MAJOR ANDERSON'S STATEMENT. Major Anderson, having, been applied to at the great meeting in New York on Saturday last for an account of the attack on and defence of Fort Sumter, said that he was too hoarse to talk himself, but he deputed one of his Lieutenants, who furnished, in substance, the following statement :

The forces of the Southern Confederacy op the 10th instant, had made every arrange-ment for an attack, and all their guns were manned. On the following morning, a demand was made on Major Anderson, by Gen. Beauregard, to evacuate the Fort. Major Anderson refused firmly to accede to this Anderson refused firmly to accede to this request, and in his answer remarked that he would probably be starved out in a few days. When this answer was received, Gen. Beaurewhen this answer was received, Gen. Beaure-gard despatched a messenger to the Fort, who inquired on what day the garrison would be starved out, and whether Major Anderson would agree not to open his batteries on the opposite forts meanwhile? The Major replied that he would probably be obliged to evacuate the Fort on Monday, before noos, and would not commence hostilities unless the troops fixed at his Fort or the retired for troops fired at his Fort, or the national flag which waved over it. or the vessels which bore it. When the answer was announced to Gen. Beauregard a consultation took p after which the General apprized Major Anderson, through a special messenger, that he would open his batteries on the Fort in one hour. All the preliminary arrangements were then made in Fort Sumter for the expected battle, and the command, having taken their positions, at and contiguous to the guns, were ordered not to leave the case till they were surrounded.

At precisely half past four o'clock, on the morning of the 11th, the South Carolina forces opened a terrible fire, with apparently increasing and damaging vigor, on Fort Sunter; but the fire was not returned until three hours after, when the men had taken breakfast. The halliards of the American flag were blown down by a heavy discharge of ball during the day; and the shot and shell, which ded in a fiery shower on the Fort, enveloped the flooring in flames. Several of the troops who could ill be spared, were or-dered to extinguish the fire. When they had succeeded, another conflagration was ob-served, and then a third, which, after the exserved, and then a third, which, after the exertions of hours, were put out. The men were thoroughly fatigued, and some of them almost exhausted, with the work. When night arrived it was unusually dark—so dark that neither aim or distance could be observed, and Major Anderson ordered the batteries to be closed. The Southern Confederacy troops, too, partially ceased firing, for the same rea-

On the 13th instant, Major Anderson again ordered the batteries to be worked and return a vigorous fire of the enemy. The rapid dis-charge of ball and shell from the Southern Confederacy batteries, contributed to make the scorched air around the Fort almost fatal to breathe. The fire of Gen. Beauregard's to breathe. The fire of Gen. Beauregard's troops was so desperate, that it was impossible to work the barbette guns, which had to be abandoned in consequence. The difficulties under which Major Anderson labored were increased by the fact that a portion of his men had to be employed in making cartridges, which caused intervals between the discharge of his guns not obtain intervals. discharge of his guns, not otherwise inte

On the morning of the 13th inst., the southeast portion of the barracks of the fort took fire, and the flames soon spread rapidly, threatening a fearful death to the gallant defenders. When the revolutionists observed the conflagration, they increased their fire, to the surprise of the officers of the fort, who did not expect such a preceding. Indeed, the impression was general that the troops of South Carolina would come over under a flag of truce and extinguish the flames.

Nearly all of Major Anderson's con were then engaged in the labor of reducing or putting out the fire, which spread so rap-idly that it approached the precincts of the were stored.

All the troops were then ordered to remove the powder, which, after dangerous labor, was covered with we blankets and taken out .-The precaution was rendered doubly necessary by the circumstance that the ordcors of the powder chamber were hot en almost to cause immediate ignition. The air, too, which surrounded the fort, we similar to the blast of an over heated furnace, and threatened immediate mortality among the men, who were obliged to cover their faces continually with wet cloths, to extend their continually with wet cloths, to extend their painful existence. Still the fire of the Revolutionists was kept up, and the powder which was saved in order to escape anticipated explosion had to be thrown into the sea. plosion had to be thrown into the sea. A few of the troops, however, manned the guns, with the object of showing by their weak and vain fire that they were still alive, and would die protecting the National Flag.

