THE MILITARY BILL.

The following bill was introduced into the Connecticut Legislature on Friday: An Act to provide for the Organization and Equipment of a Volunteer Militia...

SEC. 1. The Governor is hereby authorized and empowered to accept and cause to be enlisted, enrolled and mustered into the service of the State...

SEC. 2. The officers and men of this force shall receive the same pay and rations while in service under the provisions of this act...

SEC. 3. The officers and men of the said force, except when in actual service, shall be paid only for the time actually spent in their organization, drilling and instruction...

SEC. 4. The force hereby created, when enlisted and accepted, shall be subject to all the rules and articles applicable to the troops in the service of the United States...

SEC. 5. All expenditures for arms, supplies, equipments and accoutrements, and for other articles necessary to prepare the force hereby authorized to be raised for active service...

SEC. 6. The sum of two millions of dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury...

SEC. 8. This act shall take effect on the day of its passage.

WASHINGTON AND SOUTHERN NEWS.

Gov. Letcher of Va., has issued a proclamation ordering that all private vessels and property recently seized or detained, with the exception of the steamers James-ton and Yorktown shall be released...

At a meeting in Redding, April 29, it was voted to pay three dollars per week to the wife and one dollar per week for each child, of men of families who shall volunteer from that town...

The steamer Maryland has landed a force of the Massachusetts troops from Annapolis, and large quantities of stores at Fort McHenry.

Gov. Morgan of New York has received a dispatch from the War-Department, requesting that no more troops be sent on until further notice, the forces at the capital being sufficient for its protection.

The Virginia Legislature adjourned on the 1st inst., until the 12th of June, by which time it was expected that the returns of the popular vote on the ordinance of secession would be received.

The conservative portion of the people in Richmond Va., are in favor of an armistice, in order that some peaceful settlement of our difficulties may be arrived at, and several leading men from Virginia, Maryland, Kentucky and Tennessee, it is said, are actively exerting themselves to bring it about.

Captain Meigs has returned to Washington from an expedition to Fort Pickens, and reports that the fort is so reinforced and provisioned as to render its reduction impossible for six months.

Dispatches from the Commandant of Forts Monroe Va., and the Commander of the Squadron in the vicinity, report that the blockade of the mouth of the James River and Hampton Roads is impassable.

The President has issued his proclamation calling for additional forces, 42,034 volunteers—infantry and cavalry—for three years; eight regiments of infantry, one of cavalry, one of artillery, to be added to the regular army, making a maximum increase of 22,714 men; and 18,000 seamen for not less than one nor more than three years.

Gen. Harney has prepared an address to the people of Missouri, urging them to remain in the Union.

It has been decided by the War Department that no more troops, except volunteer regiments, are to be concentrated at Washington for the present.

Affairs at Baltimore, at last accounts, are quiet. Fort Madison, an earthwork fortification commanding the city and harbor of Baltimore, is in possession of government troops.

Gov. Magoffin has issued a proclamation ordering an election in Kentucky for representatives to Congress.

Gov. Jackson, of Missouri, has sent in his message to the Legislature. He does not advocate the immediate secession of Missouri but denounces the Administration, and recommends a rming the State.

The preparations of Delaware for supporting the Union are progressing. It is stated that the Union feeling is gaining ground in Western Kentucky, and that a deputation of gentlemen have waited on the President and offered him two regiments of troops from that section.
