A THRILLING SERTOH. dventures of a Lady : Or, Navigating the Amazon a Century Ago.

BY LIEUT. RICHARD LEE, R. N. Without doubt the most astonishing and thrilling adventure ever undertaken by any female, of which we have any authentic ac-counts, was the remarkable voyage of the courageous Madame Godin down the Amacon, in the year 1769. Compared with this bold undertaking, the journeys of that eccentric voyager, Madame Pffeifer, sink into insignificance; while in point of suffering and endurance, and the terrible fate of her companions, it is approached only by the recent adventures of the heroic Lieut. Strain, in his passage acress the Isthmus of Darien. Pertaps no other woman ever underwent the fearful trials that this lady did, and survived them; for out of a party of eight persons who started with her, she alone reached her destination, all the others having succumbed to the terrible circumstances by which they were surrounded.

But I will relate the story as I have heard it frequently repeated in Brazil, where it is familiar to all intelligent persons.

Madame Godin was the wite of a French

Madame Godin was the wite of a French officer, who visited the country with a scientific corps, commissioned by his government. He had been directed to measure an arc of the meridian in the vicinity of Quito; and, accompanied by his wife, a highly accomplished and spirited lady, he crossed the continent from the Atlantic, and reached the city of Quito. Having accomplished the object of his journey to this place, it further became necessary for him to make some scientific obnecessary for him to make some scientific ob-servations among the Sierras: and leaving his wife at the town of Riohamba, he proceed-

ed to his task. Madame Godin having established an agr able acquaintance with the best people of Rio-bamba, and having the society of her brothers and some French friends, among whom were two other ladies, wives of members of the commission, it was determined by her hus-band to leave her behind for a time, while he should continue his explorations across the mountains again, and so on to Cayenne in French Guiana.

Having arrived upon the Atlantic coast, fonsieur Godin wrote to his wife, and directed that she should rejoin him there; and after some consultation-with her Ecuador

friends, she resolved to attempt the passage of the continent by way of the Amazon.

At this early period, the "King of Rivers" had been but partially navigated, and there were thousands of miles of its course, which, since the days of the Conquistadors, no Euro-pean had ever seen, and where scarcely the balsas of the wild Indians had ever ventured; balsas of the wild Indians had ever ventured; but amid a solitude, broken only by the howl of the tiger and the cougar, the bellow ings of alligators and river hogs, and the chattering of myriads of monkeys and parrots, flourished an impenetrable forest of tropical growth, the like of which is found nowhere the country of miles. ise on the earth. For thousands of miles through the heart of the continent, and borlered on either side by vast pampas, the homes of tarantulas, serpents, and other venomous reptiles, the mighty river held its course onward to the sea; and none knew whether rapids or waterfalls, or deep cannons or morasses, obstructed its free passage or or not. But there were traditions among the natives which led to the belief that there was an obstructed boat communication be-tween the head-waters of the Borbonasa where they emerge from the Siervas, to its mouth in the Great River, and thence to the Great Eastern Sea; and being possessed of an adventurous and fearless spirit, Madame Godin and her friends, securing the services of a number of Indians to conduct their oat, embarked at Canelos, on the Borbonasa,

boat, embarked at Canelos, on the Borbonasa, on their perilous but romantic voyage.

For several days they proceeded with but little difficulty, only occasional rapids making it necessary for them to disembark, and force their way through the tangled thickets of the banks while the natives laboriously worked the cance into deeper water. These incidents in their journey, however, only added to the variety of the trip, and gave them concerns. variety of the trip, and gave them opportunities to examine the vegetable and floral novelties of the region through which they

were passing.

After flowing through the broken and hilly country bordering the eastern slope of the Andes, and entering the fertile plains of the pampas, the Borbonaza debouches into the broader current of the Pastaza. At the the broader current of the Pastaza. At the confluence of these streams the travellers rested for a day at the little Indian town of Andoas; and then again launching their frail craft, pushed down the current in the direction of the Amazon, something like a hundred leagues to the south. But one night, while encamped upon the banks of the Pastaza, their Indian guides and boatmen, being alarmed by some superstitious fears, deserted the party and returned to their people, leaving the Europeans to navigate the wild stream as best they might.

The brothers of Madame Godin proposed to attempt the upward passage of the river, and obtain another party of Indians at Andoes, and then resume their journey. But to this the lady, impelled, no doubt, by a spirit of romantic adventure, objected, and, over persuaded by her, the geatlemen consented to continue down the rapid river.

The same day they were induced to land, by seeing footmarks upon the mud of the shore, and discovered a solitary hut, in which was one Indian, just recovered from a disease.

