

A NEW AND WONDERFUL GUN .- A Mr. A New AND WONDERFUL GUN.—A Mr. McCarthy has invented a new and powerful gun, which is capable of sending four hundred and eighty balls a minute without the use of powder. The experiment was made a few days since with great success, at the foot of Thirty-third street, North River. The gun used is three feet long, with a bore of one inch. The gun is attached to a wheel about four feet in diameter, and not over four inches thick, looking like a balance wheel. On one side of this wheel is a tube which connects the wheel with a hopper, in connects the wheel with a hopper, in hich are poured the balls in a prot er, the machinery inside of this whee iving the balls, carrying them around to the gun barrel, and throwing them around to the bore of the gun at the rate mentioned above, simply by the centrifugal force. The motion of this wheel is kept up by means of cranks attached to cog wheels, about five set in the rear of the large wheel. The balls d were one inch in size. The machinery worked by six men at the cranks as motive lower, one as feeder, pouring the balls into the hopper, and the inventor of the gun in the rear of all, taking aim and shifting the gan at will from one direction to and ne balls when directed at a target fifty rds off, pierced three thicknesses of boards. It was also tried at a long distance, and the lls were thrown about one mile in the Hudson River by centrifugal force, or the arrangement of the machinery.
