FRESH DISCOVERIES IN THE CATACOMBS OF ROME.—An antiquary states that a party of French soldiers, while visiting the catacombs last week, discovered a gallery hitherto unexplored, and which has altogether escaped the ravages of the barbarians of former days, and the profanations of tourists. The tombe and paintings found there belong to the first three centuries of the Christian era. These ophters are presented in the catalogue of the christian era.

three centuries of the Christian era. These subterranean passages are very narrow (less than three feet) in some places, sometimes ascending, at others descending, and commanicating on the right and left with numberless other passages, all of the same width, but varying in height. In the walls on each side are oblong horizontal niches of different lengths, according to the stature of the persons burled in them, and sometimes deepenough to contain several bodies. These niches begin on a level with the floor, and are excavated one over the other to the number excavated one over the other to the number of four or five, and sometimes as many as twelve. The number of Christians buried in the whole of subterranean Rome is estimated to have been 6 000.000. In the carly ages of Christianis the Point in order estimated to have been dearly ages of Christianity the Pope, in order to facilitate pilgrimage to the catacombs. had two wide staircases made leading directly to the martyr's tombs, and which were soon decorated with marble monuments and inscriptions by the crowds of devout persons who came to venerate these relies. who came to venerate those relics. In the fifth and following centuries the barbarians completely sacked the city, and did not spare even the abode of the dead. In the most historical places of interest were left heaps of ruins, which time covered with soil and veg etation, till the special entrance to the recently discovered many glass vases have been found entire. They are made of two thicknesses of glass, of different degrees of fusibility. Between them are designs in gold. fusibility. Between them are designs in gold, which have been so well d-fended by their transparent envelope, though made fifteen centuries ago, that they appear as distinct as when they left the workman's hands. The outer coat of glass is, however, rather oxodysed in several places. An original bronze vase, found in the catacombs, is preserved in the Borner College, From the figures it presents. From the figures it presents, it must have belonged to the early ages of the Church, and is supposed to have been used for the baptism of neophytes.—Roman correspondent of the London Times.

The Adjutant General of Connecticut has issued orders discharging the companies which have been raised for three months service in the 4th and 5th Regiments, and directing the enlistment of one Regiment of Infantry for three years. The companies which have been accepted for three years, will be transferred to the 4th Regiment.

WASHINGTON AND SOUTHERN

Intense excitement prevailed at St. Louis Monday, arising out of the recent riot. A thousand people left the city in consequence of rumored insubordination among the German troops, and their threats to burn the city, but at the last accounts all was quiet and no further disturbance was expected.

In the Maryland Senate a bill has passed providing for the appointment of Commissioners to wait upon President Lincoln, President Davis, and the Governors of Virginia and Pennsylvania, and ask a cessation of hostilities until after the meeting o Congress. The House refused to accede.

Advices from Jefferson City, Missouri state that nearly all the objectionable features in the Military bill had been removed. but upon the receipt of the news of the capture of Camp Jackson the amendments were reconsidered, and the original bill passed by large majorities.

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
