BALTIMORE RIOTERS ARRESTED. BALTIMORE, May 18.—Jerome Pendergast, James Whiteford and George McGowan were arrested this morning, charged with riotous conduct in obstructing the track of the Baltimore and Ohio R. R., on the 19th of April, while the Massachusetts troops were en route to Washington.

NAVAL INTELLIGENCE. NEW YORK, May 18.—The schooner H. W. Johnson, purchased by the Government, will mount three guns. She is to cruise in the vicinity of Key West.

ARMY PRIZES. ST. LOUIS, May 18.—Two pieces of cannon, several hundred muskets, rifles, pistols and ammunition were taken from the police Commissioners yesterday at the arsenal, also sixty Colt's navy revolvers from the American Express Company.
