and, therefore, on the 24th of November, 1852, the corner stone of the present magnificent pile of bpildings was laid on Randall's la-land, opposite 125ih street, the Hon. A. C. Kingsland, then the Mayor of the city of New

York, presiding.

As you pass down from Bridgeport to our city, and the steamer sweeps round the curve near Hell-Gate, bringing into view the bristling masts which swarm around our wharves, you must have noticed on your left a long succession of brick buildings, the centre

and two end structures capped by domes.

This, reader, is the subject of our sketch,

the male department of the New York

House of Refuge. While you are gazing
on its beautiful outlines, the steamer proceeds pretentions meets your view,—you are now beholding the girls' department.

Let us now land and in imagination proceed through the various wards of the house.
On entering we find ourselves in a circular room, about 38 feet in diameter, from which start two passages to the right and left as we start two passages to the right and left as we enter. These passages lead through a fire-proof hall to the long buildings on either side of us. Before proceeding further let us understand that everything is duplicated; that is, there are two separate classes of inmates, the good or well disposed and the bad or incorrigible,—otherwise, the "Sheep" and the "Goats." Therefore a line of distinction is observed between the two, and they are not observed between the two, and they are not allowed to associate in any way, one side of the main building being devoted to each class. There are two workshops, or rather than were until within a few days, when one of them was entirely destroyed by fire, in a manner which will be hereafter described. Their school building is in two divisions, and in the first story are their dining rooms.

With this preliminary sketch of the life of the Juvenile Delinquents, let us proceed on our tour and inspect the sleeping apartment or dormitory. Here in a lofty room, well ventilated and lighted by 24 high windows, are eighty-eight little bedrooms, each containing an iron bedstead with comfortable looking mattrasses, and overspread with a looking mattrasses, and overspread with a nicely pieced bed-quilt; to each room is a cast iron door, not heavy enough to give us the idea of a prison cell, but sufficiently strong to door, not heavy enough to give us the idea of a prison cell, but sufficiently strong to withstand the attempts of boys who might venture to escape, unless aided by some powerful instrument. These doors are all locked and unlocked by a single movement of a lever in charge of the keeper. We have noticed a similar arrangement in the Jall on Broad street, in Bridgeport. There are on the story above us 88 similar rooms, and these being duplicated in the other wing of the building, give accommodations for 362 boys. When we contemplate the wretched condition of the little vagrants before they condition of the little vagrants before they have entered this Asylum, sleeping in the streets, and stealing or begging their daily bread, we cannot but be should be so hardened and ungrateful as to desire to escape from their benefactors, and betake themselves again to their miserable haunts. Such is unhappily the case; but not stopping to moralize, we must hasten our steps, or we shall, even in imagination weary before we have completed our visit.

Ascending to the floor above we find mat

rially the same arrangement as on the floor we have left; but reaching the next story we are ushered into the Chapel. Here is a room as large as the body of an ordinary country meeting house, with the seats descending to the front. Everything is characterized by a sacred simplicity, and the very atmosphere seems pervaded with a holy calmass. In this Chapel every Sunday morning are gathered the little friendless outcasts to listen to the Word of Truth, as it is here proclain in a manner suited to their compr by the Chaplain, Mr. Richard Horton, and ministers of various denominations from the city. While reflecting on the influence of this solemn worship over the deprayed minds of these youthful outlaws, we are reluctantly brought in view of a high partition, separat-ing the audience into two parts; this is the before mentioned line of distinction between the ood and the bad.

