BAWKING.

Hawking was not unknown to the Roma in the early part of the Christian era, but was first introduced into England from the north of Europe during the fourth century. In 920, the Emperor Henry was called the Fowler, on account of his fondness for the sport. In the eleventh century, when Canute, king of Denmark and Norway ascended the English throne, the amusement became more and more prevalent. After the ascension of William of Normandy to the English throne, none but persons of the highest rank were allowed to keep hawks. The killing of a deer, or boar, or even a hare, by a serf, was punished with the loss of the delinquent's eyes, when the killing of a man could be atoned for by paying a moderate sum. In the twelfth century this was the favorite re-creation of all the kings and nobles of Europe. "It was thought sufficient for noblemen's sons to wind the horn and to carry their hawk fair, and leave study and learning to the children of meaner people." This diversion was in so high esteem all over Europe that Frederic, one of the emperors of Germany, thought it not beneath him to write a treatise on hawking. In 1481 Juliana Beners, sister of Lord Berrners, and prioress of the nunnery of Sopewell, wrote a tract on falconry, which was loudly applauded by her contemporaries, and became what Hoyle has on games, a standard treatise. In 1615 and 1619 two works on the same subject

were published in London, the former by Gervase Marham, the latter by Edmund Bert. In the thirteenth century, the arbitrary law of William, then duke of Normandy, was somewhat modified by King John, "allowing every freeman to have his eyries of hawks, falcons, &c., in his own woods." In the fourteenth century, Edward III., of England, made it felonly to steal a hawk or take the eggs, and "punished the offender by imprisonment for one year and one day, together with a fine, at the king's pleasure." Any person finding a hawk was to carry it to the sheriff of the county, who was immediately to cause a proclamation to be made in all the principal towns in the county. Each falcon had a ring put around his leg with the owners name engraved on it, and a small round bell was suspended from the neck of the bird, so that it might be discovered when lost in the chase. Any attempt of the finder to conceal or appropriate it was to be punished the same as tealing. In the reign of Queen Elizabeth, the imprisonment was reduced to three months, but the culprit was to lie in prison

till he got security for his good behavior for seven years The dignitaries of the Church, even, indulged in the sport, and the poet Chaucer represents them as being more learned in hunting than in divinity. During the middle ages a European showed his rank by having a hawk on his fist, and when he died the bird was generally carved on his monument.—
Among the Welsh princes the king's falconer
was the fourth officer in the State; yet he
was forbidden to "take more than three drams of beer from his horn, lest he should get drunk and neglect his duty." The Grand Falconer was one of the most illustrious officers of the courts of Europe. The Grand Falconer of France had four thousand floring per annum, was allowed three hundred hawks and had fifty gentlemen and fifty attendants to follow him. He rode out with the king on

all great occasions.

The prices paid for falcons were enormous. In the reign of James I., Sir Thomas Monson paid five thousand dollars for a pair. In Persia, the Ger-Falcon of Russia is not allowed to be kept by any person except the king, and each bird is valued at fifteen hundred crowns. Hawks were sent as royal tokens HE PLACE TO GET from kings to kings, and formed a customary sent from the sovereign to the a of a friendly Power. In more ancient times, they were bequeathed as valuable and hon-orable legacies, with the injunction, "that the legatee should behave kindly and dutiful-ly by the said bird."

The sport suffered no decline on the accession of the Tudors. Henry VII. made laws about hawking, as did also Queen Elizabeth, who occasionally 'indulged in the amusement with the ladies of her court. Sir Walter Raleigh, alluding to her sylvan sport, com-pares her and her retinue to the goddess Diana and her nymphs. John of Salisbury, who wrote in the thirteenth century, said "that the women even excelled the men in the knowledge and practice of falconry."—
Henry VIII. followed the sport until he grew
so fat and unwieldy that he fell into a ditch
where the "bottom had fallen out," and would have drowned but for the assists

a John Moody. Says Hall, "God in his good-nesse preserved hym." In 1531, Sir Thomas Elyot "lamented that providing the numberless hawks then kept by the English gentry with their cus-tomary food of hens almost threatened the total extinction of the valuable race of domestic poultry." In 1536, in the two seventh year of the reign of Henry VIII., owing to the inroads made upon the game, he issued a proclamation to protect them. and made it imprisonment, and such other punishment as should seem meet to his high-ness the King, for "any paren, of whatever rank, who should kill, or many way molest herons, partridges, and pheasants, from his palace at Westminster to St. Giles's-in-the-Fields, and from thence to Islington, Hamp-stead, Highgate, and Hornsey Park." In the seventeenth century, hawking was

classed among "the amusements of squires, and country gentlemen generally."

The greatest falconer of modern times was one of the Lord Oxfords, who died towards the close of the last century. This nobleman spent a princely fortune in attempto revive an obsolete taste. He had a le number of hawks and a regular establishment of falconers. Each hawk had its separate atendant; "they all were sent on occasional voyages to the continent, for the sake of a more congenial atmosphere during their time of moulting."

