A TERRIBLE SCENE IN SOUTH AMERICA.

A correspondent of the New York Herald, writing from Valparaise, South America, under date of April 3, gives the following account of the destruction caused by a terrible earthquake which occurred in March:

earthquake which occurred in March:

With feelings of deep regret I have to announce the utter destruction of the city of Mendosa, in the Argentine Republic, by an earthquake, on the 20th of March last. At that date, at half past eight o'clack, a slight but prolonged vibration of the earth was felt in Valparaise and in Santiago simultaneously. Most of the churches were densely filled, it being near the close of Lent, and some alarm and confusion was greated, but no serious and confusion was created, but no serious accidents occurred, and tranquility was soon

At Mendoza on the 20th of March, at half past eight P M., a brief but excessively vio-lent shock of earthquake, lasting but six or eight seconds, destroyed every building pub-lic and private, in the city, and the number

eight seconds, destroyed every building, public and private, in the city, and the number who were enabled to escape was very limited. The streets being narrow, the buildings high, and the inhabitants totally unused to such phenomena, were paralyzed with terror, and neglected to seek refuge in the open courts of their dwelling until too late,

The aspect presented by the city after the first shook was terrific. Hourse subterranean thunders deafened the air, animals of all kinds rushed frantically through the open spaces howling, the earth opened and vomited forth floods of water, while, to crown the scene of horror, flames burst from the ruins and consumed nearly the entire business portion of the city, with its dead, its dying, and its wounded.

The mountain roads are in a most dan ous condition, not only on account of the huge masses of rock that have already fallen and obstructed the road, but because the vi-bration of the earth is still hurling them down from the heights above into the valleys.

The gauchos, or natives of the surrounding country, hastened to the spot, not to assist the needy or aid in rescuing the wounded from a lingering death, but to seek for plunder among the smoking ruins, and snatch the little saved from the wretched survivors.

The remaining eight, who were already hardened villains, formed themselves into a band of freebooters, and had gone, it was supposed, to the mountain passes, to intercept and rob the parties sent from Chili for the relief of the sufferers.

The latest advices from Mendosa represent the suffering to be extreme, there being neither food, clothing nor shelter for the survivors, everything being buried beneath the ruins. They also state that San Juan and San Luis, two other populous cities of the Confederation, have shared a like fate, the San Juan river having, after the shock, left Confederation, have shared a like fate, the San Juan river having, after the shock, left its bed and swept over the town, utterly destroyed what the earthquake had spared. This news not having been fully confirmed, I do not, however, vouch for its correctness.

The gloom and terror spread throughout the Republic of Chile by this awful calamity may be imagined. Situated upon an emi-

the Republic of Chile by this awful calamity may be imagined. Situated upon an eminently volcanic region, we have constant evidence of the insecurity of our tenure of existence. Separated but by a chain of mountains from the scene of destruction, and taught by sad experience the frightful and irresistible force of the unheralded earthstorm, we retire each night with a feeling of terrible insecurity. This coast has been frequently visited, in past years, by earthquakes. Chilian has been twice destroyed; Conception once; while Valparaiso, Santiago and Copiapo have suffered severely. No amount of human foresight, no precaution, avails against the mysterious visitor, who comes at day, at noonday or at midnight, and in a few seconds, levels to the ground the proudest monuments of human skill.

DEAIMACE.—The principal benefits of drainage are the following: It prevents washing, by admitting a sudden fall of rain quickly into the ground, leaving little to run off. It enriches the soil, by causing it to absorb the rains quickly, to lixiviate them, and to retain for the use of plants their carbonic acid, ammonia, and other manurial matters, instead of running them off together with some of the richest top soil into a neighboring brook. Stiff soils are more easily worked. In such a soil you can plough eight mohes deep with a less draft than it would have before required to plough six; and the soil will fall from the mould finely pulverized instead of falling in lumps. All kinds of manures will have a quicker and a better effect. Seed time will come earlier. Fall frosts will hold off later; and thus the season will be prolonged. In the North this is a great advantage, for our seasons are too short at both ends. A greater variety of crops can be grown, and so a wider choice and a more perfect retation be practiced. Drained land will continue longer to give crops without manure than undrained, because the roots have a wider range for tood, and when manured will give a greater increase for the same amount of manure. When laid down to grass, they will not deteriorate as soon, and for the reason that the grass roots page. same amount of manure. When laid down to grass, they will not deteriorate as soon, and for the reason that the grass roots penetrate deeper, the pasturage will be more uniform through wet and dry weather, and will be earlier in the spring and hold out later in autumn. Drainage improves the olimate. From the effect on the soil, and especially by diminishing evaporation, we might safely infer that its tendency would be to dry the atmosphere, to free it from miasms, and render it more conducive to health. But we are left to no doubtful inference. In England, in the well drained regions, the average of human life has actually been prolonged several years, under circumstances where it can be attributed to no other cause. buted to no other cause.

THE WATER-CRESS.—A good way of growing this in quantities sufficient for a family, is to sink a box, three or four feet square and one deep, pitched within, on the south side of a well ourb or a pump; to fill with earth, set the plants, and let the water, spilt in draining, run into it. Let it have a full exposure to the sun in the early part of the season; but if shaded in July and August, by an arbor of some kind, it does better.

Eight hundred prisoners of war have been taken by Captain Lyon of St. Louis. The men taken were acting as revolutionists, and, it is said, under the auspices of the Governor of Missouri. An officer having been wounded by the mob, as he fell he gave an order to fire, and about twenty persons were killed. The mob were disposed to attack two or three newspaper offices, but the action of the police, at the latest accounts, was successful in preventing any further bloodshed.

With regard to the movement of the Southern troops, we learn that Virginia is divided into two military districts, in which the armed bodies are concentrating-the principal points being Richmond, Petersburg and Culpepper. Six hundred men from New Orleans have just arrived at one of these stations, and it was said that a concentration of troops was to be made at City Point, on the St. James river, and at Fort Powhatan on York river.

A report of a slave insurrection in Owen county, Kentucky, has been received at Frankfort, in that State. Four hundred negroes are said to be in arms, and some white men were killed in attempting to disarm them. A dispatch from Rising Sun, Indiana, confirms the statement. and says that a body of troops has been offered to suppress the insurrection.
