Secession has been the order of the day for half a century or more among the churches, and, with such an example, it is not at all strange if it should begin to be the order of the day among the States of our Union. On any little difference of opinion, a company of Christians goes off and forms new Societies or a new Church, hating most cordially those they have left and holding no fellowship with them. Instead of holding together in love and trying to agree, the rule has been to withdraw and contend. The Episcopal Church has suffered in this way, though not to the extent of a complete division, nor as Church has suffered in this way, though not to the extent of a complete division, nor as much as other religious bodies. The Presbyterians have gone on seceding, until old divines among them profess not to be able to reckon up the different denominations of Presbyterians in the United States. How it has been with the Methodists and others we well know. Such has been the lesson taught by those calling themselves Christian, and it is not strange that the political world has profited by it. Had the churches, North and South, never rent asunder, it is doubtful and South, never rent asunder, it is do whether the States would have effect union. But, to their shame be it said, the churches have been pioneers in division, and if, with all the motives to unity among Christians, such a sad scene has been witnessed, who can blame worldly men for political strifes and alienations? When a large portion of the congregation of a celebrated popular preacher, who is the concentrated essence of his sect, rose in rebellion against their pastor, he acknowledged that it was the result of his own teaching, and professed to glory in the independence of thought and action displayed under his training, though possibly secretly mortified by it. He, and others like him, have sown the wind and must reap the whirlwind. Our first lesson, on the contrary, is "to honor and obey the civil auunion. But, to their shame be it said, the contrary, is " to honor and obey the civil au-thority, to submit ourselves to all our gov-ernors, teachers, spiritual pastors, and masters, and to order ourselves truly and reverently to all our betters." Had our church, imbued with such teaching, had her rightful place in numbers and influence in the land, he would have been, under God, its salva-

tion from present evils.

Political preaching is justly chawith no small share of our troubles; on this point our clergy are not blam.
Thousands of pulpits have rung with deciations of slavery and slaveholders, t disgust of many in the congregation, and not unfrequently to the breaking up of pastoral relations, or of the church. And while so employed, New England, once famed for its regard for the Sabbath and sanctuary, has employed, New England, once famed for its regard for the Sabbath and sanctuary, has become so changed, that statistical tables prepared by Congregationalists show that not one half of the people are attendants on any place of worship. And the South has perhaps been embittered against the North more by this political preaching than by any other cause, regarding it as the voice of the virtue and piety of the North, and so giving more weight to it. If every minister who has been engaged in such preaching had preached Christ crucified instead, and had spent the time and health that every such sermon cost in visiting Sabbath breakers and perishing sinners in his own vicinity, or in seeking to elevate the degraded blacks in his own township, who can doubt but that the whole country would have been more quiet, more abounding in fruits of righteousness, and every way the better for it. The puritant elergy of New England have attended to everybody's business but their own, and their own fields, as well as those in which they have intermeddled, show the sad consequences. We may be thankful for our own merciful exemption from political preaching, and from sectional divisions, though we have to mourn, as stated in the outset, that some of the spirit of secession and division has of the spirit of secession and division has crept in among ourselves.