Having now traced falconry through the English dynasty, and as they confined it

mostly to the smaller game, I will give some account of it among other nations who have carried it to a greater degree of perfe There was no nation in Europe prior fifteenth century but what the Emperor,
Kings or Nobles, indulged in this sport, and
it was considered "as the exclusive attribute
of noble blood." Even in China and Tartary in the thirteenth century, it was strictly for-bidden "to every tradesman, mechanical husbandman, throughout his Majesty's do-minions, to keep a hawk or any other bird minions, to keep a hawk or any other bird used for the purpose of game or any sporting dog." In China, Tartary, India, and some other eastern nations, they capture the stork, swan, heron and hubara with their falcons, and train dogs to act in concert w

The description given by Johnson of the number and magnificence of the hunting retinue of the Nabob-Vizir of Lucknow makes it nearly, if not quite, equal to that of the Emperor of Tartary and China, as described above. The Persians have a particular kind that they train to fly at antelopes, and to act in concert with dogs. The hunts-men proceed to a plain, or, rather, desert, near the sea-side, with hawks on their hands. and greyhounds led in a leash. When an antelope is seen, they endeavor to get as near as possible; but the animal, the moment that it observes them, goes off at a rate that seems swifter than the wind; the horsemen are instantly at full speed, having slipped the dogs. If it is a single deer, they at the same time fly the hawks, but if a herd, they wait till the dogs have fixed on a particular antelope. The hawks skimming along near the ground, soon reach the deer, at whose head they pounce in succession, and with so great violence as to confuse the animal so much as to slow his speed in such a degree that the dogs can come up, and in an instant, men, horse, dogs and hawks surround the unfortunate deer and capture it. The ante-lope is supposed to be the fleetest quadruped said to be wonderful and astonishing-the distance run, generally not exceeding three or four miles. This exhibits falconry in its highest state of cultivation.—Hartford Times.

FORT Mc. HENRY THREATENED. ARRIVAL OF A SPECIAL MESSEN-

PHILADELPHIA, April 22 .- A special messenger arrived last night as bearer of despatches from the President to General Patterson. He says the Capital is safe from any attack that can be made. Assailants can be baffled and repelled by troops now on the

The messenger had communicated with Fort McHenry. He traveled on horseback. and on foot. He passed himself off to scouting secession parties as a Methodist preacher. He reached Havre de Grace, crossed the city by a special train, crossed the Susquehanns in a skiff, and came to the city by a special train.

FURTHER FROM PHILADELPHIA. PHILADELPHIA, April 22.—Hon. Morrisen Lowry, special messenger from Washington, gives the following as his experiences :

He left Erie at midnight on Thursday, and did not witness the first fight, but did the that the Massachusetts regiment, although more than a hundred men leveled with bricks, and their arms wrested from them, they did not fire until commanded by the Mayor of Baltimore. He telegraphed the Governor concerning the state of things at Baltimore, and that no more troops must go through by either railroad. He took the railroad at 3

He communicated personally with Secre. tary Cameron, Gen. Scott, and the President, what he witnessed. They were not prepared for any such intelligence. A Cabinet meeting was instantly called.

He told the President that Gov. Hicks was in the hands of the mob, that the beidges on all the roads leading into Baltimore are destroyed by fire, and that every man was armed. He received a communication from Cameron to Gen Batterson and left on the 3 o'clock train. He is careful not to implicate those who have not the power of escaping from Maryland. When he came through Baltimore he was in communicating this morning. distance of Fort McHenry.

Lowry staid at a farm house in the neighborhood of Fort McHenry. He was satisfied that there was no safety in leaving during the R VOLUTION AT THE SOUTH night. He left at three o'clock in the morning and rode seven miles. He went to a house, the inmates of which, eight in number, were armed to the teeth. He knew that they were Union men. He remained too hours, and proceeded with a horse. His rig in the North would be a curiosity. He was met and stopped frequently, he was let off on professing to be a minister of the Gospel.

He got near Havre de Grace at one o'clock sunday morning and found four men fleeing for their lives, one a respectable merchant of Baltimore. He entered the telegraph office Philadelphia. He telegraphed to the President of the railroad his mission and that a special train should be sent immediately. He also took measures to get strangers over from the other side. The train arrived and took them to Washington, came through Philadelphia and had an interview with

He experienced no personal injury but is greatly fatigued.

They report the condition of things in Baltimore as fearful. Armed mobs parade the streets, compelling all persons to unite with them in imprecations against the North, the Government, and the Union. The principal streets were barricaded and many houses furnished with shutters in which loop-holes are cut.

Abbergen was surrounded by a mob of a dozen and a half drunken ruffians at the Eutaw House, who endeavored, by abusive language, to provoke a word of reply, intending, no doubt, to shoot him on the spot had he afforded them a pretext.

He was unable to get a revolver in Baltimore, stores having been emptied of arms by the mob. A prominent citizen, who is known as a Union man, was compelled to leave the city, at six hours notice with eight children.

PATRIOTIC FUND ASSOCIATION. NEW YORK, April 22 .- A corporation has been formed under the laws of the State, by some leading citizens, to maintain a permanent national patriotic fund for the care and support of the wives and children of the defenders of their country.