Another flight of stairs brings us to the garret; but there being nothing of particular interest on the floor, we will take a run up into the dome and land in the cupols. To reach this cupola is no easy matter, as it is about forty feet above us; but taking a long breath to start with, we ascend the first steep narrow staircase to a landing, from here we marrow staircase to a landing, from here we must go on up, up, until the circles around gradually diminish from a diameter of 38 feet to 12 feet, and we are standing on the little circular floor of the cupola—about 112 feet above the ground. Long could we remain here as if apell bound by the grandeur of the spectacle, but we must descend from our lofty position and resume our in pection of the pro On this floor are th :ee immense tanks-one in the centre building directly under the dome we have vacated, and the other two under the domes on the end buildings 600 feet apart; through these three tanks there is a free circulation of water, and so level is the w structure that the water varies but one-eight of an inch in height in the two at the ends.

Suppose now it is four o'clock, P. M. We retrace our steps to the circular room we first entered, and passing out to the rear we come into the dining room. Here are long tables or benches of nicely accured pine, and all along them are rows of yellow bowls and bright tin cups—the former containing rice and milk the latter cold water. The doors are opened, the long line of boys ale into their places, the w murmuring of thanks to the Bountiful Giver is heard, and with a signal from the overseer, the rattle of spoo commences. You smile at the oddity of such a repast, but you must remember that this is their evening meal, and they do not need the more substantial food which is furnished them

Happy now are these once starved crea tures, for without a thought of that foolish pride which is the bane of all misfortune to their wealthier fellow beings, they eat such things as are set before them and bless God s kindness. The day's work is done, their supper is partaken of, and now they march to the schoel-room overhead. Anticipating this movement we arrive in the room before them, and look around the spacious apartment. Such a school-room you have never before seen, and those who are not with us have missed one of the most beautiful sights imaginable. Its shape is an octagon, 66 feet from side to side: the ceiling is supported by its own downward pressure; the rafters tending to the eight corners are brightly varnished, and overhead is a cupola or skylight, shedding a clear light on the scholars, most of whom study with diligence : but of course there are some few exceptions to the general rule .-They labor under one great disadvantage in not beginning their scholastic life until they are frequently fifteen years of age, conse quently their progress is very slow; but you good readers in he school you attend. General Hendquarters State of Connecticut ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE. ? Hartford, April 18, 1861. General Orders No. 236.

In compliance with the requisition of the President of the United States for a second regiment of Militia from this State, for imhate service, the Commander-in-Chief directs that volunteers be accepted and enrolled sufficient to organize a second regiment of Infantry and Riflemen, consisting of ten companies, and held in readiness for muster into the service of the United States.

Each company will consist of one captain, one first lieutenant, one second lieutenant, four sergeants, four corporals, one drummer one fifer, and sixty four privates.

The regiment will consist of one cold one lieutenant colonel, one major, one adjutant (who will be a lieutenant of one of the surgeon, one surgeon's mate, one sergeantmajor, one quartermaster sergeant, one drum-major, one fife-major, and ten companies. No man under the rank of commissioned

officer, who is under eighteen or over fortyfive years of age, or who is not in physical ngth and vigor, will be received. Arms and equipments will be furnished the troops when they are mustered into ser-

vice, at which time they will have the orization of the regular army, and receive the same pay and allowances. The term of service will be three months from the time of arriving at the place of ren-

dezvous, unless sooner discharged. Such companies already organized as may tender their services, or such voluntary con panies as may organize themselves with the requisite officers will be accepted and their officers duly commissioned by the Governor. All companies will immediately rendez-

Before the car had gone twenty yards, almost every window therein was broken to pieces, and a portion of the crowd followed a considerable distance hurling paving stones. standing on the platform, hastily jumped off to avoid the shower of stones. The eighth car was treated in the same manner, but the ninth car, apparently being empty, or at least no person being visible, escaped with only one stone. The crowd exulted in their work that the Republicans should not pass through Maryland. A lapse of five minutes succeeded. A number of respectable persons in the meanwhile urging the crowd to tear up the track. After the first train had passed one was ob-

served on Pratt Street Bridge, when anchors were dragged on the track at the corner of Gay street, and a part of the track was taken up.. The guns of the soldiers that had fallen wounded were seized and fired upon the ranks with the fatal effect in two or three instances.
