Formerly country postmasters made quarterly remittances to the general department at Washington, by depositing the amount in some neighboring bank, to the credit of the postmaster-general, and sonding him therefor a certificate of the depository bank. The existence of the certificate was unknown to any person belonging to the post-office and the books of the deceased exhibited only the amount of his indebtedness to the general department, while no funds wherewith to pay the indebtedness could be found, after the most diligent search of the premises and inmost diligent search of the premises and inquiry of the widow. The condition of the effice assumed much the appearance of a defalcation, and rumors soon connected theredefalcation, and rumers soon connected therewith the sudden death of the supposed defaulter. Whispers circulated around the neighborhood that he had taken poison, while some insisted that he had hung himself, and some insisted that he had, for several days all remembered that he had, for several days previous to his death, evinced a nervou unbecoming urgency to collect small out-standing debts that, in the period alluded to, standing debts that, in the period alluded to, were accorded by country postmasters to neighboring residents. Nor was the department at Washington in ignorance of what had happened. Now the case is different. In the whole North, there are not more than three or four papers, that remind their readers of the pecuniary side of war matters. It is too suggestive. NEWS SUMMARY. The first application of the treaty between the United States and Austria for the extradition of criminals has lately taken place at Vienna, where an American named Marsh, a clerk in a mercantile house, who had embezled \$20,000, was arrested. His employers having learned that he had sailed for Europe sent off in pursuit a legal gentleman named Col, who traced Marsh to Spain, but as there is no treaty of extradition between the United States, and that country, he determined to follow Marsh wherever he went, hoping that he would at last go to some country where his arrest could be effected. Mr. Col thus travelled through Spain, Portugal and Italy, following Marsh like his shadow, until he came to Vienna, where he had him arrested. As the treaty leaves the accused the option of being tried in Austria, or sent back America, Mr. Col [had taken the precaution of bringing with him proofs of the forgeries by which Marsh had long concealed his crime, chose to return to his own country. 