The man was fearly famished, and gladly consented to accompany the voyagers. But scarcely had they proceeded a league after this addition to the party, than one of the men lost his hat overbeard, when the Indian in attempting to recover it and atill antique. in attempting to recover it, and still suffering from debility, fell from the cance and was

A LESSON FROM BISTORY.

relating to our Revolutionary era, and from the pages of Marshall's Life of Washington, have been communicated to the National In telligencer by a correspondent learned in history and jurisprudence, who accompanies them with the expression of his hope that they may serve to illustrate and enforce the counsels of peace and forbearance which we endeavoring to impress on our countrymen at this critical juncture. These historical citations point a useful moral in deprecation of the dread arbitrament of war which so many at the North and South are now invoking for the settlement of pending dissenall experience, that war can only aggravate and render perpetual the resentments from which it springs. Let all the resources of both sides before an appeal is made to force. WHEREAS, the free institutions which were purchased for us by the blood and treasure of our fathers, and under which by the blessing of God we have enjoyed, and expected to enjoy as a nation forever, peace, prosperity, and happiness, are now imperilled by armed rebellion seeking their overthrow; and whereas, the people of this State are summoned not only by the constituted authorities of the land but by every consideration of duty, patriotism. and honor, to defend with their lives and fortunes that priceless heritage, RESOLVED, That we, the inhabitants of

Bridgeport, in Town Meeting assembled, beieving that in the maintainance of the Contitution and laws of the land are involved our liberty, our safety and the dearest rights of ourselves, our children, and of all mankind, do hereby solemnly pledge ourselves as indi viduals and as a community to support those sacred objects at all hazards and through

And whereas, many of the inhabitants of this town, with patriotic self devotion, have gone or will hereafter go forth at the call of he Federal and State Executives for the defence of our common liberties, leaving behind them families and others dependent upon them for support.

RESOLVED, That it devolves upon us to neet the self sacrificing spirit of these brave men who thus abandon their business and risk their lives for us, with responsive liberality;

therefore VOTED, That Russell Tomlinson, Joseph Thompson, P. H. Skidmore, B. K. Mills, F. W. Parrott, James Wilson, and S. C. Kingman, be a committee of seven on the part of the town to pay over for the assistance of the Pennsylvania, has gone to Philadelphia and families and others dependent upon the volunteers, inhabitants of the town, who shall go from this place under the present or future calls of the National or State Executives, such sum or sums of money as may be needed for their comfortable support, while said volunteers shall be engaged in their duties under such calls, or in case of their sickness or death in the discharge of such duties; that said committee be empowered and requested to make the entire arrangements respecting the persons to be aided, the amounts to b granted in each case, and the times and modes of distribution or payment, and respecting all other matters and things necessary to give effect to this vote; that they be authorized to employ all necessary assistance, and that they be empowered to draw for the purpose aforesaid from the Agent hereinafter appoint ed, at such times and in such sums as they shall deem best, an amount not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of ten thousand dol-

That a auditing committee shall be appointed at the next annual Town Meeting, or at a special Town Meeting called for that purpose, to whom said committee shall report all amounts drawn and appropriated by them under the foregoing vote, with vouchers for all expenditures and disbursements of the same.

And whereas, means are wanting to complete the equipment of volunteer companies from this town which have been or may hereafter be enrolled and accepted by the State

authorities for the present war—
VOTED, That Daniel H. Sterling, George Bacon, John C. Blackman, and Samuel B. Ferguson, Jr., be and they are hereby appointed a committee to complete or aid in the quipment of such companies at their discreion; and that they be authorized to draw for that purpose from the Agent hereinafter ap-pointed, in such sum or sums as they shall deem best, an amount not exceeding in the aggregate three thousand dollars. Provided nevertheless and said last appropriation is voted upon condition that no part or portion of any voluntary subscriptions heretoformade by individuals for said purposes of equip ment shall be repaid to them out of said fund; and also provided, that it shall be the duty of said committee to take all requisite steps for obtaining from the State at the earliest moe re-payment to this town of assume; and also provided, that an auditing committee shall be appointed at the san time and the same manner as is provided in the preceding vote, to whom said committee accountable for all monies received

and dishursed VOTED, That Daniel H. Sterling be ap pointed an Agent to borrow on the credit of the town, at such time or times as he shall deem advisable, such sum or sums as shall be required to carry into effect the preceding votes, not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of thirteen thousand dollars; that all drafts by either of the committees hereinbefore appointed shall be made upon him, and that he report at the next annual Town Meeting the amounts borrowed and held by him and the sums furnished by him to each committee re

spectively. VOTED. That this town hereby request the next General Assembly of this State to pass any proper act or acts that may be deemed necessary or advisable, to give full legal force and effect to the preceding votes of this Town Meeting; and that our Representative elect to said General Assembly be respectfully re quested to procure the passage of such act or earliest practicabl cts at the moment after the assembling of the Legislature.

VOTED, That the thanks of this town be and they hereby are extended not only to the brave men who go forth from among us at their country's call, but also the patriotic women and others of this town who have given time, labor, and money, at this time for the support of our laws and our liberties that we fervently pray to Almighty God to give success to the cause for which we con tend; and that we will all encourage each other to shrink from no effort and no sacrifice until constitutional freedom and the capacity of man for self-government are vindicated


