The habits and habitations of beavers furnish many interesting lessons for study to the woodmen and hunters, whether scientific naturalists or not. In our boyhood, the principal sources of information respecting them were the old dams and traces of dams that were found on every little tracely where that were found on every little trock where we fished, or hunted cowalips for greens. These beaver dams consisted of ridges, of earth, from four to five feet above the com-mon level of the "beaver meadow," flat, running each way from the brook to the rising land. We could find great numbers of these dams, where it would be hard to understand how they could make pounds of sufficient depth for the beavers' use But the brooks in the primeval forests, before the inroads of civilization, afforded more water than in modern times; and, in many instances, the marshy pools which the beavers' habits require by a natural process have grown up and filled up to solid land. As in the older parts of the country no new works are found, it was generally understood that are found, it was generally understood that the beavers left andmoved off whenever civilization settlements grew up near them, and we have been surprised to find in this region the evidence of many living working beavers. On the different tributaries of the St. John River, running out of this State, there are some hundreds of them caught every year, and they do not seem to dimin-ish. Hunting parties, whether of white men or Indians, consisting of two or three men, often get from ten to twenty beavers in a winter's hunt. Lumbering operations have a tendency to drive them to the small brooks and head sources of the rivers, for when found on "driving streams," their dams have been torn away, but they do not seem particularly shy of men, or settlements, unless their dams or houses are destroyed. Four or five years ago, it is said, a company of them built dams and houses in the town of Ash-land, only two miles from the village, or corner, as it was called, and stayed two

only in their habits. For some reason, now and then one of them usually wanders alone, and has only a hole in the bank of the river and has only a hole in the bank of the river to live in, while they generally live in pairs or families, building houses and dams, and providing stores in companies—hence the term "family" or "working beavers." The supposition is that the bank beavers are such as have for some reason come short of a mate, or for idleness, have been driven from the pends and houses. been driven from the ponds and houses.
They are the same animals every way, only
exiles. The law of industry, among working
beavers, is well attested to by hunters.
Their dams or house are built anew, or reodelled, every fall, and in a way to suit the modelled, every fall, and in a way to suit the height of the water the succeeding winter or spring. Some houses stand at least above the surface of the meadow, covered with mud, in the form of a acund coal pit, but intersected with sticks of wood, so as to be strong, and the weight of three or four men makes no impression upon it.

TERRIBLE EXPLOSION OF AN OIL

We have made brief mention of the terrific astrophe that occurred at Oil Creek, Pa., which fifteen lives were lost through the plosion of an oil well on the Buchanan Flats. The farm contains, probably, more oil wells, commenced and completed, than are found on the same number of acres in any other part of the oil region. Unfortumately, the cupidity of operators has caused wells to be sunk in fearful proximity. The arm lies on Oil Creek, about three miles farm lies on Oil Creek, about three miles from its mouth and the Alleghany river. The well which caused this sudden and terrible loss of life, and destruction of property by fire, was owned by Merritt & Little, and, I understand, had been a pumping well, but failing in its supply, the proprietors were anderstand, had been a pumping went, but failing in its supply, the proprietors were drilling it deeper.
