After having acknowledged so much, His Excellency, we think, should have made a "clean breast of it," and confessed that the law completely nullifies, and was intended to nullify, the law of Congress and the Constitution of the Union, in the matter of fugitive

This law, and those of other States for the same purpose, make the basis on which South Carolina and the other seceding States rest their first charge of broken faith against the Northern States-and there is no escape from the force of the charge. The laws themselves are witnesses that cannot be impeached -and place the truth of the charge beyond all just dispute. Such being the case, the responsibility of breaking up the Union rests chiefly on those who struck the first blow at the Constitution-and no amount of declamation, no sophistry, no blood and thunder fulminations, can shift this responsibility from the shoulders of those on whom the South have been careful to place it, in their Declarations of Secession and Independence.

On the other points upon which the South nake what the Governor calls "specific demands," it must be always borne in mind that their claims are fortified by decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States-the tribunal designated by the Constitution to finally determine all questions arising under it and under the laws passed in pursuance thereof. In preferring these claims, therefore, the South place themselves squarely and broadly upon the Constitution-supported and sustained by the solemn verdict of the highest National Court.

Thus the case stood, when the States ceded. The South occupied the position of defenders of the Constitution, and demanded their constitutional rights, after they had been solemnly adjudicated and settled, in the manner prescribed by the Constitution. The North, or the Republicans who constitute a majority of the North, occupied the position of violators of the Constitution; passed laws to prevent the faithful execution of its provisions, and refused to abide by the decisions of the National Supreme Court. Hence the secession of the Southern States. In the language of Webster, they said, " A bargain broken on one side is a bargain broken on all sides." On you rests the responsibility, be the consequences what they may. If you will not keep your plighted constitutional faith with us, we will separate ourselves from you, and leave you to pursue your own course, while we will pursue ours.

To shift this responsibility from the shoul ders of the Republican party of the North is now the task at which the leaders of that party are laboring with all their might. The Governor of North Carolina has oranized a camp of instruction at Raleigh He recommends the raising and organizing of ten regiments to serve during the war. He says the "Northern Government is now concentrating a large force in the District of government, but such a force cannot be alowed to remain within the limits of Mary land and on the borders of Virginia without seriously endangering the liberties of the people of those States; if they be conquered nd overrun, North Carolina will become the next prey to the invaders; policy, then. as well as sympathy and a feeling of brotherhood, engendered by a common interest, requires North Carolina to exert her energies in defence of Maryland and Virginia; every battle fought there will be a battle fought in behalf of North Carolina, and there the troops of North Carolina should be speedily sent.'

The Governor of Virginia has determined to station a large number of troops at Peters-

Gov. Letcher, of Virginia, it is said will is ue a proclamation forbidding the passage of Southern troops through the Old Dominion.

John M. Botts, of Virginia, heretofore trong Republican and supporter of Lincoln, and the man proposed in 1860, by the New York Tribune, as the Republican candidate for the Presidency, has come out in favor of the revolutionists. He writes to Attorney General Bates that he considers the dissolution of the Union inevitable; and that the South can never be subjugated, and urging the administration to offer a truce and call a national convention to recognize the indedendence of the Southern States.

A conference between the authorities of Kentucky and Illinois resulted in the former State guaranteeing that it will maintain a neutral position, and will permit no troops to ass over its soil to make aggressions upon the North; but at the same time it demand guarantees that no troops from Illinois shall attempt to pass through Kentucky, and enters a protest against the blockade of the river. It has been agreed upon that nothing but munitions of war shall be intercepted at Cairo, Ill.

The Government is determined to blockade the Southern ports completely, from James River, Va., to the Rio Grande, Texas, The blockading force under Capt. Stringham, says a Washington dispatch, is to consist of at least fifty vessels, accompanied by a sufficient number of steam transports to accommodate twenty thousand troops.

Advices from Pensacola say that the Conederate troops were working night and day on the batteries. New works are being erect d. A correspondent of the Mobile Advertiser writing relative to Fort Pickens, states that nine batteries have been erected outside

the fort.
The U.S. troops under Major Sibley, who vere at Indianola, on attempting to escape in two sailing vessels, were pursued and capeured by the Texans. The officers are or parole. The men will be allowed to join the Southern army, or to take an oath not to fight against it.

The steamers of the Baltimore and Norfolk line are not permitted by the blockading fleet to enter Norfolk harbor. The officers of the returned steamers report the Norfolk bay as being dotted over with government transports coming and going.

FRENDS AND FELLOW-CHRISTIANS:—It is in no presuming or dictatorial spirit that we venture to address to you these few words of sympathy and earnest expostution, in reference to the perilous crisis in your national history through which you are now passing. But having been long laboring in our humble measure, in promoting peace on earth, upon the broad principles of our common Christianity, we cannot but feel how deeply that cause to which we are devoted, is implicated in the result of the experiment now being enacted in your country.