At this juncture, Gen. Beauregard despatched a messenger, inquiring if Major Anderson would evacuate the fort. Major Anderson would evacuate the fort.

derson replied that he was ready to so on the conditions he had named two days before, but the Major did not offer to surrender the fort. When Gen. Beauregard heard the reply, he sent another messenger to the fort, offering that Major Anderson might leave the fort on his own conditions—being in military phrase, the honors of war. Major Anderson accepted the proposition, and the steamer Isabel, belonging to the Revolutionists, afterwards come alongside the fort, when the commandant, troops and laborers embarked.

The American ensign was then lowered from the flag-staff of the fort, and placed over the Isabel, during which ceremony a salute of fifty guns was fired in respect to the colors. As the Isabel glided over the waters with the federal troops the American flag was raised, and a band on board struck

up "Yankee Doodle." The evacuation of the fort was a necessity, as existence there under the circum was almost an impossibility.

APPEARANCE OF MAJOR ANDERSON AND HIS COMMAND.

The Commandant of Fort Sumter presents, in his general appearance, vivid indications of having participated in a battle of long duration. Unless the war is everlasting, it must be eventually terminated by a treaty of peace.
It is waged (if waged for any rational purpose) to secure a better treaty at its termination than before it was commenced.

Now I most firmly and conscientiously

elieve that a better treaty, with fairer and more equitable terms, can be secured before of civilization and humanity require that conservative men of all parties should unite djusting our present difficulties by nego-

GRN. SCOTT AND FORT SUMTER.

The Standard respectfully asks of the Farmer to publish its authority for saying that General Scott advised the President not to attempt the reinforcement of Fort Sumter. Oh yes! A request so reasonable, and made in such courteous terms, could not appropriately be refused. So we proceed:

1st. In the Tribune of March 12th, is special dispatch from Washington, in which we find the following :

There is a great fever among the Republicans in the city, on account of the order for the retirement of the troops from Fort Sumter. Every man is feroclous at the bare idea of such a thing. The act is deprecated and denounced in every form of anathema; yet it is an act is which the Cabinet are compelled to be comparatively passive—they merely follow the judgment of Ger Scott, who advises the evacuation, and, of course, take the whole responsibility of the act.

2d. In the Tribune of the same date (March 12th) is another dispatch from Wasnington, in which we find the following There is no longer any doubt that Major Anderson's command is to be withdrawn from Fort Sumter. Gen Scott decides it to be a military necessity, and his judg ment determines the question, as it has done some other nearly as delicate. Conferences have been held for several days past, with Mr. Bache of the Coast Survey, in regard to the access to the Charleston harbor—with Mr. Totten of the Engineers, and with other distinguist officers of the different corps. After a full consultation it was agreed that the attempt to reinforce Fort Sum could only be made in two ways, and then with doubt

3d. In the Tribune of March 16th, w find the following under the editorial head: Generals Scott and Totten were present at the meet of the Cabinet yesterday, and gave their opinions as m tary men, in favor of the withdrawal of the garrison fr Fort Sumter, on the ground that it was impossible to inforce the post before starvation would compel it surrender.

4th. In the Tribune of March 28th, is an other special dispatch from Washington, in which we find the tollowing :

It can hardly be doubted, after the reports of Captain Fox and Col. Lamon, when taken in connection with the recommendation of Gen. Scott, and the highest engineer officers, that the President will soon approve the order for Major Anderson's withdrawal, which the sensation papers have so repeatedly announced as concluded a week ago. He has no other alternative.

Thus have we given the Standard "chapter and verse" of our authority for saying that General Scott advised the President not to attempt the reinforcement of Fort Sumter. Let it disprove the authority if it can.

Buts General Scott, it appears, was not alone in thus advising the President. The Tribune extracts show that General Totten, Chief of the Engineers, Col. Bache, Chief of the National Surveyors, together with Col. Lamon and Capt. Fox, officers who had been specially detailed to go to Sumter and make personal examinations on the subject : these extracts, we say, show that these distinguished officers united with Gen. Scott in advising the President not to attempt the reinforcement of Fort Sumter.

But again: In the Tribune of March 25th, is a special dispatch from Washington, in which we find the following:

Surveyor Fox, whose presence in Charleston and visit to Fort Sumter appears to have occasioned some excitement, carried no instructions from here in regard to the withdrawal of Major Anderson's command.


